PRESENT,

The KING's Moft Excellent Majefty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Ma-jefty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fifth Day of November One thousand eight hundred and leven, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coaltwile, Gunpowder or Salt-Fetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of June next : And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the laid Prohibition should be continued for fome Time longer, His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Perfon or Perfons whatfoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majelty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid Sixth Day of June next, prefume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or thip or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition on board any Ship or Veffel, in order to traisforting the fame into any Parts beyond the Sear, or carrying the fame Coaltwife, without Leave or Permiffion in that Behalf first obtained from His Majelty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and fuffering the refpective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act paffed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An "Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the "Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the "Law for empowering His Majefly to prohibit "the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Animunition; and alfo to empower "His Majelly to refrain the carrying Coatwife of "Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or "Ammunition:"-And the Right Honorable the Lords Commillioners of His Majefly's Treafury, the Committioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the relt of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and

To the KING's Molt Excellent Majefty,

Intimidation formed a Combination of the Powers of the Continent against the Welfare and Prosperity of this Country, we think it our Duty, in com-mon with the rest of your Majelty's loyal People, to approach the Throne to reiterate these our Sentiments, and to exprcis our Readinefs, to the Extent of our feeble Powers, zealoufly to promote and fup-port the wife and energetic Mealures adopted by your Majefty's Government for carrying on the arduous Contelt in which we are engaged.

Awful as the prefeut Crifis is, we do not view it either with Dread or Dilmay; but relying on the Protection of Divine Providence, the Spirit and Magnanimity of the Nation, the diffinguithed Valour and Skul of your Majelty's Fleets and Armies, and the Vigour and Firmnels of your Councils, we with Confidence anticipate the Difcomfiture of the unjuit and ambitious Projects of the Enemy.
