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Berlin, May 18.

O Ur-Else for will be in his Journey to *Moscow* on the 25th Instant, and from thence intends to go to *Verma*, and having drunk the Waters there, to remove from thence to *Czevis*. It has been very confidently reported, that his Electoral Highness had made a French Gentleman Governor of *Czevis*, but upon enquiry it appears to be a mistake. The Letters we receive from *Warsaw* give us an Account, That there were great Heats in the Dyet; which after all, they feared would not have the happy Conclusion that was to be wished; That the Treaty with the *Moscovites* did not advance at all, and that the Poles began to have a great Suspicion that they were Treating with the Turks.

Hamburg, June 6. We have Letters from *Moscow*, Dated the 6th of the last Month, which sa, That a Truce was concluded between the Turks and the *Moscovites* for six years; and that they were expecting there an Ambassador from *Constantinople*, which will be a very unwelcome piece of News to the Poles, who have gone so far towards a War with the Turks; and at the same time we receive Letters from *Warsaw*, Dated the 26th past, which tell us, That the Dyet after having set eighteen weeks, was broken up in disorder, without coming to a Conclusion in any one of the Points that had been before them; occasioned by the dissatisfaction of one of the Deputies of *Lithuania*, who having made a Protestation against the Proceedings of the Dyet on the 24th, immediately departed, and could not be persuaded to return; but on the contrary, other Deputies joining with him, the Dyet broke up and separated; for by their Constitution the Protestation of an one of the Deputies puts to perfect a stop to the Proceedings, that unless the Perion be prevailed with to take it off, the Dyet must break up.

Cologne, June 8. The Deputies of *Engl* are still here, endeavouring to compose Matters, but the late Action at *Wesel*, has so offended his Electoral Highness, that he's resolved to employ Force, in order to the bringing that City to its Duty, and for that purpose is going to raise two Regiments of Foot, and several Officers are come hither to take Service. From *Wesel* we have an Account, That the are making there a Bridge over the *Rhine*, which is almost finished; and that the Elector of *Brandenburg* had sent Orders to Recruit the Regiments that are quartered in the Countrey of *Cleves*.

Brussels, June 6. The Proceedings of the French does extremely perplex this Court, for as we have already told you, they now Demand the Town and Countrey of *Cherwy*; and if satisfaction be not given them in few days, they will bring their Forces again into *Luxemburg*, and Quarter them upon the poor Inhabitants.

Hague, June 10. The Governor of *Newport* is arrived here, and to morrow he parts hence with Don *Fuen Mayor*, the Spanish Envoye, to give the Prince of *Parma* an Account of the great interruption that the *Brandenburg* Frigats, which continue to cruise on the coast of *Flanders* give to their Trade. Mr. *Bersie*, Envoye Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Brittain* to several Princes of the Empire is arrived here, and went this Morning with Mr. *Sidon*, His Majesties Minister here, to wait upon the Prince and Princess of *Orange* at *Honflaerde*.

Plymouth, May 31. The *Frisight*, Captain *Killegrew* Commander, and the *Faulcon*, Captain *Cowche*, are now in Port, expecting the Merchants Ships that are to pass under their Convoys to the *Seyles*. The last night arrived here the *Argelays*, Captain *de J*, from Cruising.

London, June 1. We were very much surprized to see it Printed in some of the Intelligences, that this Town had resolved on a Petition to be presented to His Majesty for the Sitting of a Parliament, when no body here had heard of any such thing, all His Majesties Loyal Subjects of this Town being so fully satisfied with His Majesties late Gracious Declaration, that they think it their Duty to make their most Humble acknowledgments to His Majesty of that transcendent Goodness, of which they become every day more and more sensible, and of the great Happiness they enjoy under the Gracious influences of it; and to morrow there will be a meeting at *Dorchster* of the Justices of the Peace and most of the Considerable Gentlemen of the Countrey, where will likewise be many Loyal Persons of this Town, in order to the Drawing up an Humble Address to His Majesty for that purpose.

Windsor, June 3. His Majesty in consideration of the great Loyalty of *Daniel Fleming* of *Ridley* in the County of *Westmeiland*, Esq; was pleased on the 25th of the last Month to Confer the Honor of Knighthood upon him.

And on the 30th of the same Month *Edward Philipson* of *Crook-Hall* in the said County, a Person of known Loyalty and Affection to His Majesties Person and Government received the same Honor of Knighthood from His Majesty.

Windsor, June 3. An Humble Address from the Town and County of *Newcastle* having been presented to the King by Sir *Nathaniel Johnson* the Mayor, accompanied by Sir *Robert Sh. foy* Recorder, Sir *Richard See*, Sir *F. n.
