AT the Court at the *Queen's Palace*, the 4th of July 1808,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty having taken into His Consideration the glorious Exertions of the Spanish Nation for the Deliverance of their Country from the Tyranny and Ufurpation of France, and the Assurances which His Majesty has received from several of the Provinces of Spain, of their friendly Disposition towards this Kingdom; His Majesty is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered;

First, That all Hostilities against Spain on the Part of His Majesty shall immediately cease.

Secondly, That the Blockade of all the Ports of Spain, except such as may be still in the Possession or under Controul of France, shall be forthwith raised.

Thirdly, That all Ships and Vessels belonging to Spain shall have free Admission into the Ports of His Majesty's Dominions, as before the present Hostilities.

Fourthly, That all Ships and Vessels belonging to Spain, which shall be met at Sea by His Majesty's Ships and Cruizers, shall be treated in the same Manner as the Ships of States in Amity with His Majesty, and shall be suffered to carry on any Trade now considered by His Majesty to be lawfully carried on by Neutral Ships.

Fifthly, That all Vessels and Goods belonging to Persons residing in the Spanish Colonies, which shall be detained by any of His Majesty's Cruizers after the Date hereof, shall be brought into Port, and shall be carefully preserved in safe Custody, to await His Majesty's further Pleasure; and it shall be known whether the said Colonies, or any of them, in which the Owners of such Ships and Goods reside, shall have made common Cause with Spain against the Power of France.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take such Measures hereinafter to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty fifth Day of November One thousand eight hundred and seven, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom of any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bow-sprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Eleventh Day of this instant July: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, from the said Eleventh Day of this instant July, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bow-sprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, Sail-Cloth or Canvas, or other Naval Stores, or do ship or lade any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bow-sprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, Sail-Cloth or Canvas, or other Naval Stores, on board any Ship.

or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles for the Purpose of Trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, (except as hereinafter excepted,) to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were en-

tered outwards: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, nevertheless, that the following Articles, viz. Bar-iron, White and Tarr'd Rope, Tallow or Mill-Crease, Tarpaulins for Waggon-Covers, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, shall be permitted to be exported, upon Payment of the proper Duties, without Bond being entered into by the Merchant Exporter, to any of the British Plantations in the West Indies, or to any of His Majesty's Settlements in South America; provided the Merchant Exporter shall first verify, upon Oath, that the Articles so exported are intended for the Use of a particular Plantation or Settlement, to be named in the Entry Outwards, and not for Sale; and that the said Plantation or Settlement has not before been furnished with any Supply of the said Articles during the same Season; and provided also that the Exportation of the said Articles shall, in no Case, exceed the Value of Fifty Pounds Sterling for any given Plantation or Settlement, whether by one or more Shipments within the same Season: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

A DISPATCH, of which the following is a Copy, together with Inclosures, have been received from Major-General Spencer by Viscount Castlereagh, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, dated off Cadiz, June 12, 1808.

His Majesty's Ship Atlas, off Cadiz,

My Lord, June 12, 1808.

THE French Squadron consisting of Five Sail of the Line and a Frigate, having placed themselves in a Defensive Position, in the Channel leading to the Caraccas, and out of the Reach of the Works of Cadiz, and having refused to listen to any Terms, I have great Satisfaction in reporting that the Spanish Gun and Mortar Boats, and the Batteries erected for this Purpose, on the Isle of Leon, and near Fort Louis, commenced Hostilities against the French Ships, at Three o'Clock in the Afternoon of the 9th, and the firing continued without Interruption on both Sides till Night. It was renewed on the Part of the Spaniards on the Morning of the 10th, and partially continued till Two, when a Flag of Truce was hoisted by the French, but the Terms proposed being inadmissible, the Spaniards intend to recommence Hostilities with an additional Battery, to the Eastward of Fort Louis, consisting of Thirty Twenty-four Pounders.

Admiral Purvis and myself wished to have cooperated in this Attack, but the Spaniards, feeling themselves confident in their own Force, have declined our Offers of Assistance.

The Supreme Council of Seville have nominated Commissioners, and applied last Night for Passports, and a Frigate to convey them to England, and they

are also equally anxious to send Feluccas with Dispatches to South America.

Information having been received that a small French Corps was assembling at Tavira, with a View of entering Spain by the River Guadiana, we have been requested to proceed against this Corps, and either to attack them on the Coast, or endeavour to prevent the further Prosecution of their Plans against Spain. I accordingly propose to sail immediately for this Object, Lord Collingwood approving of it.

Admiral Purvis had already detached Three Ships of War off the Mouth of the Guadiana, and has offered every other necessary Assistance, which Lord Collingwood has since confirmed.

Copy of a Letter from General Morla, Captain-General of Andalusia and Governor of Cadiz, addressed to their Excellencies Admiral Purvis and Major-General Spencer.

ADMIRAL ROSSILLY, as your Excellencies will observe by the annexed Copy, has proposed to disarm, but upon Conditions which I thought were inadmissible. Whatever may be his Terms of Surrender, I shall in no Manner deviate from my Promise; it is therefore necessary that I should have your Consent, as I have already said in my first Conference with Brigadier-General Smith and Captain Sir John Gore, to whom I have pledged myself with Simplicity and good Faith.

It will afford me considerable Satisfaction to consult with your Excellencies on all Occurrences, Incidents, and Circumstances, conducive to our common Advantage, and contrary to the Interests of the Common Enemy.

Nothing gives me more real Pleasure than the absolute Confidence of your Excellencies in my Candour and Sincerity, with which I remain your Excellencies most affectionate and devoted Servant.

Copy of a Letter from Admiral Rossilly, addressed to General Morla, dated on board the Admiral's Ship, Hero Bay, off Cadiz, June 11, 1808.

CAPTAIN-GENERAL,

OBLIGED to defend myself on account of the Inquietude inspired into the People of this Province by my imposing Attitude, I yesterday, in order to tranquillize them, proposed to your Excellency to quit the Bay. In case the English cannot accede to this Proposal, I suggest the Idea of disembarking my Means of Attack, and keeping my Ships Companies on board; no Colours shall be displayed on my Squadron. Hostages shall be given for our Security, our Sick, and all the French People in the Province, with their national and individual Property. Hostages will be equally given on my Part. The Refreshments, Water, and Provisions necessary for my Squadron shall be provided on my paying for them, as has hitherto been done. In short, I shall demand no Conditions but those which are necessary for my Honour and that of the People serving under my Orders, and as are compatible with the public Tranquillity.

Deprived by my Proposal of the Means of Defence against the exterior Enemy, I demand Security against them.

Receive, Captain-General, the Renewal of my distinguished Consideration, with which I am your Excellency's most humble Servant,

Copy of an Answer from General Morla to Admiral Rossilly.

Excellent Sir, Admiral Rossilly,

IN Answer to certain Proposals and official Demands transmitted by your Excellency, which, although dictated by your Honour, are unquestionably incompatible with mine, as must be evident to your Excellency, I have to acquaint you, that I cannot accept any Terms but an unconditional Surrender. My Honour and Character not allowing me to depart in any Way from my Promises, I therefore inform you, that my Orders from the Superior Council being positive with respect to the Surrender of the Squadron commanded by your Excellency, I cannot enter into any Conditions without previously consulting them. It is likewise my Duty to consult with the English Commanders, as, without their Consent, I cannot compromise myself.

For these Reasons, I shall suspend my Attack, until I have dispatched those Two Expresses, availing myself however of the intermediate Time to prepare other Means for the Attack.

CHELSEA HOSPITAL.

July 9, 1808.

THESE are, by Order of the Right Honourable the Lords and others, Commissioners for managing the Affairs of the Royal Hospital at Chelsea, to give Notice, That all Out Pensioners belonging to the said Hospital, residing in London, or within Twenty-five Miles thereof, are required to appear personally and regimentally at the Secretary's Office, in the said Hospital, on the respective Days, and in their different Classes, according to their several Rates of Pension, as undermentioned; when Attendance will be given from Nine o'Clock in the Morning until Three in the Afternoon, for the

Payment of Half a Year's Pension in Advance, to Christmas next, with an Augmentation in Proportion to their Disability and Length of Service, according to His Majesty's new Regulations in their Favour.

On Thursday, the 14th of July.

The Pensioners at 6d. per Day, from the different Regiments of Cavalry, Foot Guards, 1st Regiment of Foot, to the 62d Regiment, inclusive.

On Friday, the 15th of July.

Those at 6d. per Day, from the 63d Regiment of Foot, with the remaining Regiments or Corps; as also the Pensioners at 9d. per Day, from the several Regiments of Cavalry, Foot Guards, the 1st Regiment of Foot, to the 69th inclusive.

On Saturday, the 16th of July.

Those at 9d. per Day, from the 70th Regiment of Foot, with the remaining Regiments or Corps; as also the Pensioners at 1s. per Day, from all the Regiments of Cavalry, the 1st and Coldstream Regiments of Foot Guards.

On Monday, the 18th of July.

Those at 1s. per Day, from the 3d Regiment of Foot Guards, the 1st Regiment of Foot, with all the remaining Regiments or Corps.

On Tuesday, the 19th of July.

Those Pensioners from any Regiment or Corps, at 1s. 0½d. 1s. 1d. 1s. 1½d. and 1s. 2d. per Day.

On Wednesday, the 20th of July.

Those at 1s. 2½d. and 1s. 3d. per Day.

On Thursday, the 21st of July.

Those at 1s. 3½d. per Day, with those of the different Rates, to 2s. per Day inclusive.

On Friday, the 22d of July.

Those at 2s. 0½d. per Day, and upwards; those from the Militia at 5d. per Day, with the Private Gentlemen who receive Annuities from the late 1st and 2d Troops of Horse Guards.

And that all Out Pensioners belonging to the said Hospital, who live at a greater Distance than Twenty-five Miles from London, and those in Scotland and Ireland, are hereby required and commanded, after the 25th Day of December next, and after every succeeding 25th of June and 25th of December, until further Orders, to apply to, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in the Neighbourhood where they reside, and make the following Affidavit, which the said Magistrate for the County, City, Borough, or Riding, before whom the Pensioner appears, will sign and date, viz.

" came before me, One of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of _____, and made Oath that he was admitted an Out-Pensioner of Chelsea Hospital on the _____ Day of _____ 17. (or 18), from the _____ Regiment of _____, commanded by _____; was then aged about _____ Years; served in the Army _____ Years; was discharged for _____, and that he is no otherwise provided for by the Public but as a Pensioner of the said Hospital, at _____ per Day, and now lives in the Parish of _____, in the County of _____.

" Sworn before me _____ this _____ Day of _____ 18."

The Affidavit, drawn according to the above Form,



sworn before, dated and attested by a Magistrate, is to be put up in a Cover, and sent by the General Post, directed thus: "To the Right Hon. the Paymaster-General of His Majesty's Land Forces, London," marking on the Cover, "Chelsea Pensioners' Affidavit," and Counterparts or Duplicates of the said Affidavits are to be reserved by the Out Pensioners respectively, to be exhibited to such Persons as shall be directed to pay them, that they may be satisfied that all such as may claim Out-Pensions are the real Persons entitled to receive the same.

And to the End that the Commissioners for the Affairs of Chelsea Hospital may be satisfied that the Pensioners are the same Persons who have passed their Examination, it is hereby further directed, that such of them who have served in, and have been discharged from, any of the Regiments, or Independent Companies of Invalids, or Royal Veteran Battalions, are not to mention in their Affidavits such Regiment or Company of Invalids, or Royal Veteran Battalions, in which they served last, but the Regiment, Troop, or Corps of the Army from which they were first discharged and recommended, and received at Chelsea Hospital.

The Pensioners are particularly to take Notice, that the Half-yearly Payments after Midsummer, are regulated, as to the Place of Payment, by the Musters at Chelsea, or the Affidavits sent as above, after the Christmas preceding; and that the Christmas Payment is in the like Manner regulated by the Musters or Affidavits after the Midsummer preceding.

It is also ordered and directed, that no Person who shall change the Place of his Abode given in at his Muster, or specified in his Affidavit aforesaid; and who may apply for his Pension, (excepting to the Officers of Excise nearest such Place of Abode,) shall receive the same, unless it appears, by the Certificate of respectable Persons, that such Removal was through unavoidable Necessity, which he or they could not foresee or prevent.

And that if any Pensioner shall fraudulently attempt to receive a double Payment of the Pension, either at Chelsea or at different Places, he shall be struck off the Lists.

Lastly, it is notified, that none will be entered upon the Pay Lists of the said Hospital, or be entitled to receive any Benefit therefrom, who shall not act agreeably to these Orders and Directions, particularly in sending their Half-Yearly Affidavits to the Paymaster-General, as above directed, and to no other Office; which several of the Pensioners have of late either neglected to do, or sent them irregularly to other Departments.

Stamp-Office, July 8, 1808.

Notice is hereby given, that by an Act, passed at the Close of the late Session of Parliament, the Stamp Duties on Deeds, Law Proceedings, and other written Instruments, and the Duties on Legacies and Successions to personal Estate upon Intestacies, now payable in Great Britain, are repealed from and after the 10th Day of October next, and other Duties are granted in lieu thereof, to commence immediately after that Day.

The new Duties are of the like Nature, and in general of the same Amount, with the present

Duties; but a more precise and accurate Description is given of the Instruments on which they attach. There are some Duties altogether new, and some new in Amount; of which the principal ones are, *ad valorem* Duties on Conveyances upon the Sale of any Property, according to the Amount of the Purchase-Money; increased Duties on Promissory Notes allowed to be re-issued; and a Duty on Licences to be taken out Yearly by Bankers and others issuing such Promissory Notes. There is also a Duty on Policies of Insurance on Lives, and on Three or Four Law Proceedings, not now charged. The Duties on Mortgages for small Sums, and on Conveyances on the Sale of Property of small Value, are less than at present. The Duties are contained in a Schedule, in which the Instruments charged are classed and alphabetically arranged, with numerous References, so as to afford a complete Table of Duties in the most convenient and practical Form, and to supersede the Necessity of those Compilations to which the Profession of the Law and the Public have hitherto found it expedient to resort. The Schedule is also framed so as not to admit of an Abridgment that can be safely relied upon. The Commissioners therefore recommend it to the Profession, and others whom it may concern, to look only to the Schedule itself.

The Act contains special Provisions for securing the Duties on Conveyances on the Sale of Property, on Bills of Exchange, and Drafts on Bankers post-dated, or issued beyond Ten Miles from the Banker's Residence, and on Instruments relating to Copyhold Estates, which the Commissioners recommend to the Notice and Attention of Purchasers and Sellers, Attornies, Solicitors, Bankers, Stewards of Manors, and others, that they may not incur Penalties, which it will be the Duty of the Commissioners to enforce. The Provisions respecting Drafts on Bankers take effect after One Month from the passing of the Act.

LEGACY DUTY.

It being apprehended that many Persons may have neglected to pay the Duties on Legacies, and on Residues of personal Estate given by Will, or devolved to next of Kin upon Intestacies, within the Time prescribed by Law, through Ignorance or Inadvertence, or from accidental or unavoidable Causes; the Act authorizes the Commissioners to remit the Penalties which may have been incurred in such Cases, provided the Duty shall be paid on or before the 31st Day of January 1809. In giving Notice of this Provision of the Act, the Commissioners think it right also to state, that Prosecutions in the Exchequer will be instituted against those Persons who shall not take the Benefit of it, as well as against those who shall fail to pay the Duties which may hereafter become due, within the Time allowed by Law; an Abstract of Wills proved and Administrations granted being returned to the Commissioners from the several Ecclesiastical Courts, for the Purpose of discovering Defaulters.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, between the Hours of Nine and Ten o'Clock on the Evening of Wednesday the 18th of May last, as

Mr. Humphreys, of Hever Castle, in the County of Kent, Farmer, was returning home, he was attacked by a Footpad at a Place called Four Elms, near his own House, who with violent Oaths demanded his Money, and, on Mr. Humphreys dismounting to defend himself, the Footpad shot at him, and the Ball passed through both Cheeks; he afterwards beat him with the Pistol, which broke his Jaws and fractured his Skull, and then robbed him; since which the said Mr. Humphreys has died of the Wounds he received;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in the said atrocious Murder and Robbery, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually shot and beat the said Mr. Humphreys) who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein; so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
