shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or feduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to fome other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Brizain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of fuch Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all fuch Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Seffion in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majefty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall sind on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominious of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools to seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly fold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and fccure the fame.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ircland knowingly permit any of the faid Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Veffel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Veffel belongs to His Majetty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly fuffer the fame to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforefaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office

under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty. BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Perfons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, I'tensil, or Implement whatfoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part

or Parts of fuch Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any fuch Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and sending such Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually wrote the same) who shall difcover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted HAWKESBURY.

And, as a further Eucouragement, a Reward of FIFTY GUINEAS is bereby offered by the Magistrates acting for the Division of Washington, and a like Sum by Mr. William Hayward, to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as is before excepted) to be paid on the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders by Mr. G. P. Cooke, Attorney at Law, Watlington.
