W HEREAS in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act, passed in the Forty sixth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for reviving and continuing several Laws of Customs relating to the establishing Courts of Judicature in the Island of Newfoundland; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from, and permitting the Importation to, Great Britain, of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and nine; and for continuing several Laws relating to the granting a Bounty upon certain Species of British and Irish Linens exported from Great Britain, and taking off the Duties on Importation into Great Britain of Foreign Raw Linen Yarns made of Flax; to the granting a Bounty upon the Importation into Great Britain of Hemp, and rough and undressed Flax, from His Majesty's Colonies in America, and to the Encouragement of the Greenland Whale Fisheries; and for reviving and continuing several Laws relating to the regulating the Prices at which Corn and Grain may be exported from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain; and to the Admission to Entry in Great Britain of Oil and Blubber of Newfoundland, taken by His Majesty's Subjects carrying on the Fishery from, and residing in, the said Island; and for continuing an Act of the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty, for the more effectual Encouragement of the Manufactures of Flax and Cotton in Great Britain; and for reviving and continuing several Laws relating to the permitting the Importation into Great Britain of Hides and other Articles in Foreign Ships; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn or Potatoes, or other Provisions, and to the permitting the Importation into Ireland of Corn, Fish, and Provisions, without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and eight; and for reviving and continuing an Act, passed in the Parliament of Ireland in the Twenty-fifth Year of His present Majesty, for the Encouragement of the Flaxen and Hempen

Manufactures of Ireland until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven; and for amending and further continuing an Act made in the Seventh Year of His present Majesty for the free Importation into Great Britain of Cochineal and Indigo, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and nine."

His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirtieth Day of September last, to permit for the Space of Six Months, from the Sixteenth Day of October then next, the Importation of sundry Articles of Provisions, therein specified, Duty free: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Sixteenth Day of this instant April, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans, called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also of Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, and of Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, (except Salted Beef, and Pork,) and of Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid; that shall be imported with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty; and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral the Honourable Sir Alexander Cochrane, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at the Leeward Islands, to the Honourable W. W. Pole, dated on board His Majesty's Ship *Belleisle*, *Marie Galante*, March 12, 1808.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honour to inclose, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Copy of a Letter from Capt. Selby, of His Majesty's Ship *Cerberus*, commanding the Blockading Squadron off Point à Petre, Guadeloupe, who, finding the total impossibility of preventing the Enemy's Privateers and their Prizes from gaining that Port while they continued in Possession of *Marie Galante*, as they constantly took Shelter under the Batteries of that Island, from whence they watched a favourable Opportunity to run over, he came to the Resolution of attempting the Surprise of Grand Bourg, the principal Town, in which the Detachment sent on this Service, under the Command of Captain Pigot of the *Circe*, completely succeeded; whose Report is also inclosed.

The Manner in which this Service was planned, and the Promptitude with which it was effected, reflects the highest Credit on Captain Selby, the other Captains, Officers, and Men employed thereon.

SIR, *Marie Galante, March 3, 1808.*

I BEG to acquaint you of the Surrender of the Island of *Marie Galante* to His Majesty's Arms.

Finding the Island afforded a Shelter for the Enemy's Privateers with their captured Vessels, and that it interfered considerably with the Blockade of Guadeloupe, I considered it expedient to attack it;

whereupon I gave Captain Pigot the Command of about Two Hundred Seamen and Marines from the Ships named in the Margin *; and, on the 2d Instant, we weighed from Petit Terre, and, a little after Daylight, effected a Landing about Two Miles from the Town with little Opposition, and, soon after, the Island surrendered at Discretion, and the Commandant, with the National Military Force, are Prisoners of War.

I find it a very valuable Island, in the highest State of Cultivation, and a large Quantity of Colonial Produce in the Stores. I have disembarked the Marines and garrisoned the Place, and shall remain with the Force under my Orders for your further Directions.

I herewith inclose Captain Pigot's Letter to me on the Occasion, (wherein I am happy to observe the high Terms in which he speaks of Captain Bowen, and the Officers and Men under his Command,) together with a List of the Arms and Military Stores taken on the Island.

His Majesty's Ship Circe, off Marie Galante, March 2, 1808.

SIR,

YOU having done me the Honour to give me the Command of the Debarkation of the Seamen and Marines of His Majesty's Ships Cerberus, Circe, and Camilla, on the Island of Marie Galante, I have the Pleasure to inform you it was effected without Loss, and the only Opposition, a few Shot from a small Battery to the Northward; and that notwithstanding the Badness of the Roads through the Cane Patches, I have infinite Satisfaction in adding, that the good Order and cool Conduct of both Seamen and Marines merits the highest Praise. From our early Appearance at the End of the Town, we found but little Preparations for Resistance, except a Field-Piece, placed in the Centre of the principal Street, on approaching which a Flag of Truce was sent, and the Island surrendered at Discretion. I cannot close this without expressing the Support I had in Captain Bowen, of His Majesty's Ship Camilla, and all the Officers employed on this Service.

GENERAL ORDER.

ORDERED, That, for the better Information of all concerned, the following Statements be published in the London Gazette, and in such other Manner as the Board shall direct.

1st That Claims were in due Time under the Act, that is, on or before the 1st Day of June 1804, presented to the Board, to the Amount of 5,408,766*l.* 6*s.* Sterling on the Merits of which Claims the Board were, after full Investigation, in the first place to decide; and having so decided, to distribute the 600,000*l.* under their Charge, in proportion to the Sums they had adjudged to be good.

2^{dly}. That besides a very great Number of interlocutory Resolutions and Orders, which the State of the Claims rendered absolutely necessary, many of them involving Questions on Points of leading Importance, and Details arising out of the Examinations of Documents or other Evidence in each particular Case, (such as with the Representations in pursuance of those Resolutions and Orders will be found to suggest sufficient Grounds for deciding, without much further Inquiry, many of those Cases in which Adjudications have not yet been given,) final Adjudications have been made by the Board, either on the whole or on Parts of Claims, to the Amount of 1,962,315*l.* 16*s.* 9*d.*

3^{dly}. That, of this Sum, Claims have been adjudged to be good to the Amount of 822,133*l.* 12*s.* 3*d.*; and on various Grounds rejected, disallowed, deducted, or struck off, to the Amount of 1,140,182*l.* 4*s.* 6*d.*

4^{thly}. That the Sums (comparatively of small Amount) which have been recovered by Claimants from their Debtors in America during the Investigation, chiefly by Means of Proceedings instituted or pursued in consequence of the General Orders of the Board, are included in the Sums which have been so deducted or struck off.

5^{thly}. That on the above Sum of 822,133*l.* 12*s.* 3*d.* adjudged to be good, Dividends have been paid, or are ready to be paid, to the Amount of Twenty per Cent. or One-fifth part of the above Sum.

6^{thly}. That although Losses have been unquestionably sustained by Subjects of His Majesty, as Creditors of Citizens or Inhabitants of the United States, from the Non-payment of Debts which were justly due to them at the Date of the Definitive Treaty of Peace in 1783, to a much greater Amount than even the large Sum for which Claims have come before the Board; yet the Investigation has shewn that much of that Loss was the necessary and unavoidable Consequence of the general Calamity, which, from the Ruin it had brought on Multitudes of those Debtors who were alive, and to be found at the End of the War, or the Confusion in which it had involved the Affairs of others who were dead, and whose Estates had fallen into the Hands of negligent, dishonest, or wasteful Administrators, would have prevented the Recovery of a great Proportion of those just Debts, though the ordinary Course of judicial Proceedings had gone on as before the War, that ordinary Course having at all Times there, as in other Countries, afforded to the Dishonest the Means,

or been inadequate to the Suppression of dilatory Litigation.

7^{thly}. That in the Application of such Principles of Construction as, on full Deliberation, the Board have themselves established, or adopted from the Decisions, on general Points of the Commission which sat at Philadelphia under the Treaty of 1794, (and they have adopted all the Decisions of that Board, except such of them as, in consequence of the United States being no longer a Party, are now inapplicable,) it has been the chief Business of the Board to draw from the Evidence adduced by Claimants, and every attainable Source of Information, particularly the Mass of Correspondence with Parties or Agents at the Time, which their Orders (in many Instances with great Difficulty) had brought before them, such Inferences as might lead to some satisfactory Conclusion in each particular Case, on the Question how far the Losses complained of ought to be imputed to the general Calamity; and how far to those direct or evasive Impediments of the Law which were created or suffered to exist in Breach of the 4th Article of the Treaty of Peace.

8^{thly}. That in the Exercise of those Powers of special Jurisdiction without Appeal, which the Act has conferred upon them, they have been impeded in a Manner which their Resolutions and Orders, both general and particular, have fully pointed out, to a Degree indeed much beyond even what their previous Knowledge of the Subject had led them to anticipate; but by those who truly desire that Justice shall as nearly as possible be attained, it will not in the End be Matter of Regret that, in a Business so complicated, and such as may eventually, to the Extent of Millions, involve more than even the important Interests of the Parties individually concerned; where Error too would be without Remedy; the Board have not been prevailed on to sacrifice the Duty of diligent Inquiry and Deliberation to that of Dispatch;—for although they are strongly impressed with a Sense of the Hardships which Claimants, so far as their Claims are just, have now so long sustained, and many Persons of Character are Parties before them, of whose fair Intentions they have never had Reason to entertain a Doubt; yet as the same Species of Scrutiny, though in different Degrees, has of course been applied to all, great Errors in Construction as well as Statement, and very gross Attempts, have been detected.

Lastly. That the Information, of which the Board are now possessed, seems sufficiently to warrant the Expectation that, notwithstanding the Mass of Matter which is still before them, they will be able (if no Obstructions take place, which they cannot foresee, and which they personally hope will not be the Case), to bring the whole Business to a Conclusion in the Course of about Two Years from the present Time, the divisible Fund bearing Interest in the meanwhile; as by virtue of an Act, which has been passed in the present Session of Parliament, empowering the Board to withdraw from the Bank, and lay out in the Purchase of Exchequer Bills, as much of the Fund as they should think proper, they have so withdrawn and laid out 416,040*l.* 15*s.* 1*d.* which, in consequence of recent Payments, leaves only a small Balance in the Bank; and they will endeavour to discharge that additional Trust to the best Advantage.

ORDERED further, That a List be published of the Names of those Claimants, of whose Claims no Part is now any longer before the Board, the same having been fully and finally decided on in the whole, with the Sums respectively adjudged to be good in each, (where the Whole has not been rejected,) and the Dividends paid, or ready to be paid, on such Adjudications; the said List of Claims, which are now no longer before the Board, being as follows:
