Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral the Honourable Sir Alexander Cochrane, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majelly's Ships and Veffels at the Leeward Islands, to the Honourable W. W. Polc, dated on board the Neptune, at Barbadoec, 19th December, 1808.

SIR,

INCLOSE, for the Informatics of the Lords Commifieners of the Admiralty, the Copy of a Letter which I have received from Captain Collier. of His Majefty's Ship Circe, the fenior Officer of the blockading Squadron flationed from the Diamond to the Péarl Rocks, Martinique, giving an Account of the Deflruction of the French Corvette Le Cygne, which had failed from Cherbourg on the 12th November, with the Papillon, another Corvette, and La Verrus, La Junon, and L'Amphitrite Frigates.

In performing this Service I am forry to fend the inclofed Report of the Lofs which has been fuftained by the feveral Veffels engaged, owing to the Corvette having been fupported by the Batteries, Field-Pieces, and Mufketry from the Shore, in her Attempt to reach St. Pierre's; but the Object is fully accomplified, as fhe is bilged in fuch a Situation as to render it impoffible to recover the Veffel, or the Flour with which fhe was loaded. One of the Schooners in Company with her was burnt, and the other drove on Shore and deflroyed; each of them alfo having been loaded with Flour and Provifions.

Captain Collier deferves great Praife for his Perfeverance in overcoming the Obstacles which the Enemy prefented by the numerous Batteries which hined the Shore in that Part of the Coast; and he speaks in the highest Terms of Captain Brenton of the Amaranthe, as well as of the Gallantry and good Canduct of Lieutenant Wright, and a Party of the Phoyal York Rangers, who were ferving as Mariling. SIR, Martinique, December 14, 1808. ON Monday, at Eleven A. M., His Majelty's Brig Morne Fortunée informed me by Signal that

chor of the Pearl. I immediately recalled the lookout Veffels named as per Margin ", and made all Sail towards the Enemy. On our nearing St. Pierre's, 1 perceived a large French Schooner towing along Shore, under Cover of a Number of Proops. The Schooner finding it impossible to get between St. Pierre's and the Circe, the Stork clofing faft, they run her on Shore under a Battery of Four Guns, flanked by Two fmalle: ones, and the Beach lined with Troops. The Signal was then made to clofe with the Enemy, and engage in Succession, the Circe leading, followed by the Stork and Morne Fortunée; being within Pillol-fluot the fmall Batteries were foon filenced, and the Troops driven from the Beach. Seeing the Brig and Schooner unloading, I directed the Morne Tortunée to watch the Schooner in Shore, and to give fimilar Orders to the Epervice on her coming up. We then made Sail towards the Brig and the other Schooner, which were lying well to Windward clofe to the Beach, under Cover of Four Batteries and an immenfe Number of Troops and Field Pieces, which they had brought down on the Beach to protect her. Having placed the Barge and Two Cutters under the Command of LieutAnant Crook, Mr. Collman, Purfer, Mr. Smith, Maller, and Mr. Thomas, Carpenter, who handfomely volunteered with Sixtyeight Men to bring the Brig out, I then made Sail with the Stork and Express towards her, and di-rected the Boats to lay off until the Brig's Fire flackened. It getting late, the Veffels lying clofe in with the Rocks, and having no Pilot on board, I flood in, and was handfomely feconded by Captain Le Geyt of the Stork. The Ships did not commence Action until our Men were wounded from the Beach with Mufketry. We then bore up.under a heavy Fire of great Guns and fmall Arms. Having paffed the Batteries and Brig, the Circe's Boats not waiting for the Stork's to come up, boarded in the molt gallant Manner; and it is with extreme Concern I have to add, that their Gallantiy did not meet with its Reward; they were beat back with decadful.Slaughter; one Boat taken and one funk, the other entirely difabled. Our Lofs in the Boats are killed, wounded, and miffing, Fifty-fix. By this Time it was Dark ; I flood off until Daylight, determining to perfevere and deftroy the Brig if poffible. In the Evening I was joined by the Ama-

ranthe, who watched the Brig during the Night. At Eight A. M. we perceived the had weighed a Captain Brenton, in the molt handfome Manner, volunteering to bring her out, the was then towing and fweeping clofe in Shore towards St. Pierre's; the Boats of the Circe and Stork, and Men from the Express, were fent to tow the Amaranthe up, who was at this Time fweeping and ufing every Exertion to clofe with the Eucay. At Ten, the French Brig grounded near feveral Batteries, to the Northward of St. Pierre's; the Amaranthe tacked and worked in-under a heavy Fire from the Batteries and Brig, from which the fuffered confiderably, having One killed and Five wounded, followed by the Circe, the Reft of the Squadron engaging the Batteries to Leeward. From the Amaranthe's well directed Fire, the foon obliged them to quit the Brig. Lieutenant Hay, of the Amaranthe, on this
