AT the Court at the *Queen's Palace*, the 27th of July 1808,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to permit Goods secured in Warehouses in the Part of London to be removed to the Out Ports for Exportation to any Part of Europe; for empowering His Majesty to direct that Licences, which His Majesty is authorized to grant under His Sign Manual, may be granted by one of the Principal Secretaries of State; and for enabling His Majesty to permit the Exportation of Goods in Vessels of less Burthen than are now allowed by Law during the present Hostilities, and until One Month after the Signature of the preliminary Articles of Peace;" it is enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty by Order in Council, or by His Royal Proclamation, to direct that all or any such Licences as, by virtue of any Act of Parliament or otherwise, His Majesty may lawfully grant under His Sign Manual, shall and may be granted by one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in pursuance of an Order of Council specially authorizing the Grant of such Licences, a Duplicate of which Order shall in all Cases be annexed to such Licences; His Majesty having taken the same into His Royal Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order and direct, and it is hereby ordered and directed, that all Licences which by virtue of any Acts of Parliament or otherwise His Majesty may lawfully grant under His Sign Manual touching, concerning, or in any Manner relating to Trade, Commerce, or Navigation, shall and may hereafter, and until further Order, be granted by either of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in pursuance of any Order in Council specially authorizing the Grant of such Licences; and that all Licences so granted, and having a Duplicate of such Order in Council annexed thereto, shall be as valid, and have as full Force and Effect, as if such Licences had been granted under His Majesty's Sign Manual; provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed or taken to invalidate, or in any Manner to affect any Licences which His Majesty shall think

proper to grant under His Royal Sign Manual; but every such Licence so granted shall be of the same Force and Effect as if this Order had not been made.

Copy of a Letter from Vice Admiral Sir James Saumarez, Bart. and K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Baltic, to the Hon. W. W. Pole, dated on board the *Victory*, off *Moon Island*, July 15, 1808.

S I R,

HEREWITH inclose, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Copy of a Letter transmitted to me by Rear-Admiral Sir Samuel Hood, from Captain Bathurst, of His Majesty's Ship *Salfette*, stating his having chased a Sloop of War, under Russian Colours, into *Revel*, and having captured His Russian Majesty's Cutter *Apith*.

I have directed the Cutter to be surveyed and valued, being represented to be in every Respect fit for His Majesty's Service; and as Vessels of this Class are particularly required upon this Station, I propose to appoint an Officer to command her, and to man her with the Men lately exchanged from *Copenhagen*. His Majesty's Ship Salfette, off Norgen Island, June 24, 1808.

S I R,

I BEG Leave to inform you, that having Yesterday, in His Majesty's Ship *Salfette*, chased a Sloop of War under Russian Colours to *Revel*, where a Frigate and a Brig were laying, and taken a Galliot partly laden with Spirits, that was at Anchor in the Roads, in coming out with the latter saw a Cutter off the North End of *Norgen Island*, coming down with Signals up, who soon after hauled her Wind for the Land; made all Sail in chase, and closed with her at half past Eight P. M. but on opposite Tacks, and the Wind dying away at the Time she crossed us with her Sweeps out, and returned our Fire, by which, I am sorry I have to say, one, a Marine, was killed; the Wind continuing very light, and the Cutter pulling away with her Sweeps, prevented our closing again with her for some Time,

but a sudden Squall of a few Minutes brought the Ship up with her about Ten o'Clock; yet as they were near the Shore, and it just then setting in dark, they persevered in their Endeavours to escape after they were completely under and exposed to the Fire of most of our Guns; but being hailed to lay in their Sweeps, at a quarter past Ten they did so, as it was then impossible for them to get away.

On taking Possession she proved to be His Russian Majesty's Cutter Apith, commanded by Lieutenant G. C. Novelski, mounting Fourteen Guns, Twelve-Pounders, Carronades, and manned with Sixty-one Men, Four of whom were killed, the Commander and Seven wounded. She left Sweaborg at Noon the same Day, to join the Sloop of War we had chased in the Morning, belonging to a Squadron of Four Frigates and Eight Sloops stationed there.

The Cutter is a very fine Vessel, about Two Years old, exceedingly well fitted, and found in every Thing.

SIR,

IN the Absence of Vice Admiral Campbell, I have the Honour to transmit, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter addressed to him by Captain Maxwell, of His Majesty's Sloop Royalist, dated the 16th Instant, acquainting him with his having captured the Danish Schooner Privateer Ariltides, after a Chace of Three Hours.

SIR,

I HAVE the Pleasure to acquaint you of His Majesty's Sloop Royalist, under my Command, having captured the Danish Schooner Privateer Ariltides, after a Chace of Three Hours. She is a remarkable fine Vessel, American built, pierced for Sixteen Guns, having only Six mounted, and Forty-one Men. She sailed in the Morning from Flodstrand, victualled and stored for Five Months, intending to cruise on the Coast of Scotland. At the Time I fell in with him he was engaging an English Packet, which Vessel must have been captured had it not been for the timely Aid of His Majesty's Sloop under my Command.

MURDER.
FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS REWARD.

Whitehall, July 30, 1808.

Whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, that, about Twelve o'Clock on the Night of the 22d Instant, the Boats of the Nimble Cutter and Asp Luggar, in the Service of His Majesty's Customs, fell in with and drove on Shore, at the North End of Deal, Two Smuggling Ten-Oared Gallies; and that, on the Approach of the Revenue Boats, the Smugglers, who were assembled on the Beach, together with others who had landed from the said Gallies, commenced a very heavy Discharge of Muskets and Blunderbusses on the Crews of the Revenue Boats, whereby Robert Bruce, a Mariner of the Nimble, and John Ellis, a Mariner of the Asp, were shot dead, and John Wilson and William Burwich, Two other Mariners, were dangerously wounded;

His Majesty, for promoting the Discovery of the Persons guilty of the aforesaid Murder and Felony, is graciously pleased hereby to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of the Persons concerned therein (save those that actually fired) who will discover any one or more of his Accomplices, so that he or they may be convicted thereof.

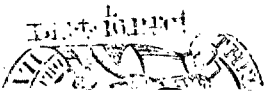

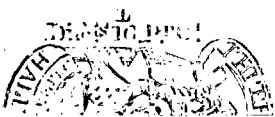
