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Genova, May 13:

The Turkey Merchant, the Kemptorn, the Italian Merchant, the Samuel and Henry, the Alliance, the Mexico, and the True Love Ketch are now under Sail for Leghona.

Fraxels June 18. On Thursday next the Prince of Parma begins his Journey towards *traynals*, he goes first to *Aub*, where Monsieur de *Fene* the Governor has made great preparations for his Highnesses Reception, from thence he goes to *Mons*, and after 7 or 8 days stay there, to *Charleroy*. The Duke de *Bejuz*, who lately arrived here from *Sain*, is gone for *Holland*, from whence he will go and visit the Northern Courts. This Morning the Duke of *Norfolk* arrived here from *E. Ind.* From *Lige* we have an Account, That they are proceeding Criminally against those Persons (being French, and formerly Inhabitants of *Lige*) which they took at *Vistr*, for having quitted the City, and joyned themselves with its Enemies; on the other hand they write from *Cologne*, that that Elector had given Orders for the drawing all his Troops together, in order as is believed, to employ them against the City of *Lige*.

Hague, June 13. The States General having written to the Elector of *Branzburg*, to acquaint him, that several Complaints had been made to them of the disturbance which is given to their Subjects in the Trade, by his Electoral Highnesses Ships, cruising on the coast of *Flanders*, who visit all Vessels they meet with, on pretence of their having Goods in them belonging to the Subjects of *Spain*; the Elector has answered, That the said Frigates have no orders to visit any Vessel belonging to these Countreys; and that he has Comanded the Intendant of his Maritime Affairs, to make a strict enquiry into the Matter; and if it appear, that the Commanders of his Ships have given any trouble to the Subjects of this State, to call them to an account for the same, and to take care that no occasion of Complaint be given them for the future. The *Sieur Van Haren*, one of the Deputies of the Province of *Frisland*, in the Assembly of the States-General, has represented to them, That the Council of State has refused to Receive, and cause to be Registered the Commissions, which had been given by the Stadtholder of *Frisland* to several Persons, to Command the Troops that are in the Pay of that Province, for that the disposal of the said Commands did solely appertain to the Prince of *Orange*, as Captain-General of the *United-Provinces*, which he said, the Province of *Frisland* could not allow of, having always understood, that the Granting of Commissions within their Province, was reserved to their own Stadtholder. The said *sieur Van Haren* having made this Representation to the States, he is gone for *Friesland*. It is said that the said Prince of *Friesland* will be suddenly here, to be introduced into the Colledge of the Ridderschap or Nobles.

Paris, June 14. An Order, as we are informed, has been sent into the Countrey, for the securing several Ecclesiasticks, and sending them Prisoners thither, being favourers of the Popes Pretensions, concerning the Regality, which is a Matter that seems not likely to be very suddenly composed; for our Letters from *Rome* tell us, that the Cardinal d' *Estree* makes not any progress in his Negotiation; the Pope appearing every day more and more resolved to maintain the Rights of the Church, as he calls them. The Sovereign Chamber at *Metz* has made a Decree, by which they Declare greatest part of the Dutchy of *Luxemburg*, to be Dependencies of the Bishoprick of *Metz*.

Windsor, June 7. Since our last, The following Addresses have been presented to His Majesty, besides others from *Verby Woodstock*, &c.

your Majesties most Gracious Expressions in your late Declaration: in your Majesties readiness to satisfy the Desires of your good Subjects, and to secure them against their fears, in the preservation of their Religion, Liberties and Properties. In your Majesties Care to prevent the return of those Miseries we lately felt in a most unnatural War and Government by a standing Force. In your Majesties great Wisdom, judging Parliaments the best method for healing the distempers of the Kingdom, and the only means to preserve the Monarchy in its due Credit and Respect, both at home and abroad. In your Majesties steady Resolution of having frequent Parliaments, and both in and out of them to use your utmost endeavours to extirpate Popery, to redress all the Grievances of your good Subjects, and in all things to Govern according to Law.

That as with due Gratitude we acknowledge these great Blessings, so in all Humility we tender the Duty of our Allegiance, Loyalty, and best Affections to your Majesties Service; and are unanimously ready with our Lives and Fortunes, to stand by, and assist your Majesty; and hope we shall approve our Duty, in the Choice of such Members to serve in Parliament (when in your Princely Wisdom, your Majesty shall see fit to call one) as will concur with your Majesty in giving such suitable Supplies as may enable you to secure your own Dominions and your Allies, against the power of any that shall oppose your Majesties just Designs. Praying God to preserve your Majesties Sacred Person, and to Grant you a long and prosperous Reign.

We only add (most Royal Sir) that there is nothing of this World so dear unto us which we will not at all times

be ready to Sacrifice, in the preservation of Your Sacred Person, the Dignity and Prerogative annexed to Your Imperial Crown, and of the Government, as it is now by Law established, both in the Church and state.

Edenburgh, May 31. Sunday last being the Anniversary of his Majesties happy Birth and Restauration, there were Sermons Preached in all the Churches Suitable to the occasion; but the Solemnity prepared by this City for the Celebration of this happy day, which the Lord Provost and Magistrates, had prayed his Royal Highness would Honour with his Presence, was at his Royal Highnesses desire, put off till the day following. At the Cross or Market-place, was erected a Theatre forty Foot square, covered with fine Carpets, and hung with rich Tapestry, upon which were placed four large Tables, covered with high Pyramids of all sorts of Banquet, the Table for his Royal Highness being some steps higher than the rest, under an Artificial Grove of Trees, laden with Oranges and Lemons. The Cross was adorned in like manner. The Kings Regiment of Guards, Commanded by the Earl of Linlithgow, and the Earl of Mar's Regiment were in Arms, and made a Lane from the Palace to the Netherbow Port, as the Trained Bands and the Militia Regiment did from thence to the Cross. At the Netherbow Port the Lord Provost, the Magistrates and Town-Council received his Royal Highness, being attended by the Lord Chancellor, and a great number of Nobility and Gentry, and followed by His Majesties Troop of Horse Guards, Commanded by the Marquis of Montrose; his Royal Highness was pleased to come out of his Coach, and to walk on foot to the Cross, the Lord Chancellor being on his Right hand, and the Lord Provost on the Left, preceded by the Magistrates and the City Officers, and followed by the Nobility and Gentry, who were all very rich in their Cloaths; being come to the Theatre, his Royal Highness was entertained with a most Noble Banquet, amidst the noise of Great Guns, Trumpets, Drums and Waits, and the Acclamations of the People; the Cross all the while running Wine at eight several Conduits.

His Royal Highness returned to the Palace in the same manner as he came, very much pleased to see so great a multitude of all sorts of people strive in the manner they did to express their Loyalty and Duty to the King, and affection to himself. In the Evening the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Town-Council, in their formalities as before, came to the Palace-Gate, where his Royal Highness was pleased to meet them, and at a great Bonfire that was made there, His Royal Highness began to the Lord Provost the Kings Health upon his Knee, which he, the Council, and all the Nobility and Gentry that were present, pledged upon their Knees, with Prayers of Health and Prosperity to the Majesties, their Royal Highnesses, and all the Royal Family. The rest of the night was spent with ringing of Bells, discharging the great Guns, Bonfires, and all other publick expressions of joy.

Phymouth, June 3. Wednesday last His Majesties Ship the *Constant Warwick*, Captain *Ashby* Commander, sailed from hence to the Eastward.

Westminster, June 8. Oliver Plunket, Titular Archbishop of Dublin, who was some time since, by His Majesties Command, brought over from Ireland, being accused of Treasonable Practices and Conspiracies against His Majesties Government in that His Kingdom, having been the last Term Arraigned upon an Indictment of High Treason, at the Kings-Bench Bar, was this morning brought to his Trial, and upon a full Evidence was found Guilty of the said High Treasons.

Whitehall, June 8. His Majesty came hither this Morning, and was present at Council, and in the Afternoon returned again to Windsor.
