A PROCLAMATION,

For pardoning fuch Seamen and Marines as have deferted, and shall return into His Majesty's Service on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS We are defirous to give all due Encouragement to fuch Seamen as may have deferted from any of Our Ships since the Tenth Day of October One thousand eight hundred and five, and shall be willing to return to Our Service; We have thought sit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such Deserters as shall repair on board any of Our Ships or Vessels on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next; and We do hereby further promife Our most gracious Pardon to all such Scamen as, having deserted, are now belonging to some one of Our Ships; and We do also hereby promise Our most gracious Pardon to all Marines who may have deserted from our Service since the said Tenth Day of October One thousand eight hundred and five, and shall on or before the said Thirty-first Day of December next, surrender themselves at the Head-Quarters of the Royal Marines established at Portsmouth, Plymouth, or Chatham, or to any Recruiting Party of Our faid Forces; and We do hereby declare, that all Seamen and Royal Marines fo furrendering themseives as aforesaid, shall be released and discharged from all Prosecutions, Imprison-ments, and Penalties commenced or incurred by reason of any such Offence; but that such Pardon shall not entitle Deserters, whether Seamen, or Marines, to any Arrears of Pay forseited by such Desertion: And We do hereby surther declare, that all fuch Deferters, whether Seamen or Marines, who shall not on or before the faid Thirty-first Day of December next, surrender themselves on board Onc of Our Ships or Vessels of War, or at the Head. Quarters of the Royal Marines established at Portsmouth, Plymouth, or Chatham, or to some Recruiting Party of the faid Forces, or who shall hereafter absent themselves from the Ships to which they belong, or from the Marine Quarters, without Leave from their Commanding Officers, shall be tried at a

Court Martial, and being found guilty, shall be deemed unsit Objects of Our Royal Mercy, and shall suffer the Punishment of Death, or such other Punishment as they shall be condemned to suffer by Sentence of the said Court.

Given at our Court at the Queen's Palace, the Fourth Day of May, One thousand eight hundred and eight, in the Forty-eighth Year of Our Reign.

Extrati of a Letter from John Palmer, Efg; Commander of His Majesty's Sloop the Pheasant, to the Honourable W. W. Pole, dated on board that Sloop, at Spithead, the 8th Instant.

ON the 5th of last Month, in Latitude 22°. 10'. Longitude 56°. W. I fell in with a French Privateer, and, I am happy to add, that after a Chace of Four Hours, I captured her. She belonged to Guadaloupe, her Name Tropard, had been out Six Weeks, taken nothing; was formerly, from Report of the Prisoners, His Majesty's late Schooner the King's Fish, or Flying Fish, built at Bermuda for His Majesty's Service, coppered, and Copper sastened, now rigged as a Sloop; had on board when taken Five Guns, viz. One long Eighteen-Pounder, a Traverser, and Four Six-Pounders, and manned with a Crew of Sixty-two Men.
