Copy of a Letter from Vice Admiral Sir James Saumarez, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Baltic, to the Hon. W. W. Pole, dated on board the Victory, off Gathland, the 27th of August 1808.

SIR,

HEREWITH I inclose a Letter I have received from Captain Mason, late commanding His Majesty's Ship Daphne, stating the Capture of His Danish Majesty's Schooner Acutif, which you will please to lay before the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

His Majesty's Ship Daphne, off Hartfalls, 8th August 1808.

SIR,

I HAVE the Pleasure to inform you, that His Majesty's Ship under my Command, this Morning, captured the Acutif Schooner, belonging to His Danish Majesty, after a Chase of Six Hours. She is commanded by E. Anderlon, Second Lieutenant in the Danish Service, and is pierced for Twelve Guns, but had only Eight mounted, long Three-Pounders, Two of which she threw overboard in the Chase. She was close to the Shore when we took her. She sailed from Christiansand the 5th, in Company with a small Cutter of Four Guns, which we drove on Shore after taking Possession of the Schooner.

**PROCLAMATION** for pardoning Deserters from  
His Majesty's Regular Land Forces.

*War-Office, August 25, 1808.*

**WHEREAS** it has been represented to the  
King, that there are at this Time several  
Deserters from the different Regular Corps in His  
Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to  
return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's

gracious Pardon, and that such an Instance of His  
Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon  
their future Behaviour; His Majesty has been gra-  
ciously pleased to grant His Free Pardon to all De-  
serters from His Regular Land Forces, who shall  
surrender themselves on or before the Twenty-fourth  
Day of October, to the Commanding Officer of any  
Regiment, or to any of the Superintending Field  
Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose Stations  
are mentioned in the Margin herewith,  
or to the Commandant of the Army  
Depôt in the Isle of Wight.

Such Deserters, if Able-bodied  
Men, and fit for Service, shall be sent  
to the Regiments from which they  
respectively deserted, or be appointed  
to such Regiments in the United  
Kingdom as His Majesty may be  
pleased to command; and, when so  
placed, shall not be liable to be claim-  
ed by any other Corps to which they  
may formerly have belonged.  
And whereas many of the said  
Deserters may have enlisted in other  
Regular Corps, and are now serving  
therein, His Majesty is graciously  
pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of  
this Pardon; and to direct that they shall continue  
to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, upon  
declaring themselves to their respective Commanding  
Officers on or before the Twenty-fourth of October  
next, and they shall not be liable at any future Time  
to be claimed by the Regiments in which they for-  
merly served.

The Magistrate to whom any Deserter from His  
Majesty's Regular Forces may surrender himself, is  
authorized and required to certify the Day on which  
such Deserter surrendered himself; which Certificate  
is to continue in Force until the Arrival of the De-  
serter at the Head-Quarters of the nearest Military  
Post, provided he proceed at the Rate of Ten Miles  
a Day, unless prevented by Sickness, to be certified  
by some Medical Practitioner on the Back of the  
Magistrate's Certificate, or to be otherwise proved to  
the Satisfaction of the Officer commanding at such  
Military Post.

And, with a View to prevent as far as possible all  
Soldiers from Desertion after these His Majesty's  
most gracious Intentions shall be made known, His  
Majesty has been pleased to command, that the  
Name of every Soldier who may hereafter desert  
shall be transmitted, through the Secretary at War,  
to the Church Wardens of the Parishes to which  
the Deserters belong, in order that their Names  
may be exposed to public View in the Church, or  
such other conspicuous Place as may render it im-  
possible for Men, who have been guilty of this  
Crime, to return Home to their Friends, on whom  
they have brought Disgrace by their Misconduct,  
without immediate Detection; and His Majesty has  
further commanded that this Measure shall be made  
public, that every Soldier may be assured that the  
greatest Exertions will be used for the Apprehen-  
sion of any Man who may hereafter desert, and that  
those who have already been guilty of that Crime  
may be aware of the daily Risk they incur of De-  
tection, and of the most severe Punishment, if they  
do not immediately avail themselves of the Pardon

held out in this His Majesty's most gracious Proclamation.

Any Soldier who may desert after these His Majesty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

It is to be clearly understood, that this Proclamation of Pardon is intended to include all Deserters from the Army of Reserve and Additional Force Act, but not to extend to any Deserter from His Majesty's Militia Forces.

BY THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF  
HIS MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to allow for Two Years, from and after the passing of this Act, an additional Bounty on Double Refined Sugar, and to extend former Bounties on other Refined Sugar, to such as shall be pounded, crashed, or broken; and to allow for One Year certain Bounties on British Plantation Raw Sugar exported;" reciting, That whereas by the Laws now in force in Great Britain and Ireland respectively, it is required that Refined Sugar exported for the Bounties shall be in Lumps or Loaves complete and whole; and that it is expedient that the said Bounties shall be continued to be allowed and paid on the Exportation of the same from the Ports of London and Dublin, although such Lumps or Loaves may be pounded, crashed, or broken; it is enacted, that on the due Exportation of Refined Sugar for the Bounties under those Laws, the same Bounties respectively shall be allowed and paid under the Provisions and Regulations of those Acts, on such Lumps and Loaves as may be pounded, crashed, or broken under the Regulations of this Act: And whereas by the said Act it is further enacted, That whenever it shall be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury for the Time being, in Great Britain or Ireland respectively, that proper Refindries are established and carried on at or near to any Port of the United Kingdom, to which it would be safe in their Judgment to extend the Benefit granted by this Act to the Ports of London and Dublin, it shall and may be lawful for the Lord High Treasurer, or the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, in Great Britain or Ireland respectively, to declare that the Regulations of this Act shall be extended to such Port, provided that no Bounty shall be paid or allowed upon Refined Sugar or Candy exported from any such Port, unless and until the Lord High Treasurer, or the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, in Great Britain or Ireland respectively, shall have signified their Approbation thereof by Publication in the London or Dublin Gazette respectively; and from and after the Day mentioned in such Publication, all and every the Provisions, Powers, Authorities, Penalties, Forfeitures, Regulations, Acts, Matters, and Things in this Act contained, or any Way relating to the Allowance of the Bounties on such Lump or Loaf Sugar pounded, crashed, or broken, or on Sugar

Candy, in pursuance thereof, shall extend and be construed to extend to the Port or Ports named in such Order, in like Manner, in every Respect, and as fully and amply to all Intents and Purposes, as if such Port or Ports had been expressly named in this Act:

And whereas it has been made appear to our Satisfaction that proper Refindries are established and carried on in the Ports of Port Glasgow and Greenock, in that Part of the United Kingdom called Scotland, and it is in our Judgment safe to extend to the said Port the Benefit granted by the said Act to the Ports of London and Dublin, we the undersigned Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury do therefore, pursuant to the said Act, hereby declare that the Regulations of the said Act shall, from the Day of the Date hereof, be extended to the said Ports of Port Glasgow and Greenock.

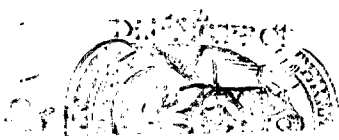
