THE following Addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkelbury, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Lordship presented to the King; which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the Queen's County, beg Leave humbly to approach your Throne with Sentiments of the most affectionate Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government.

We are defirous of expressing to your Majesty the Indignation which we feel at the late atrocious Attempt of the Ruler of France (the common Enemy of all free and independent States) upon the Rights and Liberties of the Spanish Nation.

Rights and Liberties of the Spanish Nation.
The noble and heroic Manner in which the Patriots of Spain have refisled the Attack upon their Monarchy and Independence, and the successful Efforts which they have already made towards expelling the Armies of France, have excited in us the highest Sentiments of Admiration, and given us a lively Hope, that the Cause of the Spaniards may be ultimately triumphant, the Integrity of the Spanish Monarchy may be maintained, and the Prosperity and Tranquillity of Spain secured in friendly Alliance with your Majesty.

We are impressed with Sentiments of the most fervent Gratitude, by the Magner in which your Majesty has recognized the Spanish Nation as a Friend and Ally against the Common Enemy; and by your gracious Declaration, that you had no other Object than that of preserving unimpaired the Integrity and Independence of the Spanish

We are anxious to lay at the Foot of your Majesty's Throne the earliest Declaration of our firm Reliance upon the Energy and Wisdom of your Majesty, and our consident Hope, that no Exertion will be omitted to affist and promote the glorious Cause that your Majesty has so justly and so nobly espoused.

We beg Leave with all Humility to assure your Majesty, that we shall with the most enthusiastic Zeal be ready to make any Sacrifices that may be deemed necessary to enable your Majesty to proceed in the great Work you have so magnanimously commenced.

It is our earnest Hope and Prayer, that the patriotic Struggle in which the Spanish Nation is at present engaged, supported by your Majesty's Arma and the Resources of the United Kingdom of Great, Britain and Ireland, may, under Divine Providence, not only tend to establish the Independence and Integrity of the Spanish Monarchy, but finally restore Liberty, and Order to the oppressed Nations of Europe, and lead to the inestimable Blessings of an honourable, secure and lasting Peace.
