That (in the Place, and at the time of enjoying our Religious Worship established by Law, and supported by Your Majesties Royal Protection) Your Majesty is pleased (in the presence of God) to renew to us, all those often repeated Assurances which Your Majesty hath given us, of extirpating Popery from amongst us, (to which end we cannot but take notice with all Dutitul Satisfaction; That Your Majesty hath newly issued out Your Commands, for a strict execution of the Laws both Ecclefiaftical and Civil, in order thereunto ) As also of Redrelling all our Grievances, and of Governing according to the Fundamental and Fitablished Laws of this Kingdom; whereof (notwithstanding the groundless Instinuations of all meaning went to the contrary ) All reasonable and sober Mea are, and ought to be meltentirely constact.
