West-Cowes, May 27.

Zurick, May 1 2. The Deputies fent from the City of Geneva, to the Diet at Araw, have orders to apply them-felves particularly to the feveral deputies from the Cantons of Berne, Zug. Friburg, and Soleure, togethet with the Refident from France, to give them a true information and account of the Original, and whole progress of affairs between the City, and the Duke of Savoy, the better to take of the

prejudice that might have been wrought in them by Monsieur Millet, and to endeavor to continue and encrease the good under Randing between these Cantons, and the Republique.

The Dukes forces quarterd about Rumilly and Annecy, begin to grow weary of the places where they lie; desiring to be employed in service of to march back again into Piedmont: Five of the new raised Troops of the Savoy horse are compleated and dispoted of into Quarters; The Officers of the other Companies are speedily to receive their moneys, to some and surnish up their Numbers, by which time we suppole we may make forme guelle at the defigns and intentions of that Duke: whose answer to the late letters fent to him from the Cantons, is daily expected.

Gologne, May 29. From Ertford we are told, that all Mayence and Saxe, and that by an agreement made between them, the former is to pay to the latter 100000 Rix-dollers in lieu of those Lands that belong to the City of Ertford, which is lest to the free disposal of the Blecter of Mayense, and that 33000 Rix lollers were paid at Leipzig the 25 in-Ant, as part of the fum agreed for.

There a eat present two French Ministers in the Court of his Highness the Elector of Mayence, one as Envoye, the other as Refilent, who arrived the 25 inftant, introduced in his Highnefs-Coach, who fo effectually deal with that Elector, that 'tis believed none of the forces intended to be lent from the Emperor, for the fuccor of the Spanish Neiber-

Vicana, May 22. His Imperial Majefty continues still at Laxemburg, His return kither being not expected before the leventh or eighth of June : Frequent Councills are there held, to confider, what is fittest to be done in this present conjurcture of Affairs , especially upon the late Invasion of the Low-Countreys by the French. 'Tis faid, the Emperour insends to fend fuccours to those Countreys, but, in what number is not yet known : H wever, the French Refident gives out, That his Matter intends not a Rupture, if he be not firft Provoked to it by the Spantards.

By a late Courrier from Spain, the Ambaffador from that Crown has received Orders to continue his Charge in this Court, and to receive the Fiefs and Investiture of the Dutchy of Milan and the Low Countrys,

Another Courrier is lately arrived from the Marquis de Ca fel Rodrigo, with a full relation of the French Mirch into and Defign upon the Spanifb Metherlands; with the large Pretentions of the King; against whom, he has already an Army of 20000. Men; but defires the affishance of the Emperour, for the carrying on the War sgainst fo powerful an In-

Alfatia is in great apprehenfions of the French Forces exected in those parts, of which they have made their humble Remonstrance to the Emperour; shewing the prejudice the Empire may receive, by the prevalency of the French, who are upon their March towards them. The Agent from Burgundy having much inlarged himself upon the same Subject; fearing much, least that Durchy may be suddenly surprised by them, it being comprehended within the pretentions of the King of France. Alli Sebelebi, with the Vifier of Buda's Aga ste not yet difmift 3 nor will be permitted to depart, till the Court be better fatished concerning the Turks resolution, in relation to little Commorra. In the mean while the Hungarians and Coffaques continue in Armes, having an eye to the Motion and Action of the Turks; being in readiness to oppose them,

in case they attempt any thing against the Peace.

From Eperies we are informed, That the Turks and Tartars are got into a body, and intend to make an irrur-tion into Poland; and, that the Count Solenni, who was thought to have succeeded in the place of Abaffi, was suspected by the Turks, not to have that Zeal for their Religion which he pretended to: upon which account, he has been publickly told; That, if he give then any farther cause to sufoct his Indifferency, as to the Mahometan Religion, he cannot expect less from them, than a perpetual Prison; and, his Commands to be bestow'd upon the Count Tekely: which argument, ('tis believ'd.) may sufficiently Convince him, and fix him a persect Mussel-man.

A Courrier, lately arrived from Poland, bas endeavoured to affure the Emperour, in the behalf of his Mafter, That nothing shall be wanting on that fi le, that he can contribute for the maintenance of Amiry, and good Correspondency with His Imperial Majefty; with a Promise to quit the French Intereft, which is also the fenfe of the Archbiftop of Gnefne, the Primate of that Kingdom. They fuddenly expect thereturn of their Ambaffsder from the Ottomen Court; and, with him, the Refolution of the Grand Seignior, ei her for War or Peace.

Hamburg, May 30. Letters from Warfaw of the 20th. Instant, feem full of Joy, for the good facces, and ending of the Diet; by which the Pesce and Tranquility of that Kingdom feems to have taken good root, and will p obably be dayly more effablisht: The main Points agreed to this S. flion, were, The Act against the propounding a Successor to that Crown, during the life of the present King ; and, the other, for Chimney, or Family-M ny, towards the payment of the Arrears of the Army; all other Affairs being referred to the next Diet, which will be called in Fanuary next: His Majefty hath, fince the ending of this Diet, been abroad to take the syr, and to divert Himfelf after His cares and troubles; The whole Kingdom is heartily defi ing He would again think of Marriage ; and, 'cis faid, that the Czar of Mufcour hath made some proposalls for a Daughter of His ; with whom He will give Smolenfko, Siviria, and that part of Ehranis He got in the late Wars, and at prefent enjoyes by the Treaty: what foundation this report may have, we know not. Venice, May 27. By a Veffel arriving here in 14 days from Zante, we are informed that a Tartan from our Armata brought thither news, that several of the Enemies Gallies were come out from the Dardanelli, and were fo much fa-Armars being able to come up with them. That at their landing they found the Island and the Turkish Army in extreme want of provision, infomuch as many of them were al-ready dead with hunger, and many more had deferted the fervice and fled over to our people, who furnifir them with veffels to embarque them for what places they defired. Their expectations having been defeated by the routing of the Carravan or Convoy from Alexandria, has made them almost desperate. The Visier himself finding his Army to amount to 50000 men, and little hopes of supplying them with pro-portionable Victuals, is resolved to hurry them on to the slege of Candia, where they have already raised their Lat-teries against the Fort S. Demetrius, which is as sloutly defended, and the fhor returned with interest and some damage to the besiegers. Our Garrison is plentifully stored with all fores of Necessaries, and encouraged by the fresh Succours lately put in there by his Excellency Morofini, and by those others that they are every day expecting, under the conduct of Giustiniano, who is before this arrived at the Armata: which at the departure of this Tartan was riding between Suda and Grabufe, with whom were allo j yned feveral Chriftian Corfaires, to hinder the putting in of any Veffels into Canea for the supply of the Turks necessities.

This following Accompt, as more authentick, of the Mosion of the French in the Spanish Netherlands, we give you; being the substance of a Letter written from the French King.

Rom the Camp at Charle Roy, June 2. My laft Relation being from the Camp at Villeport, we fince came to lodge the 30 past at Lavenieres near Bauay, and the Brefton, upon the little River bearing the same name. We have had continual raines, which has occasioned much trou-ble to us, and somehat tired out our Troops, but two daies of remission will refresh them. The Duke de Coaflin, with Des Fourneaux Begade, the Queens Company, and 60 of our Guards having been abroad upon a party, returned yesterday without any adventure; as for Piloy he only met with a party of 50 horse, which did not stand him, of whom he took three, with one Reformado Officer. Before I came hither to Charle-Roy, Podinis who was by Duras fent out with two Bregades of Horfe, and 1600 Foot, commanded by the Count de Sault, took possession of Charles-Roy, which I have fince taken a full view of, and find the Bastions much ruined, but the out side generally so perfect and whole, that in few daies we shall make it a very considerable Poft, especially by she diligence that I make them use in working at having employed the Cavalry about the Faffinnes and Pallisadoes, and so disposed of all things, that the place with its fortifications, will be suddenly put into a good condition, for which purpose I am resolved to pass some little time, which I can easily dispense with in this place. I vified the Castie there, and went round a. bout the Ramparts, and having affured the Inhabitants of my protection, and all kind of good ufage, I left there Mire. mont a Captain in the Turenne Regiment, with 300 Foot, and 100 Horse, Duras will be here to morrow, our Bregger cannot come up to us, yet these three daies, which much incommodes us: to conclude this Relation, I am just now told of one Horfeman, who was fer upon by three Peafant; armed with guns, whole thot he fortunately escaping, killed all three of them, with his two Piftols and Sword.

being all Dutch, the thip and goods belonging to Rotterdam.

Yesterday was sent in hither a pretended Hamburgh Hoy; which, to avoid the chace given her, ran her felf on fhore, but was again brought off with fome damage, having taken in fix or feven foot water in the Hold. They pretend that the cause of their running away was, that having been some days before plundered by a Mlufbing Privateer, they were informed by that Caper of two Turks Men of wat that were riding off this Sound, for one of which they took the Veffel that gave them chace.
