Venice, April 26،

SIgnior Contarini is made choice of to go Ambaffador from this Republick to the Emperor, and he has Orders to haften his departure. On Saturday laft the French Ambaflator had an Audience of the Senate, whom he acquainted, That the King his Malter had ordered a Squadron of Sbips to be forthwith put to Sca, and that he would employ them againft Tripoli and sally. The Advices wereceive from PG= land and Turky concerning the Molcovites, are very different; for from Warfaw all the-Letters we receive allure us, that that Crown is going to enter into the War againft the Ottomans, in conjunction with the Mofcovites, and that in order thereanto, an Offenfive and Defenfive Alliance is Treating between them; while at the fame time we have an Account from Conftantinople, That a Peace is Negotiating between the Turks and the Mofcovites, and that fo great a progrefs had been made therein, that it was not doubted but it would be very fuddainly concluded; but whecher this be a Truth, "or only given out by the Turks te difcourage the Poles from joyning with the Mofcovites, time mult thew.
Jienna, May 4. The Emperor has put off his journey to Laxemburg for fome days; and there is a Dif courfe that the Elector of Bavaria will make the Emperor a Vifit there, which is the rather belie-- ved fur that orders are given for the furnifhing very richlyan Apartment in the Emperors Palace at Laxeviturg, which muft be for fome Perfon of great Qualiny. The Burgarian Noblemen that are here have praycd the Emperor, That for the fatisfaction of his Subjects of that Kingdom, he will appiar at the Dyet at Oedenburg, in the Royal Habits which their Kings ufed to wear. Here are likewife Deputies from the Malecontents, who have often Coiferences with the Minilters, and give great affurances that the faid Malecontents will fubmit to the Emperor's Pleafure in erery thing. provided their Religion may be fecured, and their Eftates which have been Sequeltred, reffored to them; Though at the Game time, if we may belicve the Adrices we receive, the Turks are at this inftant Treating with the Eurgarians, and make them confiderable offers, if they will put themfelves under their Protection.
Colonge, May 13 . It is now faid forcertain; That our Elector will remove from hence to Bonnie, about the end of the next Month; the Deputies of the City of Licge, continue in the intrim, their Solicitations in order te the Compofing the Affairs of their City, but hitherto have not made any great advance therein. We hear nothing faid at prefent of the Elector of Bavaria's Marriage with the Princefs of

 difficulty،E'amburg, May 13. The Danifh Troops continu c to draw tugether in Oldenburg, they are already $\Rightarrow$ or 8000 Mcn in a Body. The Kilg of Denmark will in 7 or 8 days be again at Gluck fladt.

Hague, May 19. The States-Gen ral have received a Letter' fiom the Sicur d'Amerangen cheir Minifter at Berlin, acquainting them wita the Elcets ors Refolution of fending his Sccond Son, Prince Louis Marckgrave of Brandenburg, to pals five or fix months in there Countreys, and particularly in the Province of Vtrecbt ; and have chercupon returned a Compliment to his Electoral Highnefs, affuring him of the great fatisfaetion they Thall have to fee the faid Prince, and that they will make ufe of the occafion, to fhew the great Refpect they have for his Electoral Highnefs, and all. his Family. The Prince of Orange is now expect ${ }^{-}$ ed here in few days, the Meeting at Fiummelingen bing to feparate as this day or to Morrow.

Bruffels, Mas 16. The Letters we receive from Gaunt give us an Account, that the Prince of Parma had been to vifit Brugex, Damme, Oftend and Nepoport, and had given Orders fur the repairing the Fortifications of thofe places where they are defealive; That his Highnefs having feen the Troops in Elanders, was very well pleafed with them, efpecially the Horfe and the Dregoons, which are in very good order, the Companies full, and the Men well cloathed and Mounted. His Highne's will not be here fo foon as he at firlt intended, defigning to vifit Aeth, Mons, \&c. His Highnefs has fent an Order hither to forbid the obferving the Annual Proceffion, which otherwife would hare been made on Sunday next, to avoid the Expences it puts the Town to, or rather as fome think, to prevent the Burghers meeting in Arms, aud the difurders that might enfue. The Procefs againft the Deacon of the Gardiners is not yet finifhed, but will be very fpeedily; he is acculed of High Treafon, and in the mean time is kept clofe prifoner in the Calle of Vilvord. The Commifioners at Courtray met togethes on the r2th Inftant, but in their firft Conference nothing but Civilities and Compliments paffed between them.

Bruffels, May 2o. The Coprt will remove from Gauxt to Morrow; and on Thurfday his Highnefs intends to be at Aeth, where he will fay till Saturday, and then ga for Mows, and will remain chere feven or eight days to difpatch feveral Affairs of that Provino. The Magiffrates of Bruges made his Highnefs, when there, a very handfome Prefent; and the States of Haysault have we hear, refolved to do the like. The Prince of Taudemont (who is Admiral of thefe Countreys,) has fent Orders to oftend to fis out with all diligence the Frigats that
aft thete for the fecurity of the Coafts againit the Brandenburghs, and Moneys are providing as Antwerp for that Service.

Marjeilles, May r3. $_{3}$. The laft week parted from hence ten Freuch Gallies, under the Command of the Duke of Mortemar for the (oalts of Spaze, what their Defign is time mult diccover. "We are informed from Thoulon, that the bicur du Quefue was to fail as this day uith fix men of War, two Firehips, and two Victuallers, and tliat he weuld take his courle direclly for Tripoly.

Paris, May ${ }_{17}$ The King has nominated the Sieur
 midioners for the Conferences that are to beh.jd fot rimedaliuling the Limits aud Dependencies of Alace. The Allembly of the lillups bas only produced an Humble Advice from them to clet King, to call a National Council, or to Convoke ageneral Afembly of the Ckrey, where fuch Refolutions thay te taleen, as may mola conduce to the Peack of the Chuch; bute the Bithop of Arras, who was one of the Affembly, would not Sigh the faid Advire, for which reaton the Kiing is much difpleafed with him. It is faid for certain, that the Dauphinets is with Child.

Plymouth, May II. On Sunday latt came in here His Majellies Ship the Guerbley, Captain Tenment Commander, from craifnig. And yelterday the AnEelope, Captain Story, and the Pearl Captain wollidhs from the Ealtward.
