Cadiz, May 2.

THis day arrived here Capt. Langston from *Tangier*, going for *England* with the Articles of Peace, concluded by Sir *James Leslie*, between His Majesty of *Great Britain*, and the Emperor of *Morocco* for four years.

Brussels, June 3. On Saturday last the Nations agreed to the renewing the Imposts upon Beer, with so much readiness, that the Prince of *Parma*, to let them see how well he takes this their cheerful compliance, has resolved to set the Deacon of the Gardeners, who is a Prisoner at *Vivord*, at liberty. The last Spanish Ordinary brought his Highness, as we are informed, Bills of Exchange for a very considerable Sum of Money. The disorders at *Liege* increase daily; that City has sent two of their Magistrates to *Paris* (and the Elector of *Cologne* has at the same time, sent thither the Baron de *Linden*) to sollicite that Court on their behalf.

Hague, June 3. Yesterday the Prince and Princess of *Orange* returned hither.

Marseilles, May 27. We have an account of two Algerines lately taken by the English Frigats, viz. the *Golden-Horse* of 48. and the *Rose* of 24 Guns. By a Vessel arrived here from the Coast of *Barbary* we have advice that the Moors have taken *Mamora* from the Spaniards by Assault.

Paris, June 4. The Dauphiness has had several Fits of an Ague, for which she has been let Blood. The Duke d'*Enghien* is likewise indisposed, which has brought the Prince of *Condé* to Town from *Chantilly*.

Salisbury, May 16. At a Common-Council holden for this City on Wednesday the 27th of April last past, by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Assistance of the said City, it was unanimously ordered and agreed, That the following Address be Humbly presented to His most Sacred Majesty.

May it please Your most Excellent Majesty,

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Assistants of Your Majesties City of *New Sarum*; being this day in Common-Council Assembled, and taking into our serious Consideration, Your Majesties most Gracious Declaration, which was Read and Published in the Cathedral and Parochial Churches of this City on Sunday last past: Do think it as well our Duty, as it is our Inclination, to take the first opportunity of unanimously Presenting to Your Sacred Majesty, our most Humble Thanks: That (in the Place, and at the time of enjoying our Religious Worship established by Law, and supported by Your Majesties Royal Protection) Your Majesty is pleased (in the presence of God) to renew to us, all those often repeated Assurances which Your Majesty hath given us, of extirpating Popery from amongst us, (to which end we cannot but take notice with all Dutiful Satisfaction; That Your Majesty hath newly issued our Your Commands, for a strict execution of the Laws

both Ecclesiastical and Civil, in order thereunto) As also of Redressing all our Grievances, and of Governing according to the Fundamental and Established Laws of this Kingdom; whereof (notwithstanding the groundless Insinuations of all meaning even to the contrary) All reasonable and sober Men are, and ought to be most entirely convinced.

Nor may we forbear most Humbly taking notice, of Your Majesties indefatigable Care and Pains for the Preservation of *Tangier*, in the midst of so many great Strights and Difficulties; by supporting with Supplies out of Your Majesties own Store, a City of Christians amongst Mahumetans, of that Importance to Trade, and in that extremity of danger to be lost, which, nothing but God Almighty's Goodness, allsing Your Princely Undertaking, could possibly effect; and for which, our Posterity, as well as ourselves, will ever be obliged to praise God.

And we do on our parts, most Humbly Beseech Your Majesty to be assured, of our sincere, and perfect Acquiescence under Your Majesties most Gracious Government; of our equal and impartial Detestation of all Popish and Pluristical Principles and Parties, tending to Sedition and Rebellion; and of our resolute and stedfast Adherence to Your Majesties Government, both in Church and State, as now by Law established.

In Defence whereof, and of Your Majesties most Sacred Person (whom God long preserve) we do with humble Confidence, most cheerfully offer to Your Majesty, the Command of our Lives and Fortunes; and that not only out of an entire and scaled Principle of Allegiance, but also out of a deep Sense, that in the Preservation and Security of Your Sacred Majesties Life, and just Prerogative, all our Lives and Liberties do consist.

And the Common-Council meeting again on Friday last, our Mayor acquainted them, that the said Address had been presented to His Majesty, and that His Majesty had very Graciously received it as a Testimony of their Loyalty and Affection to Him and His Government, which the Common-Council heard with great satisfaction, and a most dutiful Acknowledgment of His Majesties transcendent Goodness to them and all His Loyal Subjects. And at the same time was presented to the Mayor, and the said Common-Council, a Paper Subscribed by above four hundred of the most substantial Citizens and Inhabitants of this City, as follows.

To the Right Worshipful the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Assistants of the City of *New Sarum*.

WE the Citizens and Inhabitants of the said City, whose Names are under-written, being as deeply sensible as your selves of the late ill Construction which hath been put upon His most Sacred Majesties Government, both by Popish Plots, and Phanatical Contrivances, and being as joyfully ready to Declare to the World, as well our Duty to His Majesty, as our Humble Acknowledgments for His late Gracious Declaration; In Testimony of our hearty Concurrence with all Your Protestations, of most Resolutely adhering to the Monarchy and Church of *England* by Law established; do give you our unfeigned Thanks for your late Address to His most Sacred Majesty, and do resolve by the Conformity of our Lives and Actions to so Loyal and Laudable an Example, to convince the World, that we are as sincerely Obedient, and affectionately firm to our *Protestant* Government, as your selves, or any of His good Subjects whatsoever.

Rochester, May 27. Yesterday their Majesties came to view the Navy and Dock at *Chatham*, where they were attended by the Trained Bands of this City as likewise by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-

Common-Council of the said City, who presented to His Majesty the following Address;

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Obedient Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council, and other the Inhabitants of Your Majesties ever Loyal City of *Ripon*: taking into our Consideration Your Majesties late most Pious and Gracious Declaration, Your Majesties purpose of maintaining to Your People, the Protestant Religion by Law established, the extirpation of Popery, the frequent use of Parliaments, the Redress of all their Grievances, to continue to them their just Rights, Liberties and Properties, and to Govern them according to the known Laws, cannot, but from their deep sense thereof, in all Humility and Thankfulness (to the highest degree of Gratitude) acknowledge Your Majesties unparalleled Grace, Favour and Goodness therein, Blessing Almighty God that hath inclined Your Majesties Heart to vouchsafe the same to Your Subjects and People, whose Hearts cannot but be filled with Joy and Gladness (as are ours) at the due and serious Contemplation thereof.

And as we are most confident of Your Majesties most Gracious Purpose and Intention, to perform what You have so Graciously Declared, so we most Humbly beseech Your Majesty to rest assured, that we are fully purposed, according to our bounden Duty, with our Lives and Fortunes (as becomes all Dutiful and Loyal Subjects) to stand by Your Majesty therein, and in the Defence of Your sacred Person (whom God long preserve) and in the Preservation and Maintenance of the Prerogative and just Rights of Your Majesty, and of Your Heirs and lawful Successors, against all opposition whatsoever.

Windfor, May 27. Their Majesties returned hither this Morning, and some hours after the following Address was presented to the King;

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

The Humble Declaration and Address of Your Majesties Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and Officers of Your Majesties Militia, in, and for the County of *Somerset*.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE Your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient Subjects of the County of *Somerset*, whose Names are subscribed, being sensible of the great Blessings this Kingdom has enjoyed under Your Majesties Government, since Your Majesties happy Restoration thereunto; and having our Hearts filled with joy, by Your Majesties late Declaration, touching Your Royal Intentions as to the future Administration thereof, cannot remain silent, but as a part of the greater Body, do presume to approach Your Royal Throne with our most humble Acknowledgments of Your Majesties Goodness and Clemency expressed unto us in that Your Majesties Declaration, and particularly for that Your Majesty is Graciously pleased to give us Your Royal Word, that our Persons and Estates shall not be left to the pleasure of ourselves Subjects. We are deeply sensible of the Endeavours that have been on foot to subvert the known Laws of the Land, wherein our Religion, Liberty and Property are wound up. And we are so far satisfied, that it is the Kingdoms Interest to continue the Succession in its due and right Line, and maintain the present Government as by Law it is established; that we for our own parts are unanimously resolved by Gods help, to Assist and Serve Your Majesty with our Lives and Fortunes in Defence thereof, against all Persons and Parties that shall appear against it.

The Humble Address of the Corporation of *Ripon*, in the County of *York*,

May it please Your Majesty,

WE Your Majesties most Loyal and Faithful Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Assistants of Your antient Corporation and Burrough of *Ripon*, in Your County of *York*, do with all Humility present to Your Majesty our grateful Sense and Acknowledgment of Your Majesties Royal Favour to Your Subjects, in imparting to them Your Majesties Reasons for Your Proceedings with Your two last Parliaments, which Your Majesty has been Graciously pleased to do, by Your Declaration read the last Lords day, by Dr. Cartwright, Dean of this Your Collegiate Church of *Ripon*. Your Majesties Princely Resolutions to maintain Your Princely Prerogative, the Just Rights and Liberties of Your Subjects, the true Protestant Religion as it is now established by Laws; the Succession of the Crown in its due and legal course of Descent, and the delivering us from the unwarrantable Proceedings of the House of Commons, is Matter of the highest Joy and Satisfaction to us: And we do Humbly beseech Your Majesty to continue in those Your Royal Purposes, and solemnly Declare, That we will adhere to Your Majesty in Defence thereof, to the utmost hazard of our Lives and Fortunes.
