The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHERAS by an Act made and passed in the Forty-sixth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for authorizing His Majesty in Council to allow, during the present War, and for Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, the Importation and Exportation of certain Goods and Commodities in Neutral Ships, into and from His Majesty's Territories in the West Indies and Continent of South America," it is enacted, That from and after the passing of the said Act, it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, by and with the Advice of His and their Privy Council, to permit, or to authorize the Governors of the said Islands and Territories, in such Manner and under such Restrictions as to His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, shall seem fit, to permit, when the Necessity of the Case shall appear to His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to require it, from Time to Time during the present War, and for Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, the Importation into, and Exportation from, any Island in the West Indies, (in which Description the Bahama Islands and the Bermuda or Somer Islands are included), or any Lands or Territories on the Continent of South America to His Majesty belonging, of any such Articles, Goods, and Commodities as shall be mentioned in such Order of His Majesty in Council, in any Ships or Vessels belonging to the Subjects of any State in Amity with His Majesty, in such Manner as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, by and with the Advice aforesaid, shall direct; Provided such Ships or Vessels shall duly enter into, report, and deliver their respective Cargoes, and reload at such Ports only where regular Custom-Houses shall have been established: And where as it appears at present to be necessary to permit for a limited Time, subject to be sooner terminated, varied, or altered, as is hereinafter provided, the Importation into and Exportation from the Islands and Territories of His Majesty in the West Indies (including the Bahama Islands and the Bermuda or Somer Islands), and the Lands and Territories on

the Continent of South America to His Majesty belonging, of certain Articles, Goods, and Commodities hereinafter mentioned in any Ships or Vessels belonging to the Subjects of any State in Amity with His Majesty: His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and doth hereby order, that the Governors and Lieutenant-Governors of His Majesty's Islands and Colonies in the West Indies, (in which Description the Bahama Islands and the Bermuda or Somer Islands are included), and of any Lands or Territories on the Continent of South America, to His Majesty belonging, and each and every of such Governors and Lieutenant-Governors shall be authorized, and they and each and every of them are hereby authorized to permit, for Twelve Months from the Date hereof, subject to be sooner terminated, varied, or altered, as is hereinafter provided, in any Ships or Vessels belonging to the Subjects of any State in Amity with His Majesty, the Importation into the said Islands, Colonies, Lands, and Territories respectively, of Staves and Lumber, Horses, Mules, Asses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, and every other Species of Live Stock, and Live Provisions, and also of every Kind of Provisions whatsoever (Beef, Pork, and Butter excepted), which are the Growth or Produce of the Country to which such Ship or Vessel importing the same shall belong; and also the Exportation from the said Islands, Colonies, Lands, and Territories respectively into which such Importation of Staves, Lumber, and Provisions as aforesaid shall be made, of Rum and Molasses, and of any other Articles, Goods, and Commodities whatsoever, except Sugar, Indigo, Cotton-Wool, Coffee, and Cocoa; Provided always, That such Ships or Vessels shall duly enter into, report, and deliver their respective Cargoes, and reload at such Ports only where regular Custom-Houses shall have been established.

But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, nevertheless, and His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, is further pleased to order, and doth hereby order, that nothing hereinbefore contained shall be construed to permit, after the First of November One thousand eight hundred and nine, the Importation of Staves, Lumber, Horses, Mules, Asses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, Live Stock, Live Provisions, or any Kind of Provisions whatsoever as

aforesaid, into any of the said Islands, Colonies, Lands, or Territories, in which there shall not be at the Time when such Articles shall be brought for Importation a Tonnage Duty of not less than Five Shillings Sterling per Ton on every Ship or Vessel bringing the same, according to the Admeasurement of such Ship or Vessel, not to permit, after the First of July One thousand eight hundred and nine, the Importation of Fish into any of the said Islands, Colonies, Lands, or Territories, in which there shall not be at the Time when such Fish shall be brought for Importation, a Duty of not less than One Shilling Sterling per Quintal on dried or salted Cod, or Ling Fish cured or salted, and a proportionate Duty per Barrel on cured or pickled Shads, Alewives, Mackarel, or Salmon so imported, and also a Tonnage Duty to the Amount above mentioned on every Ship or Vessel bringing such Fish, according to the Admeasurement of such Ship or Vessel.

And His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, is further pleased to order, and doth hereby order, that notwithstanding any Thing hereinbefore contained, the said Permission and Authority to import and export shall cease and determine, or be varied and altered, before the Expiration of the abovementioned Period of Twelve Months, at the Expiration of Six Months after the Notification, in the London Gazette, of any Order of His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, for revoking, varying, or altering such Permission and Authority, or shall cease and determine at the Expiration of Six Months after the Ratification of a definitive Treaty of Peace.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intitled "An Act to authorize His Majesty, during the present War, to make Regulations respecting the Trade and Commerce to and from the Cape of Good Hope," it is enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by any Order or Orders, to be issued from Time to Time, to give such Directions, and make such Regulations touching the Trade and Commerce to and from the said Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, as to His Majesty in Council shall appear most expedient and salutary, any Thing contained in an Act, passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of His Majesty King Charles the Second, intitled "An Act for encouraging and increasing of Shipping and Navigation;" or in an Act, passed in the Seventh and Eighth Years of the Reign of His Majesty King William the Third, intitled "An Act for preventing Frauds, and regulating Abuses in the Plantation Trade;" or any other Act or Acts of Parliament now in force, relating to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations; or any other Act or Acts of Parliament, Law, Usage, or Custom to the contrary notwithstanding; His Majesty is hereby pleased to order, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, in pursuance of the

Powers vested in His Majesty by the above-recited Act, and it is hereby ordered, that it shall be lawful, until further Order, for all Ships and Vessels belonging to the Subjects of any Country or State in Amity with His Majesty, to enter into the Ports of the said Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof; and to carry on Trade and Traffic with the Inhabitants of the said Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof; and to import and export to and from the Ports of the said Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, any Goods, Wares, or Merchandize whatsoever, subject to the following Exceptions, Duties, Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions; that is to say, It shall and may be lawful for the Governor of the said Settlement, and of the Territories or Dependencies thereof, for the Time being, to impose on all Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, not of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland, which shall be imported into the said Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, after due Notice to be given by the Governor of the said Settlement as hereinafter directed, a Duty, not exceeding Fifteen per Cent on the Value thereof; such Duty to be rated and collected in the same Manner as is in Use with Regard to the Import Duty now levied at the said Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, from and in Ships and Vessels belonging to the Subjects of Countries and States in Amity with His Majesty, and upon the Goods and Merchandize imported in the same; provided always, that the Time of the Commencement of such Duty shall be fixed in the Proclamation, or other lawful Instrument which shall be made and issued by the said Governor for the Purpose of imposing such Duty, which Time shall not be less than Six Months from the Day of issuing such Proclamation or other lawful Instrument; and provided also, that the Rate of Duty imposed on the Importation of Goods (not the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland) from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, when so imported in British-built Vessels, owned and navigated according to Law, shall in no Case be so high as that which shall be imposed on the like Goods so imported in the Vessels of Foreign States.

And it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that no Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the Countries to the Eastward of the Cape of Good Hope, be imported into the said Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except by the United Company of Merchants trading to the East Indies; and that no such Goods, Wares, or Merchandize be permitted to be exported from thence, except for Sea Stores only, or by the United Company of Merchants trading to the East Indies, or by their Licence.

But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing in this Order contained shall extend to prevent Ships or Vessels employed in the Southern Whale Fishery from carrying on the same, in such and the same Manner as might have been done if this Order had not been made.

And it is also His Majesty's Pleasure, that no Arms, or Artillery, Gunpowder, or Ammunition of any Sort, be allowed to be imported into the said

Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except by the said United Company of Merchants in England trading to the East Indies, or by Licence from His Majesty.

And it is His Majesty's further Pleasure, that the Trade and Commerce to and from the said Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, shall be subject to such of the Laws of Trade and Navigation as would have affected the same if this Order had not been made, except so far as such Laws are contrary to this present Order.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. *Steph. Cottrell.*

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by sundry Acts of Parliament, His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the 5th of October last, to allow, and did thereby allow, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and nine, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain, of certain Articles of Provision, in the Manner and under the Conditions therein mentioned; and whereas by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, it is enacted, that an Act, made in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation, and to permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament," which was continued by an Act of the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Years of His present Majesty, and amended and further continued by several subsequent Acts until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and nine, shall, from and after the said Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and nine, be, and the same is thereby, further continued until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and ten, except so far as respects the Exportation of Corn, Grain, or Flour to Ireland; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and ten, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans, called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavaucies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also of Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, and of Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, (except Salted Beef, and Pork,) and of Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty

whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be imported with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the said above-recited Act, passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly. *Steph. The Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-fifth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for making further Provision for the effectual Performance of Quarantine," it is among other Things enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the Lords and others of His Majesty's Privy Council, or any Three or more of them, to make such Order as they shall see necessary and expedient upon any unforeseen Emergency, or in any particular Case or Cases with respect to any Ship or Ships, Vessel or Vessels arriving and having any infectious Disease or Distemper on board, or on board of which any infectious Disease or Distemper may have appeared in the Course of the Voyage, or arriving under any other alarming or suspicious Circumstances as to Infection, although such Ship or Ships, Vessel or Vessels shall not have come from any Place or Places from which His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, may have adjudged and declared it probable that the Plague, or any such infectious Disease or Distemper may be brought, and also with respect to the Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize on board the same; and all such Orders so made by the Lords or others of the Privy Council, or any Three or more of them as aforesaid, shall be as good, valid, and effectual to all Intents and Purposes (as well with respect to the Commander, Master, or other Person having the Charge of any such Ship or Vessel, and all other Persons on board the same, as with respect to any other Persons having any Intercourse or Communication with them, and to the Penalties, Forfeitures, and Punishments to which they may respectively become liable) as any Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection as aforesaid, and notified by Proclamation or published in the London Gazette:

And whereas Advices have been received, that a dangerous Fever of a very contagious Description has prevailed in the Ports of Stockholm and Carlscrona, and particularly the latter, and has raged with the most fatal Violence during even the Severity of the Winter; and as there must have been some Danger of the same having spread throughout the Kingdom of Sweden, it is hereby ordered in Council, That all Ships and Vessels coming from or having touched at the Ports of Stockholm or Carlscrona,

or any other Port in Sweden, or having received any Person or Persons, Goods, Wares or Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any other Articles whatever, from out of any such Ship or Vessel, shall, on their Arrival on the Coasts of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark and Man, come to Anchor at such Place and Places as have been or shall be appointed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, within or without the Port to which such Ships or Vessels shall be bound, in order that the State of Health of the Crew and Persons on board may be duly examined into and ascertained, prior to such Ships and Vessels being permitted to enter the Port of their Destination; and that in the mean Time, no Intercourse with any other Ship or Vessel, or Boat, or with the Shore, shall be permitted, nor any of the Crew or Persons on board such Ships or Vessels be suffered to come or be brought on Shore:

And it is hereby further Ordered, That in case upon such Examination it shall appear to the Superintendent or other Principal Officer of the Customs employed in the Quarantine Service, that such Ships or Vessels have the same contagious Fever actually on board, or that any of the Crew or Persons on board have been ill or have died of such contagious Fever within the Space of Forty Days prior to the Arrival of such Ships or Vessels on the Coasts of this Kingdom, or of the Islands aforesaid, or that in the Event of any Death occasioned by such contagious Fever having taken Place on board at an earlier Period of the Voyage than Forty Days prior to their Arrival on the Coasts of this Kingdom, or of the Islands aforesaid, the Clothes and Bedding, and all Personal Effects susceptible of Infection worn by or belonging to the Persons so deceased were not thrown overboard and sunk immediately upon such Decease, or as soon after as possible; or in case it shall appear that such Ships had within the Space of Forty Days, prior to Arrival on the Coasts of this Kingdom, or of the Islands aforesaid, received any Person or Persons, or any of the Articles hereinbefore mentioned, from out of any Ship, Vessel or Boat coming from the Ports of Stockholm and Carlscrona, or any other Port in Sweden, then and in such Case every such Ship and Vessel, with their Cargoes and Persons on board, shall perform a Quarantine of Fifteen Days (or of such farther Time as may be afterwards directed by any Order or Orders of Three or more of the Lords or others of His Majesty's Privy Council) at the several Places appointed for the Performance of Quarantine by Ships subject and liable thereto, and bound to the said several Ports respectively:

And it is hereby further ordered, That notwithstanding the Ships and Vessels arriving or to arrive from any of the Ports of Sweden, may not be found liable to the Performance of Quarantine as above directed, no Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, enumerated in the First Class of His Majesty's said Order in Council, bearing Date the Fifth of April One thousand eight hundred and five, concerning Quarantine, which may be imported in any of the said Ships from any of the Ports of Sweden, nor any Packages of Goods, which Packages may consist wholly or in Part of any of the said Articles so enumerated, be suffered to be landed or brought on Shore, but shall be taken out of the Ships and Vessels

importing the same, and sent to the usual Place appointed for the Performance of Quarantine, and be there opened and aired for the Space of Fifteen Days, as directed by His Majesty's said Order in Council of the Fifth of April One thousand eight hundred and five, Sec. 13. with respect to Goods, Wares and Merchandizes coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General, and the Rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors and Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
