Extract of another Letter from Vice-Admiral Lord Collingwood, to the Hon. W. W. Pole, dated on board the Ocean, December 14, 1808.

MY Letter of the 1st Instant would inform you of the Enemy having laid Siege to the Castle of Rosas, and of the Measures taken by the British Ships in that Bay in Aid of the Spaniards for its Defence. The Scout joined the Squadron off Toulon on the 7th, and by her I received further Accounts from Captain Bennett, of the Fame, of the Progress the Enemy was making against that important Fortrefs. Captain Lord Cochrane has maintained himself in the Possession of Trinity Castle with great Ability and Heroism; although the Fort is laid open by the Breach in its Works, he has sustained and repelled several Assaults, having formed a Sort of Rampart within the Breach, with his Ship's Hammock Cloths, Awnings, &c. filled with Sand and Rubbish. The Zeal and Energy with which he has maintained that Fortrefs, excites the highest Admiration. His Resources for every Exigency have no End. The Spanish Governor of this Castle is wounded, and on board the Meteor.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Right Honourable John Mitford Baron Redefdale, of Redefdale, in the County of Northumberland, His Royal Licence and Authority, that he and his

Issue (when and as they shall respectively be in Possession of the Estates devised by the last Will and Testament of Thomas Edwards Freeman, late of Battersford, in the County of Gloucester, Esq; deceased, in virtue of the Limitations thereof,) may take and use the Surname of Freeman, in addition to and before that of Mitford, and also bear, quarterly, with his and their paternal Arms, the Arms of Freeman, as borne by the said Thomas Edwards Freeman, deceased, and by his maternal Grandfather the Right Honourable Richard Freeman, deceased, formerly Lord High Chancellor of Ireland, with a proper Distinction according to the Laws of Arms; provided such Arms be first duly exemplified and recorded in the Herald's Office:

And also to order, that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Law of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are in any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or any other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase; and shall forfeit all Lands,
