We entreat your Majefty will be pleafed to accept our most unfeigned Thanks for the difinterested and liberal Syftem of Policy by which your Councils appear to be actuated on an Occalion fo congenial to the Hearts of Britons; and we firmly truft that, under Divine Providence, your Majetty's Endeavours to check fuch unprincipled and lawlefs Aggreffions will be fully crowned with Succefs, and that the Nations of Europe will, in the End, be completely emancipated from the galling and profilgate Defpotifm with which many of them are at prefent fo difgracefully overpowered.

We beg Leave to affure your Majefty that we will with the greatest Cheerfulness contribute every Thing in our Power to the Success of a Caufe to honourable to human Nature, and fo dear to all who have the good Fortune to live in this Land of Freedom.

The humble Address of the Gentlemen, Clergy, Merchants, and other principal Inhabitants of the Borough of Leeds, in Town's Meeting affembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE; your Majefty's loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Gentlemen, Clergy, Merchants, and other principal Inhabitants of the Borough of Leeds, in Town's Meeting this Day affembled, beg Leave to appproach the Throne with Sentiments of the livelielt Joy and Exultation, and with heartfelt Congratula-tions on the Prospect afforded, by the late glorious Events in Spain, of the speedy Emancipation of a large Portion of the Continent of Europe from ignominious Slavery, and the most degrading infulting Tyranny and Oppression.

We owe this exhilarating Prospect, this cheering Hope of an approaching End to the horrible Reign of Terror, Perfidy, Pillage, and Bloodshed; and the Anticipation of the joyful Return of Order, Jultice, Laws, Liberty, and Security of Property on the European Continent, in an eminent Degree, to the i

paternal Care, Steadineis, and Firmnels of your Majelly, and the calightened Policy, Fortitude, and Patriotilm of your Majefly's Government on the prefent Occasion.

The Independence of Nations, civil Order, and general Security of Property, are Objects of peculiar Importance to this manufacturing and commercial Part of your Majefty's Dominions; we therefore emphatically entreat your Majelly gracioully to accept our unfeigned Thanks for the prompt and vigorous Affiltance fo magnanimoully and difintereitedly extended by your Majefty to the People of Spain and Portugal, (bereft of their Sovereigns by lawlels Power and infidious Artifice,) in their noble Efforts against the common Scourge and Defroyer of civilized Man.

We further, most respectfully, beg Leave to assure your Majefty of our unfhaken Attachment to your Majefty's facred Perfon and Family ; of our Confidence in the Wildom, Energy, and patilotic Meafures of your Majelly's Councils : of our Conviction that. there is no Safety nor rational Hope of folid Peace, but in determined Refiftance to the faithlefs, inexorable Tyrant of the Age; and of our firm Refolution to contribute, by every Exertion in our Power, to the Honour of your Majelty's Crown, and the Prefervation of the invaluable Rights and Privileges which we, amidit the Wreck of furrounding Nations, continue to enjoy.

We fervently pray that Almighty God may crown your Majelty's Efforts, aud the glorious Exertions of the loyal Spaniards and Portuguele, with complete Succefs; that He may kindle a fimilar ardent Spirit of Liberty and Patriotifm throughout all the humbled defolated States of the Continent ; and long continue to blefs this favoured Land with the mild and beneficent Reign of your Majefty.

ICE-ADMIRAL RUSSELL has transmitted to the Honourable William Wellesley Pole, Letters from Captain Cochrane, of His Majefty's Ship Alexandria, and Lieutenant Sir George Mouat Keith, of the Redbreatt Gun-Veffel, stating that, on the 9th and 11th Inflant, Two Gun-Boats, manned by Detachments from the Alexandria, Rofamond Sloop, and Redbreaft, captured in the Rivers Jade and Wefer, the Mofin Danish Privateer, of One Four-Pounder and Eleven Men ; and a Dutch Gun-Boat, No. 206, carrying One long Eighteen-Pounder and Two Four-Pounders, with a Complement of Twenty Men, commanded by Lieutenant Henry Meyer, of the Dutch Navy.

The Captures were made without any Lofs on cither Side.
