The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the Twentyeighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An A& for regulating the "Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's " Colonies and Plantations in North America, and " in the West India Islands, and the Countries be-" longing to the United States of America; and " between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Fo-" reign Islands in the West Indies;" it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majetty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants under His Sign Manual to empower, the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorize, in Case of Necessity, the Importation into New-foundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that fuch Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, fo authorized to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in

strictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants respectively, and except by British Subjects, and in British built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law: And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock, and also Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock, and also Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, may be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which, within the Space of Nine Months previous to the Time of fuch Importation, have cleared out from some Port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or other His Majefty's Dominions in Europe; for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter-mentioned; which Licence shall continue and be in Force for Nine Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which such Licence is respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September next, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that the Malter or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the faid Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour, or Place in the faid Island of Newfoundland, where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, Live Stock, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Cultoms there, having first indorfed on the Back of

fuch Licence the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, Peafe, Indian Corn, Butter, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the faid Act mentioned: and the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland respectively, by whom such Licence was granted.

Now be it known, that the faid [Perfon's Name] hath a Licence to lade on board the faid Ship, [Ship's Name] at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Peafe, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock, and also Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, the Produce of the faid United States, and no other Article whatsoever; and to carry the faid Bread, Flour, Peafe, Indian Corn, Butter, Live Stock, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine to some Port or Place in the Island of Newfoundland; and on the Arrival of the faid Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Difcharge in Newfoundland, the Maller or Person having the Charge or Command of the faid Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, and the Number of Live Stock, and shall therenpon receive a Certificate thereof from the faid Collector, or other proper Officer of the Cuftoms.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty, WE, your Majesty's loyal Subjects, the Provost, Magistrates, Merchants, Traders, and other Inhabitants of Montrose, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with the most dutiful Expressions of our Loyalty and Attachment to your Person and Government. At a Period when the most powerful Combinations are formed to abridge our Power, and crush our national Prosperity, we consider it to be the indispensable Duty of all your Majesty's Subjects to express their Determination of defending with their Lives and Fortunes those invaluable Bleffings, of which the rancorous Eury of their Enemies would deprive them. We have beheld with Sorrow the Degradation of Europe; and with mixed Feelings of Pity and Indignation have seen the most powerful Monarchs humbling themselves before a desolating and infulting Foe. We are convinced, however, that the Devastations which we deplore have been brought about more by the Imbecility of the Meafures adopted by the Sovereigns, and by the Subversion of patriotic Feelings amongst their Subjects, than by the Valour and Prowels of their Enemies. This Conviction is sufficient to set us perfectly at Ease as to our national Security; for we have full Confidence in the Wildom which directs your Majesty's Councils, and in the Patriotism which animates the Hearts of your Subjects. And we can-not help feeling a Degree of Exultation when we reflect that these Principles, as often as brought to the Trial, have never failed to prove triumphant.

Confiding, then, in your Majesty's paternal Solicitude for the Welfare of your People, in the Extent of our Resources, and in the Bravery of our Countrymen; and humbly trusting that the Al-

mighty will continue to bless our Efforts, what have I we to fear? We are not, indeed, inlentible to the Calamities of War. We deeply deplore its Ravages amongst our Fellow-Creatures; and we are among the Number of your Majesty's Subjects who chiefly fuffer by the Interruption of Commerce, and by that unprecedented Mode of Warfare which the inventive Hostility of our Enemy has introduced. Still, however, we would willingly make every Sacrifice, and submit to every Privation, rather than compromise the Honour of the British Name; and much as we lament the Evils of War, we prefer it, with all its Hardships, to an insecure and ignominious Peace. As we are convinced of your Majelly's pa-cific Disposition, we are certain that your Majelly will embrace the first Opportunity that occurs of restoring to your People the Blessings of Peace, on a secure and permanent Basis. In the mean Time, being fatisfied of the Jultice and Necessity of the War in which we are engaged, we wait with Patience; trusting that, under the Direction of Providence, the Measures adopted by your Majesty will bring it to an honourable Termination. It is our earnest Prayer that He who holds in his Hands the Balance of Empire, may still continue to be the Guardian of the British Nation; that He may ever extend the Shield of Protection over your Majesty's Person, and keep your Subjects sensible of the inestimable Blessings which they enjoy under your Majesty's auspicious Government.

Extraß of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Douglas, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at North Yarmouth, to the Honourable William Wellessey Pole, dated North Yarmouth, the 4th Instant.

NCLOSED I have the Honour to transmit, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter from Captain Langford, of His Majesty's Sloop Sappho, acquainting me with his having captured the Brig Admiral Yawl, commissioned, manned, and armed by the Danish Government.

His Majesly's Ship Sappho, Flambro' Head, SIR, S.W. 7 Leagues, March 2, 1808.

I HAVE the pleasing Information to communicate to you the Capture of the Danish Armed Brig Admiral Yawl, Jorgen Jorgensen, Commander, mounting Twelve Eighteen-Pounder Carronades on the Lower-Deck, and Sixteen Six-Pounder Guns on the Main-Deck, with Eighty-three Men, victualled and stored for Five Months.

Whilst reaching to the Eastward from off Scarborough this Morning, I discovered the Admiral Yawl steering a Course that seemed to have no other for its Object than to cut off several Vessels to Leeward of her, and as she had the Appearance of a Man of War, I steered to intercept her; at Halfpast Twelve I made the Signal No. 275, when she hoisted an English Ensign; at Half-past One, being close up with her, I ordered a Shot to be fired over her, to which was returned a Broadside with Round and Grape after the Danish Colours were hoisted; I immediately bore down and brought her to close

Action, which was obstinately sustained for Half an Hour, when she struck to His Majesty's Sloop under my Command.

I am too sensible of the able Assistance of my

First Lieutenant, Mr. Hills, together with my other Officers and Men, to omit acquainting you therewith. Am forry to add that Mr. Trewfell, my Pilot, had his Leg severely fractured in the Action,

Pilot, had his Leg feverely fractured in the Action, and one other Man was wounded. On board the Enemy the Second Officer and One Man were killed.
