WHEREAS by an Order of His Majefty in Council, of the Twenty-fifth Day of November One thousand eight hundred and seven, it was ordered and declared, that Information of His Majefty's Order in Council of the Eleventh Day of the fame November should be taken and held to have been received in the Places therein mentioned, at the Periods therein respectively affigned, to fuch Places respectively : And whereas the Countries on the Continent of North and South America, extending from the Tenth to the Thirtieth Degree of North Latitude, are not included in the Places fo fpecified ; His Majefty is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order and declare, that Information of the faid Order of the Eleventh of November One thousand eight hundred and feven, shall be taken and held to have been received in all Places on the Continent of North and South America, extending from the Tenth to the Thirtieth Degree of North Latitude, including the Island of New Orleans, on the Tenth Day of Fe-bruary One thousand eight hundred and eight ; and that all Matters contained in the faid Order of the Twenty-fifth of November One thousand eight hundred and feven shall apply to Vessels failing from the Places aforefaid, as having received Notice of the faid Order of the Eleventh of November One thousand eight hundred and feven on the faid Tenth Day of February One thousand eight hundred and eight : -And the Right Honourable the Lords Commif-fioners of His Majefty's Treafury, His Majefty's Principal Secretarics of State, the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take the neceffary Meafures herein as to them shall respectively appertain. A PROCLAMATION,

For apprehending William Williams, Maßer of the Ship Croydon, in the African Trade.

GEORGE R.

W HEREAS William Williams, Mafter of the Ship Croydon, in the African Trade, ftands charged on the Oath of Two credible Witneffes, with the Murder of Samuel Barnes, a Sailor belonging to the faid Ship, at Charlefton, South Ca-

rolina, fome Time in the Year 1806; and whereas the faid William Williams lately returned in the faid Ship Croydon from a Voyage to the Coaft of Africa, and has refided at Chepftow, in the County of Monmouth, but is supposed to have fled from thence; we have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby requiring and com-manding all Our loving Subjects to difcover and apprehend, and caufe to be difcovered and apprehended, the faid William Williams, and to carry him before fome of Our Justices of the Peace, or Chief Magistrates of the County, Town, or Place, where he shall be apprehended, who are respectively required to fecure him, and thereof to give fpeedy Notice unto Our Privy Council, or one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, to the end he may be forthcoming, and may be dealt withal and proceeded against according to Law: And whoever shall discover and apprehend the faid William Williams, and bring him before fuch Justice of the Peace or Chief Magistrate, or fo discover him that he may be apprehended, shall receive for Reward the Sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, which faid Sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS the Lords Commiffioners of Our Treasury are hereby. required and directed to pay accordingly.
