FORM of LICENCE directed by the above Order.

By the Commissioners for managing and causing to be levied and collected His Majesty's Customs, Subsidies, and other Duties in [where]

WHEREAS [Name of the Person] one of His Majesty's Subjects, residing at [Place where] hath given Notice to us the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs [in Great Britain, or Revenue in Ireland] that he intends to lade at [some Port of the United States of America] and import into [some Port of Newfoundland] in the [Ship's Name] being a British-built Ship [describing the Tonnage and what Sort of Vessel] navigated according to Law, whereof [Master's Name] is Master, bound to [where]; and it appearing by the Register of the said Ship the [Ship's Name] whereof [Master's Name] is Master, that the said Ship the [Ship's Name] was built at [Place where] and owned by [Owner's Name] residing at [Place where] all His Majesty's British Subjects; and that no Foreigner, directly or indirectly, hath any Share, Part, or Interest therein.

Now be it known, that the said [Person's Name] hath a Licence to lade on board the said Ship, [Ship's Name] at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock, and also Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, the Produce of the said United States, and no other Article whatsoever; and to carry the said Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, Live Stock, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine to some Port or Place in the Island of Newfoundland; and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, and the Number of Live Stock, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector, or other proper Officer of the Customs.

Licence to import Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, Live Stock, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine into the Island of Newfoundland. *W. F.*

Whitehall, February 20, 1808.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Thomas Rockcliffe, of Copt Hewick, in the Parish of Ripon, in the County of York, Gentleman, second Son of John Rockcliffe, of Alenby, in the said County, Gentleman, by Sarah his Wife, His Royal Licence and Authority that he and his Issue may take and use the Surname of Wayne only, and also bear the Arms of Wayne, for which he had most humbly prayed His Majesty, in Compliance with an Injunction in the Codicil to the last Will and Testament of Christopher Wayne, late of Richmond, in the said County of York, Esq; deceased, (who was Cousin-German to the said Sarah Rockcliffe,) the said Codicil bearing Date the 3d Day of April 1791; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise His Majesty's said Licence and Permission to be void and of none Effect: And also to order, that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.
