Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Lord Colling-awood, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Veffels in the Mediterranean, to the Honourable IV. W. Pole, dated on board the Ocean, off Cape Pallas, the 5th of September 1808.

SIR, INCLOSE, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, Two Letters which I have received from Captain Stewart, of His Majesty's Ship the Seahorse, dated the 6th and 8th of July, giving the Account of his having fallen in with a large Turkish Frigate and Corvette on the Evening of the 5th of that Month, off the Island of Scopolo, and, after a severe Action, taken the Badere Zaffer, a Turkish Frigate, of Fifty-two Guns and Five Hundred Men:—the Corvette was not seen in the Morning.

The Example which Captain Stewart has given in this Action of Gallantry and of Skill, by which his own Ship was so well preserved, while his Opponent was ruined, must be highly gratifying to their Lordships, and marks the highest State of Discipline of his Ship, and the Ability of the Officers who

His Majesty's Ship Seahorse, off Skyro, My Lord, July 6, 1808.

I HAVE the Honour to inform your Lordship, that Yesterday Evening we observed Two Turkish Men of War and a Galley coming round the East End of the Island of Scopolo, towards which we immediately made fail. On coming near enough to make out that they were both fingle decked Ships, I determined to bring them to Action, having every Confidence in the Officers and Crew of this Ship. The Action began at Half past Nine, the Turks going a little off the Wind under easy Sail, and continually endeavouring to run us on board; indeed I early saw that their chief Attention was directed to this Object and as the largest Ship and rected to this Object, and as the largest Ship appeared of great Force and full of Men, I kept this

Ship in a Position not to be boarded. At Ten o'Clock, observing a good Opportunity of more particularly attacking the small Ship to Advantage, particularly attacking the imail Ship to Advantage, we dropped alongfide of her, and after a Quarter of an Hour's hot Fire, at Half Piftol-Shot Diffance, her Fire having totally ceafed, we left her in a State of the greatest Diffress and Confusion, with her Sails mostly down, and just before we had left her the large Frigate, which, from having fallen a little the large Frigate, which, from having fallen a little to Leeward, had not been able to affift her Confort, had again got pretty close up, and the Action between us foon recommenced; still so obtlinate was the Refistance of the Turks, that it was not till a Quarter past One we rendered her a motionless Wreck. As they now would neither answer nor fire, I conceived it most prudent, knowing the Ch . racter of the People, to wait for Daylight to send on board her. At Daylight, observing her Colours upon the Stump of the Mizen-Mast, we poured a Broadside into her Stern, when she struck, and I had the Pleasure to take Possession of the Badere Zaffer, a very sine Frigate of the largest Dimenfions, carrying Fifty-two long Brass Guns, Twenty-four Pounders, on the Main-Deck, except Two, which are Forty-two Pounders, and Twelve-Pounders on the Quarter-Deck and Forestelle. She had a Complement of Five Hundred Men, and was a Complement of Pive Hundred Men, and was commanded by Captain Scanderli Kichuc Alli, who, I am informed, was only prevented by his own People from blowing her up. Her Lofs in killed and wounded is prodigious, One Hundred and Sixty-five killed and One Hundred and Ninety-five wounded; ours comparatively small, Five killed and Ten wounded. Our Mizen Mast fell soon after the Ten wounded. Our Mizen-Mast fell soon after the Action, which is the greatest Injury we have sustained. The other Ship was named the Ahs Fezan, carrying Twenty-sour Thirteen Pounders and Two Mortars, commanded by Captain Daragardi Alli, with a Complement of Two Hundred and Thirty Men. I understand they took most of the Men out of the Galley before the Action, and fent her away. Having now, my Lord, given you the Details of this Affair, there only remains the pleasant Office of recommending to you the Officers and Ship's Company, who, during a tedious Night Action, where much depended upon working the Sails as well as the Guns, behaved in a Manner to command my utmost Gratitude. The Disparity of Force, with the Loss in the Enemy's Ships, will prove the Greatness of their Exertions, to which I shall add, that Thirty Men were absent from the Ship. Mr. Downie, the First Lieutenant, is an Officer of Merit, Ability, and Experience; and I beg strongly to recommend him to your Lordship's Protection for Promotion. Mr. Lester, Master's-Mate, who has passed, is also very deserving of Promotion. Thomas Hully, Gunner's-Mate, and an excellent Man, acted as Gunner; and, from his Conduct, is very deserving of such a Situation.

I am now proceeding with the Prize for any Port I can get first into amongst the Islands, as it is with Disticulty we can keep her abovo Water.

On board His Mojesty's Sloop Kingsfisher, off the Coast of Caramania, Cape Blane bearing N. W. by N. My Lord, Ten Leagues, June 27, 1808. IT is with great Pleasure I have the Honour to

inform you, that, at Daylight this Morning, I faw a large Sail in the S. W. which I immediately went in chace of, and, with the Affiltance of the Sweeps, the Wind being very light, at Twelve o'Clock I had the Satisfaction of arriving up within Gun-shot of the Chace, who had hoisted French Colours, when I commenced firing on her, which she returned very warmly, and, after a running Fight of One Hour, the struck. She proves to be Le Hercule, a very fine new French Ship Letter of Marque, with a Cargo of Cotton on board, from Aleppo and Cyprus bound to Marseilles or Genoa, armed with Twelve Guns, Eighteens, Twelves, and Eights; manned with Fifty-seven Men; commanded by Monf. Gerome Cavassa, a Member of the Legion of Honour. I am happy in being able to fay that I have every Reason to be pleased with the steady, excellent Conduct displayed by Mr. R. Standish, First Lieutenant, the other Officers, and Ship's Company on this Occasion. I had but One Man slightly wounded, but suffered very much in the Yards and running Rigging; the Enemy had One Man killed and Three wounded.

Sopy of another Letter from Vice-Admiral Lord Collingwood, to the Honourable William Wellesley Pole, dated on board the Ocean, at Sea, the 1st of September 1808.

ITAVE the Pleasure to inclose, to be laid before my Lords' Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Copy of a Letter transmitted to me by Vice-Admiral Thornbrough from Captain Rosenhagen, of His Majesty's Ship the Volage, giving an Account of that Ship having captured, on the 28th of July last, the French Brig of War Requin, of Sixteen Guns, (pierced for Eighteen,) commanded by the Captain of Frigate Berar, with a Complement of One Hundred and Eight Men.

As this Veilel is represented to be nearly new, and fit for His Majesty's Service, I proposed causing her to be taken into it, if she is found to on Survey.

I also transmit a Letter, with its Inclosure, which I have received from the Honourable Captain Duncan, of His Majesty's Ship Porcupine, who on several former Occasions has praised, in the highest Terms, the Ability and Zeal evinced by Lieutenant Price, in conducting similar successful Enterprizes against the Enemy.

His Majesly's Ship Volage, Agincourt-SIR, Sound, 8th August 1808.

I HAVE the Honour to inform you, that I arrived here Yesterday Morning with Le Requin French Brig, of Sixteen Guns, and One Hundred and Eight Men, which I had the good Fortune to fall in with in the Morning of the 28th Ultimo, a little to the Northward of Corsica, and captured her, after a hard Chace of Nine Hours, in which her Boats, Boom, and Anchors were thrown overboard.

She is commanded by Capitaine de Frégate Berar, Member of the Legiou of Honour, and had left Ajaccio only the Morning before we fell in with her, having put in there on her Way from Algiers to Toulon, with Three Prizes taken on her Passage. She is a very fine Brig, pierced for Eighteen Guns, built at Rochfort only Fourteen. Months since, and is the same which the Wizard engaged some Time ago.

The Number of Priloners I have on board will make it necessary for me to go to Malta; but I

shall return to my Station without Delay.

His Majesty's Ship Porcupine, at Sea,

July 14, 1808. My Lord, 1 HAVE the Honour to inform your Lordship, that on the Morning of the 9th Instant, being off Mount Circello, on the Coast of Romania, I obferved Two French Gun-Boats, with a Merchant Vessel under Convoy, going alongshore to the West-ward; as the Ship was becalmed, I sent Lieutenaut Price with the Boats in Pursuit of them; after a Row of Eight Hours in a hot Sun, he drove the latter on Shore, and forced the Gun-Boats to take shelter under the Batteries of Port Dango. At this Time, seeing Three very suspicious Vessels coming down with a fresh Breeze from the Westward, I was obliged to recal him; but before we could cut them off, they also got into the same Harbour. Next Morning I observed that One of them, a large Polacre Ship, lay further out than the others, and having reconnoitred, thought it possible to take her; I was the more induced to try it, from a Wish to give a Check to the Trade along this Coast, which they think from their numerous Batteries they can carry on without Molestation. As soon as it was dark the Boats went in, under the Command of Lieutenant Price, and, from under the heaviest Fire I ever faw, brought her out. She carries Eight long Six-Pounder Guns, and had on board between Twenty and Thirty Men, from Hieres Bay, bound to Naples with Salt.

When I consider that this Vessel was moored to a Beach, lined with French Soldiers, within Piltol-Shot of Two Batteries and a Tower, and of Three Gun-Boats, carrying each a Twenty-four-Pounder and Thirty Men; that from the baffling Winds she was an Hour and Twenty Minutes before she got out of Range of Grape, and that the Enemy were at first perfectly prepared for the Attack, I cannot find Words to express my Admiration at the intrepid Conduct of all the Officers and Seamen and Marines employed in it.

I am fure that the Services of Lieutenant Price, he having been more than Thirty Times in Action with the Boats of this Ship fince October last, and his Sufferings on this Occasion, being severely wounded on the Head and Right Leg, will be a sufficient Excuse for my requesting, in the strongest Terms, that your Lordship will recommend this gallant Officer to the Consideration of the Lords of

BY THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HIS-MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled " An Act for permitting certain Goods imported into Great Britain to be secured in Warehouse without Payment of Duty;" it is, amongst other Things, enacted as follows: "That it shall be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Confignee or Confignees, of any of the Goods, Wares or Merchandize enumerated or deferibed in the Table hereunto annexed marked (A), and which shall be legally imported and brought into the Port of London, to lodge and secure the fame under the joint Locks of the Crown and the Merchant in any Warehouse or Warehouse situated Act :"

at the Isle of Dogs, and belonging to the West India Dock Company, without Payment at the Time of the first Entry of fuch Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, of the Duties of Customs or Excife due on the Importation thereof; subject, nevertheless, to the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions directed by this Act: Provided always, that no fuch Goods, Wares, or Merchandize thall be fo lodged or fecured, unless and until fuch Warehouses and other Works belonging, or to belong thereto, shall be so far completed, that, in the Judgment of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commisfioners of His Majelty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, the same shall be fit and proper in every Respect for the Reception of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and wherein the same may respectively be safely and securely deposited, and remain under the Regulations and Directions of this Aci; and the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, are hereby authorized and empowered, by Writing under his or their Hand or Hands, to certify and make known his or their Approbation of fuch Warehouses; which Certificate shall be published Three Times at the least in the London Gazette, and in Two or more public Morning Newspapers then usually circulated

And whereas by a Certificate under the Hands of Three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, bearing Date the 16th Day of March 1804, the faid Lords Commissioners did, in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, certify and make known, that the following Warehouses be-longing to the West India Dock Company, were so far completed, that, in their Judgment, the same were fit and proper in every Respect for the Reception of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize as are enumerated and described in the said Table annexed to the said Act of Parliament marked (A), and wherein the same might respectively be safely and se-curely deposited, and remain under the Regulations and Directions of the faid Act; viz. All those Thirteen Stacks of Warehouses adjoining each other, and fituate on the North Side of the large Dock belong-ing to the West India Dock Company at the Isle of Dogs, forming the complete Kange of Warehouses on the North Side of the faid Dock, from the West End to the East End thereof; and the faid Lords Commissioners did thereby declare their Approbation of the faid feveral Warehouses accordingly:

And whereas by the Ninth Section of the faid Act it is further provided and enacted as follows: "That if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, shall deem it expedient that the Provisions of this Act shall be extended to any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize not enumerated or described in either of the Tables to this Act annexed, and shall cause a List of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize to be published in the London Gazette, then and from theuceforth all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Restrictions of this Act shall extend, and be construed to extend, to fuch Goods, Wares, and Merchandize in every Respect, in as full and ample a Manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the faid Tables respectively at the Time of passing this

And whereas by another Certificate under the Hands of Three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, bearing Date the 26th Day of March 1805, the faid Lords Commissioners, pursuant and in Execution of the Powers velted in them in and by the faid Act, did thereby declare that it appeared to them to be expedient that the Provisions of the faid Act should be extended to Wines imported in Ships arriving from the West Indies (excepted in Table (B), annexed to the faid Act); and that all Wines imported in Ships arriving from the Well Indies, whether the same should have been shipped on board such Vessels in the West Indies, or elfewhere, might respectively be safely and securely deposited in all or any of the Thirteen Stacks of Warehouses, hereinbefore described, and remain therein under the Regulations and Directions of the faid Act; and the faid Lords Commissioners did further declare, that from and after the Publication of their Certificate in the London Gazette, conformable to the Directions of the faid Act, all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Rellifetions of the faid Act should extend, and be construed to extend, to all fuch Wines imported in Ships arriving from the West Indies, in every Respect in as full and ample a Manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in Table (A) annexed to the said Act at the Time of passing the same Act:

And whereas by another Certificate under the Hands of Three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, bearing Date the 5th Day of July 1805, the said Lords Commissioners did, in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, further certify and make known, that the following Warehouses, belonging to the West India Dock Company, were so far completed, that, in their Judgment, the fame were also fit and proper in every Refpect for the Reception of fuch Goods, Wares, and Merchandize as are enumerated and described in the faid Table annexed to the faid Act of Parliament marked (A), and in which Warehouses such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, including Wines as aforefaid, might respectively be safely and securely deposited, and remain under the Regulations and Directions of the said Act; viz. All those Two several Stacks of Warehouses situate on the South Side of the large Dock belonging to the West India Dock Company at the Isle of Dogs; and the said Lords Commissioners did thereby declare their Approba-tion of the said Two last-mentioned. Stacks of

Warehouses accordingly:

And whereas by another Certificate under the Hands of Three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, bearing Date the 3d Day of November 1806, the said Lords Commissioners did, in pursuance of the said Lords Commissioners did, in pursuance of the said Act, further certify and make known that the large Warehouse belonging to the said Company, No. 10, at the East End of the said Dock was so far completed, that, in their Judgment, the same was sit and proper for the Reception of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize as are enumerated and described in the said Table annexed to the said Act, and wherein the same might respectively be safely and securely deposited, and remain under the Regulations and Directions of the said Act; and the said Lords Commissioners did thereby declare their Approbation of the said last-mentioned Warehouse accordingly:

And whereas by another Certificate under the Majetty's Treasury for the Time being, the same


