The Humble Address of the Grand Jury, for the Town and Burrough of Southwark, at the general Sessions of the Peace, holden there on Monday the 16th of May, 1681.

To the Kings mest Excellent Majesty.
DREAD SIR,

E Your Majesties truly Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, the Grand Jury of this Tour antient Burrough, having first Humbly begged Your Majesty to be i.ve, that our apprehensions of the Happiness we enjoy, through Tour Majesties Princely Care and Paternal Affection towards us, have always been such as become the best Subjects to Enterta n under the benigne instrunces of the most Propitious and Indulgent Monarch, doe further implore Your Majesty to accept of our most prostrate acknowledgments of the Royal Grace and Favour of Your Majesties late Declaration, and to permit us to Express how lensible net are if our living under the most desirable Government in the world.

The Protestant Religion as Established by Law is so dear to us, and our condition by the Provision of the stated Laws of the Kingdom is rendred so easie, that though we have ever hitherto in all Duty rested silently satisfied in Your Majesties Zeal for both; yes now, if it may please Your Majesty, we can no longer forbear to Declare to Your Majesty, and Publish to all the World, our grateful Sence of Your Majesties so solemn, so condescending, and so gracious a sublication of Your Resolutions to Maintain the one, and Rule by the other, thereby removing all the just fears and jealousies that might arise from the Practices of uzdermining Patists,

and factious Republicans.

Tour Majesties Gracious Premise of calling frequent Parliaments, is so transcendent an Obligation upon us, who are resolved to be the same Loyal Subjects in the Intervals of Parliaments, as during their Session; that whenever Your Majesties Wisdom and Providence shall appoint an Election we shall take all possible care to choose such Representatives, as shall comply with Your Majesties Designs of extinpating Popery, and maintaining the Established Religion of the Church of England, and who shall likewise be ready to present Your Majests with such Supplies, as the Dignity of the Crown, and the necessities of

the Government shall require.

Tour Majesty is pleased to remind us-of the late Rebellion, in a manner so obliging, and for an end so good, as gives a most undeniable Testimony of Your Majesties generous Oblivion of the Injustice therein done to Your Self, and that Your Royal Memory retains only a compassionate impression of the Mileries thereby brought upon Your Subjects, so that should we not now yield our selves up as the Conquift of Your Majesties Goodness, and sit down contented with our own Happiness, but contrary to all Your Maj-sties Desi es and Counsels, fall into the like Guilt and Mischief again, we should be not only the most ungrateful, but the most unpittied People in the World. And therefore as we Your Majesties ever Loyal Subjects do for our parts with Shame and Sorrow reflest upon the former miscarriages and calamities, and with the utmost detestation and borror tremble at the thoughts of ever feeing the IPe a second time; so we doubt not but that Mu tundes of deluded and missed Men bave upon the occasion of Your Majesties Declaration, so effectually considered and recollected the several stepsand advances by which they weresbetrared into thoje confusions, as to be by this time fully convinced that true and steady Loyalts is the surest foundation of the Kingdoms Policity.

To this Maxim we Declare, that we do at present firmly stand, and that by it we will always aft, beseching Tour Majesty to be assured, that our Lives and Fortunes lye at Your Royal feet, and that we will upon all occasions, be ready to Sacrifice them, both in defence of Tour Majesties Sacred Person, and the Establish'd Government of Church and State.
