WEare with fome impatience expecting to hear of the arrival of the Czars Ambdfladors at War $\int a w$, and of the fuccefs they have in thicir Negotiation. In the mean time we have Advice from the Fronticrs, of the great preparations of the Ottomans, and we are not behind hand on this fide; the Czar will have feveral Armies in the Field, to be Commanded by Kneas Goletfni as Generalijfimus. About fix weeks fince came hither Col. Patrick Gourdon, whofe long and eminent Services on many occalions has procured him in a very gieat meafure, the favour of the Czar, who bas not only given him the Command of Major-General, but has entrufted him with the chief direction of Affairs relating to the War at Kiof, and accordingly he is gone thither to take Poffefion of that Charge.

Vieuna, April 20. The Emperor has put off his Journey to Newfadt till the third of the next Month, for that things will not be ready fooner For the Courts Reception. Some of the chief of the Nobility of Ezurgary are now here, to contert with the Emperors Miniffers feveral preliminary Matters concerning the meeting of the Dyet, which are fo adjufted, as that it's not doubted-butit will be to the fatisfaction of all that are concerned therein; and we hope that when they come to Treat of the weighty and fubftantial Points, upon which the whole depends, there will appear in their Debates that Temper and Difpofition to an accommodation, asto difcourage thofe that find their advantage in the publick diforders, from attempting any thing that may fruftrate the Ends the Emperor propofed to himfelf in talling this Dyet. The laft week ar ${ }^{-4}$ rived here an Envoye from the Cham of Tartary, who bad this day an Audience-of Prince Eterman op Baden, Prefident of the Council of War; and we are informed that a Turkifh Chiaus will behere in few days; the Errands of thefe Meltengers are for the moft part very inconfiderable, and to we foppore they are at this time, for we hear nothing syoken of them.

Ratisbonse, April 23. We gave you an Account in our laft, of the Debates of the Dyct, concerning the raifing an Army of 60000 Men ; fince we underfland that fome Deputies have propofed, that Iovod Mcn more may beadded torthat number, that fot tha

Army may be 70000 , and that it may remain on foot three years, and it's hoped the Dyst will very fpeedily come to a final Relolution therein. From,
Viemna they wrice, I hat the Affairs of Eikngary dd now chiefly employ that Court ; íne Emperor being on his departure for Neveufade, to be near the Dyet, which was to meet on the 28 th Intlaut; We wilh the luccefs of this Meeting may anfwer the ged neral expectation, and we have reafon to wifh it, for that the Emperor, when be has fetled Affairs' on that fide, will be more at liberty to att forr the Dcfence and Security of the Empire.
Francfort, 4 prib 25 . It is generally believed that this Place will be made choice of fur the Conferences that are to be hield Between the Imperial and French Commifioiers,' and though there are nes many that do promite themfelves they will antwer the end they leem defigned for, yet ever ${ }^{\prime}$ body wihhes to tee them beguns and as weare told, the Dyet at Ratisbonne has delired the Emperor, that his Minifter at Paris may prefs the Difparctio of che French Commifioners.
strasbarg, April 25 . The French Trobps begin tö̀ be in motion; fome march to Saar Louis, Longwi, and Flanders, and iome again come from thole parts towards Lorrain and Aldace; in the mean time we are wholly ignorant what their Defigns are, and though we cannot wholly lay afide the apprehenfions we have of them, yet not knowing where to fix them, we are more at eafe then perhaps we have feafon to be. The States alfembled at Ratisbomeare fenfible of the danger that threatens the Empire, as appears by their late Debates, concerning the fetting on fuot an Army of 60000 Men, for their common fecurity and Defenc ; and it's to be hoped they will make hafte to bring the lame to a formal Refolution, and then to put it in execution.
Cologne, April2 28. The Deputies that west fent hither by the City of Liege, have had Audience of our Elector, and been fev ral times in conference with his Minifters, but we do not find that they have made any progrefs towards a accomthodation; his Electoral Highnefs demanding, Thas the Authors of the late diforders be exemplarily punifhed ; that futch as have been removed ont of the Magiffracy, of other publick Employments be rellored; and his Decrees donderning the Impofition of the 6oth Penny Received and Obeyed. From Alfate' we have Advite that the Chapter of Strasburg had been Affemblediat Molbeim for the choofing a Dean, in the roors of Count Conimgee deccaled, but that the Fpench ${ }^{\text {T }}$ ptes tending to direet the Election, and feveral French
