Brussels, May 13. People are here in some impatience to see what issue the affair of the Deacon of one of the Nations who is now a Prisoner at *Nirword*, will have; the Fiscal has exhibited a Charge against him, but what the particular crimes he accuses him of are, we know not. As well the Spanish as French Commissioners are now at *Courtray*, and intended to renew the Conferences as yesterday; we wish they may have the desired success, that so all differences concerning Limits and Dependencies, which may otherwise one day trouble the Peace between the two Crowns, may be compos'd, and the friendship between the two Crowns made thereby the more firm and lasting.

Portsmouth, May 8. Friday in the afternoon sailed from *Spithead* the *Anelope* and *Pearl* Frigats, to Cruise to the Westward; and yesterday came to an Anchor in *St. Helens Road* the English *Ruby*, Captain *Allen* Commander.

Windfor, May 11. The following Address was presented to His Majesty by our Mayor and Aldermen in a Body.

To the Kings Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please Your Majesty,

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Bayliffs, and Burgeses of this Your Majesties Ancient Burrough of *New-Window*, seriously reflecting on the exceeding great Felicity which we and all Your Majesties good Subjects enjoy, by Your Majesties most Gracious Reign over us and principal in Maintaining, Continuing, and Obeying amongst us this true Protestant Religion by Law Establish'd; And in contending to give us fresh Assurance thereof by Your Majesties late Gracious Declaration: Do in all Sincerity return Your Majesty our most humble and unfeigned Thanks for the same, nor doubting Your Majesty's Perseverance in those Your great and pious Resolutions, beseeching Your Majesty to believe, that we are firmly resolv'd to stand by Your Majesty with our Lives and Fortunes, in the maintainance of Your Majesties just Rights, Your Heirs and Lawful Successors, and the Government both in Church and State now Establish'd, against all Opposition whatsoever.

And whereas several of the Inhabitants of this Burrough (contrary to our Inclinations) have dissented from us in several Transactions of the Burrough, and have not render'd that due Respect and Obedience unto Your Majesty, as they ought, yet we Humbly hope the same shall not reflect upon us, and for the future we shall use our utmost endeavours upon all occasions to confirm them in their Loyalty to Your Majesty, and to a true Conformity to the Church, as it is now established; and that we shall continue our Prayers to Almighty God for the Preservation of Your Majesties Sacred Person, and long and Prosperous Reign, that all the Machinations and Devices of wicked and impious Men, against Your Majesty and Your Government, may be confounded and brought to nought. That Your Majesties Honour may flourish, and we with all Your Majesties good Subjects and our Posterities, may be partakers of so great a Blessing: And that in the mean time; we may peaceably Ac-

quiesce in all the Ails of Your Majesties Royal Government. And (as in Duty bound, and by Inclination bent) ever continue to be

Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects.

Windfor, May 11.
