

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble, dutiful, and loyal Address of the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Clergy, Freeholders, and other Inhabitants of the County of Anglesey, assembled in pursuance of Notice from the High Sheriff of the said County, at Llangefni, on the 12th Day of August 1808.

WE, your Majesty's loyal Subjects, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Clergy, Freeholders, and other Inhabitants of the County of Anglesey, cannot behold the Patriots of Spain and Portugal in Arms against the Tyrant of the Continent, without feeling an anxious Desire humbly to address your Majesty upon an Event so honourable to them, and so auspicious to the Liberties of Europe.

The Peace which your Majesty has upon this unforeseen Occurrence granted to Spain, evinces a Magnanimity that raises in us no less Gratitude and Admiration, than has been excited by the generous Aid and liberal Support which have been afforded by your Majesty to the Patriots of that Kingdom and of Portugal, in the Defence of their Laws, their Religion, and the Rights of their hereditary Sovereigns, against the Usurpation of a foreign Foe.

We respectfully tender our Congratulations to your Majesty on the commercial Intercourse which has ensued between your Subjects and those of the lawful Sovereigns of Spain and Portugal. From this Recurrence to their ancient Ally we anticipate mutual Benefits; and trust that the patriotic Resolution which they have avowed, to cast off a foreign Yoke, will not only preserve their Independence, but lead to the Emancipation of the Continent, and to the Restoration of the Peace of Europe.

Arduous indeed is the Contest in which the Spanish and Portuguese Patriots have been involved by the Perfidy and Usurpation of the Ruler of France; but, aided by your Majesty's powerful Co-operation, and relying on that Providence which protects the oppressed, they will, we trust, ultimately triumph; excite a kindred Spirit in the Nations which he yet retains in ignominious Bondage, and animate them by so heroic an Example to cast off his Chains, and assert their Freedom.

But whatever Success they may derive, or whatever Benefits may result to the general Liberties of Europe, from the heroic Resistance to a treacherous Invader, which now animates the Patriots of Spain and Portugal, we must ever glory in the Ardour with which your Majesty's Forces embark in their Defence, and exult in the generous Sympathy and enthusiastic Admiration which their noble Efforts have excited in every British Heart.

And we ardently pray that the wise Disposer of all Events may not only crown with Success your Majesty's generous and active Assistance to Two insulted Kingdoms, but also grant to your Majesty the Glory and Happiness of restoring solid Peace and Tranquillity to Europe and to the World.
