AT the Court at the *Queen's Palace*, the 25th of May 1808,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fifth Day of November One thousand eight hundred and seven, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Sixth Day of June next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and

His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. *Steph. Cottrell.*

THE following Address having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkebury, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been by his Lordship presented to the King; which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Cardigan, convened at Cardigan on the 28th Day of May 1808.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Cardigan, implore Permission to assure your Majesty of our firm and inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's sacred Person, Family, and Government, and of our unfeigned Gratitude for the Blessings we have ever enjoyed under your mild and benevolent Reign; at this important Period, when our inveterate Foe has by Delusion and Intimidation formed a Combination of the Powers of the Continent against the Welfare and Prosperity of this Country, we think it our Duty, in common with the rest of your Majesty's loyal People, to approach the Throne to reiterate these our Sentiments, and to express our Readiness, to the Extent of our feeble Powers, zealously to promote and support the wise and energetic Measures adopted by your Majesty's Government for carrying on the arduous Contest in which we are engaged.

Awful as the present Crisis is, we do not view it either with Dread or Dismay; but relying on the Protection of Divine Providence, the Spirit and Magnanimity of the Nation, the distinguished Valour and Skill of your Majesty's Fleets and Armies, and the Vigour and Firmness of your Councils, we with Confidence anticipate the Discomfiture of the unjust and ambitious Projects of the Enemy.

We are convinced that your Majesty will be anxious to restore the Blessings of Peace to your
