Said Illands, Subject neverthelels to the Same Duties, , Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties, and Forfeitures, to which the Trade to and from His Majelty's Colonies, Plantations, and Islands in the West Indies is or shall be subject by Law: And His Majesty is further pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all Commodities, being the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the faid Islands of Saint Thomas, Saint John, and Sainte Croix, being in His Majesty's Possession, shall be permitted to be imported into any of the Ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in British Ships, owned by His Majelly's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Conditions, Penalties, and Forfeitures, as Articles of the like Sort are subject to coming from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, or Islands in the West Indies: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

A PROCLAMATION,
For apprehending William Williams, Master of the
Ship Croydon, in the African Trade.

GEORGE R.

7 HEREAS William Williams, Master of the Ship Croydon, in the African Trade, stands charged on the Oath of Two credible Witnesses, with the Murder of Samuel Barnes, a Sailor belonging to the faid Ship, at Charleston, South Ca-Tolina, some Time in the Year 1806; and whereas the faid William Williams lately returned in the faid Ship Croydon from a Voyage to the Coast of Africa, and has refided at Chepftow, in the County of Monmouth, but is supposed to have fled from thence; we have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby requiring and commanding all Our loving Subjects to discover and apprehend, and cause to be discovered and apprehended, the faid William Williams, and to carry him before some of Our Jullices of the Peace, or Chief Magistrates of the County, Town, or Place, where he shall be apprehended, who are respectively required to fecure him, and thereof to give fpeedy Notice unto Our Privy Council, or one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, to the end he may be forthcoming, and may be dealt withal and proceeded against according to Law: And whoever shall discover and apprehend the faid William Williams, and bring him before such Justice of the Peace or Chief Magistrate, or so discover him that he may be apprehended, shall receive for Reward the Sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, which

faid Sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly.

A PROCLAMATION,

For pardoning fuch Seamen and Marines as have deferted, and shall return into His Majesty's Service on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS We are desirous to give all due Encouragement to fuch Seamen as may have deferted from any of Our Ships fince the Tenth Day of October One thousand eight hundred and five, and shall be willing to return to Our Service; We have thought sit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby promise Our most gracious Pardon to all fuch Deferters as shall repair on board any of Our Ships or Vessels on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next; and We do hereby further promife Our most gracious Pardon to all fuch Seamen as, having deferted, are now belonging to some one of Our Ships; and We do also hereby promise Our most gracious Pardon to all Marines who may have deserted from our Service since the faid Tenth Day of October One thousand eight hundred and five, and shall on or before the said Thirty-sirst Day of December next, furrender themselves at the Head-Quarters of the Royal Marines established at Portsmouth, Plymouth, or Chatham, or to any Recruiting Party of Our faid Forces; and We do hereby declare, that all Seamen and Royal Marines fo furrendering themselves as aforesaid, shall be released and discharged from all Prosecutions, Imprisonments, and Penalties commenced or incurred by reason of any such Offence; but that such Pardon shall not entitle Deserters, whether Seamen, or Marines, to any Arrears of Pay forfeited by such Defertion: And We do hereby further declare, that all fuch Deserters, whether Seamen or Marines, who shall not on or before the faid Thirty-first Day of December next, furrender themselves on board One of Our Ships or Veffels; of War, or at the Head. Quarters of the Royal Marines elfablished at Portsmouth, Plymouth, or Chatham, or to some Recruiting Party of the faid Forces, or who shall hereafter absent themselves from the Ships to which they belong, or from the Marine Quarters, without Leave from their Commanding Officers, shall be tried at a Court Martial, and being found guilty, shall be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy, and shall suffer the Punishment of Death, or such other Punishment as they shall be condemned to suffer by Sentence of the faid Court.
