THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to allow a certain Proportion of the Militia of Great Britain to enlist voluntarily into the Regular Forces.

An Act to allow a certain Proportion of the Militia in Ireland voluntarily to enlist into His Majesty's Regular Forces.

An Act to prohibit the Distillation of Spirits from Corn or Grain in the United Kingdom for a limited Time.

An Act to suspend the Importation of British or Irish-made Spirits into Great Britain or Ireland respectively, until the 1st Day of June 1809.

An Act to grant Bounties on the Importation of Flax Seed into Ireland from Great Britain until the 8th Day of April 1809, and to amend the Laws for the Regulation of the Linen Manufacture in Ireland, so far as relates to Importers of Flax Seed.

An Act for the Relief of Prisoners in Custody for Nonpayment of Money, pursuant to Orders of Courts of Equity.

An Act for amending an Act of the Forty-fourth Year of His present Majesty, for regulating certain Fisheries in the County of Cumberland, and other Places therein mentioned, so far as respects the Fishery in the River Derwent.

An Act for better enabling the Company of Proprietors of the Aberdeenshire Canal Navigation to raise the necessary Funds to complete the same.

An Act for more effectually improving the Streets, Lanes, and public Passages in the Town of Gainfborough, in the County of Lincoln, and for laying a

Duty on Coals brought to the said Town to be sold.

An Act for making and maintaining a Road from Rotherham to Swinton, in the West Riding of the County of York.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of Two Acts of His present Majesty for repairing the Road from Ashbourne to Sudbury, and from Sudbury to Yoxall-Bridge, and from Hatton-Moor to Tudbury, in the Counties of Derby and Stafford, and for making Two new Branches of Road to communicate therewith.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of Two Acts of His late and present Majesty, for repairing several Roads in the Counties of Derby, Leicester, and Warwick.

I HAVE the Honour to acquaint you, that Yesterday His Majesty's Sloop under my Command, after a Chase of Four Hours, came up with and captured *La Becune*, French Privateer Schooner, mounting One long Nine-Pounder amidships, and Two Carronades, small Arms, &c. with a Complement of Thirty-eight Men. She is coppered, and sails very fast; out Ten Days from Martinique on a 'Three Months' Cruise, and has made one Capture.

SIR,

I HAVE inclosed a Letter for their Lordships' Information from Captain Hawker, of His Majesty's Ship *Melampus*, who, with his usual Activity and Zeal, has captured, after some Resistance, the French Corvette *Colibri*, of Fourteen Twenty-four-Pounder Carronades and Two long Eight-Pounders, with a Complement of Ninety-two Men, commanded by Lieutenant de Vaisseau des Landes, and having on board Five Hundred and Seventy Barrels of Flour, and a great Quantity of Gunpowder, for the Relief of the Enemy's Islands. The above Vessel is new off the Stocks, and of a superior Class of Workmanship; coppered and fastened, and appears well calculated for His Majesty's Service.

SIR,
HAVING seen the Transports in Safety to Barbadoes agreeably to your Orders, and being on my Return to the Northward on the 16th Instant, in Latitude $19^{\circ} 30'$, Longitude $59^{\circ} 39'$, the *Melampus* captured the French National Brig *Le Colibri*, Monf. Deslandes, Lieutenant de Vaisseau, Commander, of Sixteen Twenty-four-Pounder Carronades and Ninety-two Men, Three of which were killed, a Lieutenant with Eleven wounded, through the persevering Endeavours of her Commander to escape, who had the Temerity to return our Fire for a short Time when fairly alongside. She is quite new; from Cherbourg bound with a Cargo of Flour and Gunpowder for the Relief of St. Domingo; had taken and sunk Two English Brigs from Newfoundland to Lisbon, (the *Hannibal* and *Priscilla* of Dartmouth).

BY THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HIS MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to allow for Two Years from and after the passing of this Act, an additional Bounty on Double Refined Sugar, and to extend former Bounties on other Refined Sugar to such as shall be pounded, crashed, or broken; and to allow, for One Year, certain Bounties on British Plantation Raw Sugar exported;" reciting, "that whereas by the Laws now in force in Great Britain and Ireland respectively, it is required that Refined Sugar exported for the Bounties shall be in Lumps or Loaves complete and whole; and that it is expedient that the said Bounties shall be continued to be allowed and paid on the Exportation of the same from the Ports of London and Dublin, although such Lumps or Loaves may be pounded, crashed, or broken;" it is enacted, "That on the due Exportation of Refined Sugar for the Bounties under those Laws, the same Bounties respectively shall be allowed and paid under the Provisions and Regulations of those Acts, on such Lumps and Loaves as may be pounded, crashed, or broken under the Regulations of this Act:" And whereas by the said Act it is further enacted, "That whenever it shall be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury for the Time being, in Great Britain or Ireland respectively, that proper Refineries are established and carried on at or near to any Port of the United Kingdom, to which it would be safe, in their Judgment, to extend the Benefit granted by this Act to the Ports of London and Dublin, it shall and may be lawful for the Lord High Treasurer, or the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, in Great Britain or Ireland respectively, to declare that the Regulations of this Act shall be extended to such Port; provided that

no Bounty shall be paid or allowed upon Refined Sugar or Candy exported from any such Port, unless and until the Lord High Treasurer, or the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, in Great Britain or Ireland respectively, shall have signified their Approbation thereof by Publication in the London or Dublin Gazette respectively; and from and after the Day mentioned in such Publication, all and every the Provisions, Powers, Authorities, Penalties, Forfeitures, Regulations, Acts, Matters, and Things in this Act contained, or any Way relating to the Allowance of the Bounties on such Lump or Loaf Sugar pounded, crashed, or broken, or on Sugar Candy, in pursuance thereof, shall extend and be construed to extend to the Port or Ports named in such Order, in like Manner, in every Respect, and as fully and amply to all Intents and Purposes, as if such Port or Ports had been expressly named in this Act:"

And whereas it has been made appear to our Satisfaction, that proper Refineries are established and carried on in the Port of Glasgow, in that Part of the United Kingdom called Scotland, and it is in our Judgment safe to extend to the said Port the Benefit granted by the said Act to the Ports of London and Dublin; we, the undersigned Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, do therefore, pursuant to the said Act, hereby declare that the Regulations of the said Act shall, from the Day of the Date hereof, be extended to the said Port of Glasgow.

For every Hundred Pound contained in such Certificate or Certificates, at his, her, or their Option, that is to say:

To One Hundred and Three Pounds Five Shillings Capital Stock in Annuities, after the Rate of Five Pounds per Centum per Annum, to be added to and made one joint Stock with the Five Pound per Centum Annuities created by an Act, made in the Thirty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for granting Annuities to satisfy certain Navy, Victualling, Transport, and Exchequer Bills, and to commence on the 5th January 1809; or,

To Eighty-one Pounds Eight Shillings Capital Stock in the said Annuities, after the Rate of Five Pounds per Centum per Annum, together with Twenty six Pounds Five Shillings Capital Stock in Annuities, after the Rate of Four Pounds per Centum per Annum, to commence from the 5th Day of April 1809, which said Annuities are to be redeemable at the same Time and in like Manner as the said Annuities already established and are now redeemable by Parliament, and to be charged upon and payable out of the Consolidated Fund of Great Britain.
