Subjects whenever it can be obtained on fafe and ! honourable Terms. But we are however far from wishing that any Sacritice should be made not perfectly compatible with the Eights and Dignity of the British Empire.

Copy of a Letter from Vice Admiral Sir James Sau-marez, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and V. sels in the Baltic, to the Honourable W W. Pole, dated on Board the Villory, Elemish-Road, Gottenburg, Way 30, 1808.

SIR, INCLOSE, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Copy of a Letter transmitted to me from Lieutenant Price, acting Commander of His Majefly's Goop Falcon, addressed to Captain Campbell of His Majefly's Ship Dictator, flating his Proceeding in the Belt, and giving an Account of the Defire Jon of feveral of the Enemy's Veffels on the Hard of Samfoe, and different Parts of the Coall; and of the cutting out by the Boats of that Stonp under the Direction of Mr. Ellerton, Master of the Hairm, from under the Batteries of Landbolm, Two Vessels, laden with Thirteen-Inch Mortar each, and a Quantity of Shells, intended for the Batteries of Samtoe.

I cannot close this Letter without recommending, in the Brongelt Manner, Lieutenan Price to the particular Notice of their Lordships; the Zeal and Activity he has a splayed during the Since he has had the Command of the Falcon, and particularly his great Exertions on the insticate Service intruffed to him, entitles him to the highest encomiums in my

His Majesty's Sloop Falcon, off Samfoe, May 15, 1808.

I THINK it my Duty to flate to you a Detail of what has occurred to His Majesty's Sloop under my Command fince 1 parted from you: In working up to the Station you had affigned me, on the 29th Ultimo, I perceived Nine pretty large Boats on the Shore of the Mand of Endelau, and as Troops were feen at the firme Tiene, Three Boats were difpatched from the Faires, and face, eded in burning and otherwise delivoying Eight out of the Nine; the Danish Soldiers made a very poor Attempt to defend them; at the Hand of Hanne Six other small Craft were deftroyed a libout any Relifiance: On the 3d Infrant, a large Man of War Schooner attempted to eleage from Linuxes but after a long and circuitous Chace of Millury, the was again forced into her old Fort, where fat fill remains with Three other armed Vallels. I have likely life to inform you, that the Enemy have fortified very formerly the Enterence of the Marbour of Kycholm, in the Island of Samer, and have already Fifty Ricces of heavy Cannon mounted. I bearred from One of the Prioners taken in a fre I of asket-Boat, that Vessels were expected from Callundborg with I Gun in her Stern to bear on me, she was caught in

Mortars to mount on the Batteries; the Boats of the Falcon were accordingly in Shore every Night to intercept them, and on the Night of the 7th Instant they were so fortunate as to discover the Vessels they were seeking, at an Anchor close under the Batteries of Lundholm, they were boarded and carried in an Instant under a heavy but ill directed Fire both of great Guns and Musketry; in bringing them out, One of the Boats, which contained a Thirteen-Inch Mortar with all its Equipment, and Four Hundred Shelis, grounded, and as she was under the Enemy's Fire, Mr. Ellerton, Master of the Falcon, who commanded, was obliged to burn her, which was done most effectually; the other Veffel, containing a Mortar of Thirteen Inches, was brought out; I took the Mortar on board, and destroyed the Vessel. Mr. Ellerton merits every Thing I can fay on this Occasion; and, I am happy to add, that no Lofs was fustained on our Side, Seaman only being flightly wounded with a Musket-Ball in the Arm. One Dane was killed; it appears he was an Artillery Officer, who had Charge of the Mortars and Mortar Stores, and persevered in Refistance when all Refillance was vain. I have nothing further to add to this Statement, but that Thirteen Boats from the Shores of different Parts of the Island of Samfoe have been destroyed, making in the Whole Twenty feven; and as they were all Boats adapted for the Transportation of Troops, I trust you will not disapprove of my having done so.

Copy of another Letter from Vice-Admiral Sir James Saumarez to the Hon. W. W. Pole, dated on board His Majesty's Ship Victory, Flemish Road, Gottenburg, the 30th of May 1808.

SIR, AVING detached, on the 18th Instant, Lieutenant Lucas, in His Majesty's Hired Cutter Swan, with my Dispatches to Rear-Admiral Sir Samuel Hood, on the 24th he fell in with one of the Enemy's Privateers under the Batteries of Bornholm, which, after an Action of Twenty Minutes, blew up, and funk, with the Loss of all her Crew. Great Praise is due to Lieutenant Lucas for his spirited Attack of a Vessel of superior Force under the Protection of the Enemy's Batteries.

J. SAUMAREZ. I am, &c.

His Majesty's Hired Gutter Swan, off Bornbolm, May 24, 1808. I BEG Leave to acquaint you, To-day, at Noon, observed a Cutter-rigged Vellel flanding from the Land towards me. I hove to, and hoilled a Danish Jack for a Pilot, which decoyed her fo far from the Shore that I was enabled to come up with her before she could reach the Land. At Two o'Clock I gave Chace, and at Four had the Satisfaction of getting within Gun-shot of her. She then commenced her Fire; immediately on which the Battery on the Shore opened their Fire, being about a Mile from the Beach. The Enemy, attempting to get a long
