VICE-ADMIRAL LORD COLLINGWOOD has, with his Letter of the 25th of October laft, tranfmitted to the Honourable William Wellefley Pole a Letter from Captain Pearfe, of His Majefly's Sloop the Halcyon, giving an Account of the Capture of the whole of a Convoy belonging to the Enemy under the Town of Diamante, on the 8th of September, by the above Sloop, the Weazle, (Captain Prefcott,) and a Neapolitan Galley, with a Detachment of the Britifh Army under the Command of Lieutenant-Colonel Bryce.

Lord Collingwood commends the Zeal and Dexterity of Captains Pearle and Prefcott, as alfo the Ability with which the Co-operation of the Army was conducted on the above Enterprize, which was atchieved without any Lofs on our Part.

N. B. The Particulars of the above Affair are contained in the Letter and Inclosure from Lieutenant-General Sir John Stuart, inferted in the Gazette of the 13th Ultimo.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Thomas Harvey, of His Majefly's Ship the Standard, dated off Corfu, 26th June 1808, to Vice-Admiral Lord Collingwood, Commander in Chief in the Mediterranean, and transmitted by the latter to the Hon. W. W. Pole.

My Lord,

Daylight this Morning I fell in with La A Volpe, Italian Gun-Boat, commanded by En-fign de Vaiffeau Micheli Mangin, carrying an Iron Four-Pounder, with Twenty Men well armed. The La Legera, French Difpatch Boat, with a well-armed Crew of Fourteen Men, was with La Volpe. At Nine, the Wind failing. I fent the Pinnace with Lieutenant Richard and the Eight-oared Cut-ter with Captain and the Royal Marines, (both Volunteen Men, was the Royal Marines, rowing, the Weather very hot, they approached La Volpe, who commenced a Fire of Mußketry on them, which was returned with the Swivels, and, when near, with Muskets. On the Boats approaching each Quarter to board, the Gun Boat pulled thort round, and fired at the Cutter both Round and Grape; the Boats dashed at him, when he ftruck, and was taken Poffeffion of by Captain Nicholls; ³Lieutenant Cull immediately pushed on in chace of La Legera. Some Time previous to this I had difpatched the Yawl, with Lieutenant John Alexander, to be ready to cut her off; which affording him the Opportunity of obliging her to run on Shore about Four Miles Northward of Cape St. Mary, the Crew formed on the Rocks above her, and endeavoured to prevent the Yawl's Approach; but the was taken Poffession of by Lieutenant Alexander, who was immediately after joined by Lieutenant Cull and Captain Nicholls; they towed her out under a Fire of Mufketry from the Shore, which was returned by our Marines in the Boats with great Spirit ; one of the Frenchmen was feen killed. A French Enfigu de Vaisseau was Passenger in La Legera. I was much gratified on the Return of the Boats in learning we had not fuffered.

In this little Affair, the Gallantry and good Conduct of the Officers and Men concerned gave me very great Satisfaction; both Captain Nicholls and Lieutenant Cull speak in high Terms of the Affift.



ance they received from Meffrs. Hames and Parker, Mafter's Mates of the Standard.

Monfieur Monier, Enfign de Vaiffeau, on the Staff of General Dougelet of Corfu, was taken in La Volpi. I burnt both Vessels.

LEGACY DUTY.

TO EXECUTORS AND ADMINISTRATORS. WHEREAS it appears by the Abstracts of Wills and Letters of Administration, returned to the Stamp-Office from the feveral Ecclefiastical Courts, that the Duties granted by the Acts of the 36 Geo. 3. c. 52, 44 Geo. 3 c. 98, and 45 Geo. 3. c. 28, have not been paid in respect of divers Legacies and Annuities bequeathed by Will out of Personal or Real Estate, and in respect of divers Residues of Personal Estate given by Will, or devolved to Next of Kin upon Intellacies, particularly in Cafes where the Executors were themfelves Legatees, or Residuary Legatees, and where the Administrators were the fole Next of Kin of the

Deceafed; This is to give Notice, that the Commissioners of Stamps are empowered, by an Act of the last Seffion of Parliament, to remit the Penalties incurred by Executors and others in confequence of the Non-Payment of the abovementioned Duties within the Time preferibed by Law, provided the fame be paid on or before the 31ft of January 1809; and that after that Day the Commissioners of Stamps
