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AT the Court at the *Queen's Palace*, the 4th of July 1808,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty having taken into His Consideration the glorious Exertions of the Spanish Nation for the Deliverance of their Country from the Tyranny and Usurpation of France, and the Assurances which His Majesty has received from several of the Provinces of Spain, of their friendly Disposition towards this Kingdom; His Majesty is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered;

First, That all Hostilities against Spain on the Part of His Majesty shall immediately cease.

Secondly, That the Blockade of all the Ports of Spain, except such as may be still in the Possession or under Controul of France, shall be forthwith raised.

Thirdly, That all Ships and Vessels belonging to Spain shall have free Admission into the Ports of His Majesty's Dominions, as before the present Hostilities.

Fourthly, That all Ships and Vessels belonging to Spain, which shall be met at Sea by His Majesty's Ships and Cruizers, shall be treated in the same Manner as the Ships of States in Amity with His Majesty, and shall be suffered to carry on any Trade now considered by His Majesty to be lawfully carried on by Neutral Ships.

Fifthly, That all Vessels and Goods belonging to Persons residing in the Spanish Colonies, which shall be detained by any of His Majesty's Cruizers after the Date hereof, shall be brought into Port, and shall be carefully preserved in safe Custody, to await His Majesty's further Pleasure, until it shall be known whether the said Colonies, or any of them, in which the Owners of such Ships and Goods reside, shall have made common Cause with Spain against the Power of France.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts

of Vice-Admiralty, are to take such Measures herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The King has been pleased to nominate, present, and appoint Doctor Andrew Grant to be First Minister of the Cannongate Church, in the Presbytery and County of Edinburgh, void by the Death of Mr. Robert Walker.

The King has been pleased to grant unto John Ludford, of Ansley-Hall, in the County of Warwick, Esq; D. C. L. (Son and Heir of John Ludford, late of the same Place, Esq; deceased, by Juliana his Wife, Third and youngest Daughter of Sir Richard Newdigate, of Arbury, in the County of Warwick, and of Harefield, in the County of Middlesex, Bart. deceased, which last-mentioned John was the Son of Samuel Bracebridge, eldest Son of the Rev. Thomas Bracebridge, of Kettleby, in the County of Leicester, descended from the ancient Family of Bracebridge of Kingsbury, in the said County of Warwick, by Jane his Wife, Daughter of John Ludford, of Ansley-Hall aforesaid,) His Royal Licence and Authority, that he and his Issue may continue to use the Surname and Arms of Ludford, assumed by his said Grandfather; and that he and they may bear the Name of Newdigate, or Newdegate, as originally spelt, before that of Ludford, and the Arms of Ludford and Newdigate, or Newdegate, quarterly, Ludford in the first Quarter, out of affectionate Regard for his late Mother, and Respect for the Memory of his maternal Grandfather the said Sir Richard Newdigate, whose male
