Amity with His Majefty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all fuch Articles as aforefaid, that shall be imported with the proper Officers of the Cultoms at the Port where the fame shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in an Act palled in the Thirty-ninth Year of His prefent Majelty; and the Right Honourable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly. W. Fawkener.

Foreign Office, October 8, 1808. The King has been pleafed to nominate and appoint the Right Honourable John Hookham Frere to be His Majefty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minilter Plenipotentiary to His Catholic Majefty Ferdiuand the Seventh; and has been pleafed to direct him to refide in that Character at the Seat of the Central or Supreme Junta in Spain.

St. James's, October 5, 1808.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Sheriffs, and Common Council of the City of Cork.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

MAY it pleafe your Majesty, to permit us, the ^{1V1} Mayor, Sheriffs, and Members of the Common Council, in Common Council affembled, to lay at the Foot of the Throne, with the Warmth of grateful Affection, those Sentiments of Duty and Attachment which animate our Hearts towards your Majefty's Perfon and Government.

During the arduous Contest in which your Majetty has been engaged with that relentlefs Power whofe Modes of Mifchief are ever varying, we have beheld in you not alone the Protector of the British Empire, but the Affertor of the general Liberties of Mankind; and however high our Hearts may beat in this proud Day of British Fame, we feel them vibrate ftill higher on beholding our Morarch's wife and generous Conduct towards the Spanish Nation, affailed as it has been by the complicated Treachery of the Tyrant of France, whole pertidious Friendship proves more destructive than his bittereft Hoftility.

Such Magnanimity in our Sovereign recalls to our Minds the Memory of better Days, when the Powers of Europe were linked together in the Bonds of focial Order, when the Oppressor who would dare attempt to wreak his Vengeance on any individual State, was fure to find Enemies in the whole. And we fondly hope, that the Sovereigns and Nations of the Earth, animated by your Majetiy's glorious and difinterested Example, may lay alide all felfish Confideration, and unite in a generous

League to refcue the World from the Grafp of that remorfeleis Ufurper.

While we render Thanks to Almighty God, who has to often and to fignally given Victory to your Majely's Arms, fuffer us, Sire, humbly to congratulate you on the recent and fplendid Achievements of that Band of Heroes, commanded by our gallant Countryman Sir Arthur' Wellesley; and we trust that this falutary Lesson may not be thrown away on the Ruler of the French Nation, but that he may learn to moderate his-Ambition, and give Repole to the fuffering World; for it must teach him that there is yet left a mighty Empire, ready at all Times with Heart and Hand, to lend its Aid to humble the Proud and fuccour the Diffreffed.

Confiding in the Wildom and Energy of your Majelly's Councils, (of which we have had fuch abundant Proofs,) we beg Leave to affure your Majefty, that no Exertion of which we are capable fnall be wanting to aid the glorious Caule in which your Majelly is embarked.
