Venice, April 26.

Ignior Contarini is made choice of to go Ambaffador from this Republick to the Emperor, and he has Orders to haften his departure. On Saturday laft the French Ambaffa for had an Audience of the Senate, whom he acquainted, That the King his Maller had ordered a Squadron of Ships to be forthwith put to Sca, and that he would employ them against Tripoli and Sally. The Advices we receive from Poland and Turky concerning the Molcovites, are very different; for from Warfaw all the Letters we receive affure us, that that Crown is going to enter into the War against the Ottomans, in conjunction with the Mofcovites, and that in order thereunto, an Offensive and Defensive Alliance is Treating between them; while at the fame time we have an Account from Constantinople, That a Peace is Negotiating between the Turks and the Molcovites, and that fo great a progress had been made therein, that it was not doubted but it would be very fuddainly concluded; but whether this be a Truth , or only given out by the Turks to difcourage the Poles from joyning with the Mofcovites, time must shew.

Vienna, May 4. The Emperor has put off his journey to Laxemburg for fome days; and there is a Dif-course that the Elector of Bavaria will make the Emperor a Vifit there, which is the rather belie-ved for that orders are given for the furnishing very richlyan Apartment in the Emperors Palace at Laxemburg, which must be for some Person of great Quality. The Hungarian Noblemen that are here have prayed the Emperor, That for the fatisfaction of his Subjects of that Kingdom, he will appear at the Dyet at Oedenburg, in the Royal Habits which their Kings uled to wear. Here are likewile Deputies from the Malecontents, who have often Coi ferences with the Minifters, and give great affurances that the faid Malecontents will fubmit to the Emperor's Pleafure in every thing. provided their Religion may be fecured, and their Effates which have been Sequestred, reflored to them; Though at the fame time, if we may believe the Advices we receive, the Turks are at this inftant Treating with the Hungarians, and make them confiderable offers, If they will put themselves under their Protection.

Colonge, May 13. It is now faid for certain; That our Elector will remove from hence to Bonne, about the end of the next Month; the Deputies of the City of Livge, continue in the intrim, their Solicitations in order to the Compoling the Affairs of their City, but hitherto have not made any great advance therein. We hear nothing faid at prefent of the Elector of Bavaria's Marriage with the Princels of Eyfenceb; fo that it's believed it meets with found, difficulty.

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Hamburg, May 13. The Danish Troops continue to draw together in Oldenburg, they are already \neq or 8000 Men in a Body. The King of Denmark will in 7 or 8 days be again at Gluck/ladt.

Hague, May 19. The States-Gen ral have received a Letter from the Sieur d'Amerongen their Minufter at Berlin, acquainting them with the Electro ors Refolution of fending his Second Son, Prince Louis Marckgrave of Brandenburg, to pais five or fix months in these Countreys, and particularly in the Province of Utrecht; and have thereupon returned a Compliment to his Electoral Highnels, affuring him of the great fatisfaction they thall have to fee the faid Prince, and that they will make use of the occasion, to fhew the great Respect they have for his Electoral Highnels, and all his Family. The Prince of Orange is now expected here in few days, the Meeting at Hummelingen being to feparate as this day or to Morrow.

Bruffels, May 16. The Letters we receive from Gaunt give us an Account, that the Prince of Parma had been to visit Bruges, Damme, Oftend and Newport, and had given Orders for the repairing the Fortifications of those places where they are defective; That his Highness having seen the Troops in Flanders, was very well pleafed with them, efpecially the Horfe and the Dregoons, which are in very good order, the Companies full, and the Men well cloathed and Mounted. His Highnels will not be here to foon as he at first intended, defigning to visit Aeth, Mons, &c. His Highness has sent an Order hither to forbid the observing the Annual Proceffion, which otherwife would have been made on Sunday next, to avoid the Expences it puts the Town to, or rather as some think, to prevent the Burghers meeting in Arms, and the diforders that might enfue. The Process against the Deacon of the Gardiners is not yet finished, but will be very specdily; he is accused of High Treason, and in the mean time is kept close prifoner in the Callle of Vilvord. The Commissioners at Courtray met together on the 12th Inflant, but in their first Conference nothing but Civilities and Compliments paffed between them.

Bruffels, May 20. The Court will remove from Gauns to Morrow; and on Thursday his Highnels intends to be at Aeth, where he will flay till Saturday, and then go for Mons, and will remain there seven or eight days to dispatch several Affairs of that Province. The Magisfrates of Bruges made his Highnels, when there, a very handsome Present; and the States of Haynault have we hear, resolved to do the like. The Prince of Faudemont (who is Admiral of these Countreys.) has sent Orders to Oftend to fit out with all diligence the Frigats that are at there for the fecurity of the Coalls against the Brandenburghs, and Moneys are providing at *Antr*werp for that Service.

Marfeilles, May 13. The last week parted from hence ten Freuch Gallies, under the Command of the Duke of Mortemar for the Coafts of Span, what their Defign is time mult different. We are informed from *Thoulon*, that the Sicur du Luefne was to fail as this day with fix men of War, two Firefhips, and two Victuallers, and that he would take his courfe directly for Tripoly.

Paris, May 17 The King has nominated the Sieur de Wal Romain, and the Sieur de Harlay to be his Commiffioners for the Conferences that are to be hild for the Adjusting the Limits and Dependencies of Alface. The Affembly of the Lifftops has only produced an Humble Advice from them to the King, to call a National Council, or to Convoke a general Affembly of the Clergy, where fuch Refolutions may be taken, as may most conduce to the Peace of the Chuch; but the Bilhop of Arras, who was one of the Affembly, would not Sign the faid Advice, for which reaton the King is much difficated with him. It is faid for certain, that the Dauphinets is with Child.

Plymouth, May 11. On Sunday last came in here His Majesties Ship the Guernsley, Captoin Tennent Commander, from cruising. And yesterday the Antelope, Captain Story, and the Pearl Captain Willidus from the Eastward.

- Southampton, May 6. His Majafties late Declaration being read at the Quarter-Seffions held for this Town and County, the Grand Jury delired the Beach to return their most humble Thanks to His Majesty for the fame; and the Mayor, Aldermen, Bayliffs and Furgesses being Attembled in Common-Council, Refolved to make an Humble Addrefs to His Majesty for that purpole, which hating been drawn up and approved of, the Mayor and Alderinen, accompanied with a great many Gentlemen of the Town went down to the Key, and ordered all the Great Guns to be difcharged.
