WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless Our Arms both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, that a Publick Day of Fasting and Humiliation be observed throughout those Parts of Our United Kingdom called England and Ireland, on Wednesday the Eighth Day of February next ensuing; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins, and, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty for averting those heavy Judgments which Our manifold Provocations have most justly deserved, and for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms for the Restoration of Peace and Prosperity to Us and Our Dominions: And We do strictly charge and command that the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England and Ireland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid his Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty: And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England and Ireland, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick Worship; and to take care that the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless Our Arms both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, that a Publick Day of Fasting and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, on Thursday the Ninth Day of February next ensuing; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins, and, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty for averting those heavy Judgments which Our manifold Provocations have most justly deserved, and for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on our Arms for the Restoration of Peace and Prosperity to Us and Our Dominions: And We do strictly charge and command that the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty: Our Will is, therefore, and We charge that this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith proceed to the Market-Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication thereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, that Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published: And We do appoint them to send Copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds; and that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day abovementioned, the same may be pub-

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fourth Day of July last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom of any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Eleventh Day of January next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, from the said Eleventh Day of January next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, Sail-Cloth or Canvas, or other Naval Stores, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking on board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to New-

foundland, or to His Majesty's Ports and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles for the Purpose of Trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Ports and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Place for which they shall be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give and sufficient Security, by Bond, (except as hereinafter excepted,) to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were entered outwards: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, nevertheless, that the following Articles, viz. Bar-Iron, White and Tarred Rope, Tallow or Mill Grease, Tarpaulins for Waggon-Covers, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, shall be permitted to be exported, upon Payment of the proper Duties, without Bond being entered into by the Merchant Exporter, to any of the British Plantations in the West Indies, or to any of His Majesty's Settlements in South America; provided the Merchant Exporter shall first verify, upon Oath, that the Articles so exported are intended for the Use of a particular Plantation or Settlement, to be named in the Entry Outwards, and not for Sale; and that the said Plantation or Settlement has not before been furnished with any Supply of the said Articles during the same Season; and provided also that the Exportation of the said Articles shall, in no Case, exceed the Value of Fifty Pounds Sterling for any given Plantation or Settlement, whether by one or more Shipments within the same Season: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

VICE-ADMIRAL LORD COLLINGWOOD has, with his Letter of the 25th of October last, transmitted to the Honourable William Wellesley Pole a Letter from Captain Pearse, of His Majesty's Sloop the Halcyon, giving an Account of the Capture of the whole of a Convoy belonging to the Enemy under the Town of Diamante, on the 8th of September, by the above Sloop, the Weazle, (Captain Prescott,) and a Neapolitan Galley, with a Detachment of the British Army under the Command of Lieutenant-Colonel Bryce.

Lord Collingwood commends the Zeal and Dexterity of Captains Pearse and Prescott, as also the Ability with which the Co-operation of the Army was conducted on the above Enterprize, which was achieved without any Loss on our Part.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Thomas Harvey, of His Majesty's Ship the Standard, dated off Corfu, 26th June 1808; to Vice-Admiral Lord Collingwood, Commander in Chief in the Mediterranean, and transmitted by the latter to the Hon. W. W. Pole.

MY LORD,

AT Daylight this Morning I fell in with La Volpe, Italian Gun-Boat, commanded by Ensign de Vaisseau Micheli Mangin, carrying an Iron Four-Pounder, with Twenty Men well armed. The La Legera, French Dispatch Boat, with a well-armed Crew of Fourteen Men, was with La Volpe. At Nine, the Wind failing, I sent the Pinnace with Lieutenant R. and the Eight-oared Cutter with Captain of the Royal Marines, (both Volunteers). After Two Hours' rowing, the Weather very hot, they approached La Volpe, who commenced a Fire of Musketry on them, which was returned with the Swivels, and, when near, with Muskets. On the Boats approaching each Quarter to board, the Gun-Boat pulled short round, and fired at the Cutter both Round and Grape; the Boats dashed at him, when he struck, and was taken Possession of by Captain Nicholls; Lieutenant Cull immediately pushed on in chase of La Legera. Some Time previous to this I had dispatched the Yawl, with Lieutenant John Alexander, to be ready to cut her off; which affording him the Opportunity of obliging her to run on Shore about Four Miles Northward of Cape St. Mary, the Crew formed on the Rocks above her, and endeavoured to prevent the Yawl's Approach; but she was taken Possession of by Lieutenant Alexander, who was immediately after joined by Lieutenant Cull and Captain Nicholls; they towed her out under a Fire of Musketry from the Shore, which was returned by our Marines in the Boats with great Spirit; one of the Frenchmen was seen killed. A French Ensign de Vaisseau was Passenger in La Legera. I was much gratified on the Return of the Boats in learning we had not suffered.

In this little Affair, the Gallantry and good Conduct of the Officers and Men concerned gave me very great Satisfaction; both Captain Nicholls and Lieutenant Cull speak in high Terms of the Assist-

ance they received from Messrs. Hames and Parker, Master's Mates of the Standard.

Monsieur Monier, Ensign de Vaisseau, on the Staff of General Dougelet of Corfu, was taken in La Volpe. I burnt both Vessels.

LEGACY DUTY.

TO EXECUTORS AND ADMINISTRATORS.

WHEREAS it appears by the Abstracts of Wills and Letters of Administration, returned to the Stamp-Office from the several Ecclesiastical Courts, that the Duties granted by the Acts of the 36 Geo. 3. c. 52, 44 Geo. 3. c. 98, and 45 Geo. 3. c. 28, have not been paid in respect of divers Legacies and Annuities bequeathed by Will out of Personal or Real Estate, and in respect of divers Residues of Personal Estate given by Will, or devolved to Next of Kin upon Intestacies, particularly in Cases where the Executors were themselves Legatees, or Residuary Legatees, and where the Administrators were the sole Next of Kin of the Deceased;

This is to give Notice, that the Commissioners of Stamps are empowered, by an Act of the last Session of Parliament, to remit the Penalties incurred by Executors and others in consequence of the Non-payment of the abovementioned Duties within the Time prescribed by Law, provided the same be paid on or before the 31st of January 1809; and that after that Day the Commissioners of Stamps



will proceed to institute Prosecutions in the Exchequer against such Executors and Administrators as shall not avail themselves of the Indemnity offered, for recovering the Arrears of the said Duties.
