aforelaid, into any of the faid Islands, Colonies, Lands, or Territories, in which there shall not be at the Time when fuch Articles shall be brought for Importation a Tonnage Duty of not less than Five Shillings Sterling per Fon on every Ship or Vessel bringing the same, according to the Admeasurement of such Ship or Vessel, not to permit, after the First of July One thousand eight hundred and nine, the Importation of Fish into any of the said Island, Colonies, Lands, or Territories, in which there shall not be at the Time when such Fish shall be brought for Importation, a Duty of not less than One Shilling Sterling per Quintal on dried or falted Cod, or Ling Fish cured or falted, and a proportionate Duty per Barrel on cured or pickled Shads, Alewives, Mackarel, or Salmon fo imported, and also a Tonnage Duty to the Amount above mentioned on every Ship or Veffel bringing fuch Fish, according to the Admeasurement of such Ship or Vessel.

And His Majelly, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, is further pleased to order, and doth hereby order, that notwithstanding any Thing herein-before contained, the said Permission and Authority to import and export shall cease and determine, or be varied and altered, before the Expiration of the sabovementioned Period of Twelve Months, at the Expiration of Six Months after the Notification, in the London Gazette, of any Order of His Majelly, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, for revoking, varying, or altering such Permission and Authority, or shall cease and determine at the Expiration of Six Months after the Ratification of a desinitive Treaty of Peace.

## PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled " An Act to anthorife His Majetly, during the prefent War, to make Regulations respecting the Trade and Commerce to and from the Cape of Good Hope," it is enacted, that from and after the passing of the faid Act, it shall and may be lawful for His Majelly, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by any Order or Orders to be iffued from Time to Time, to give fuch Directions, and make fuch Regulations touching the Trade and Commerce to and . from the faid Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, as to His Majelly in Council shall appear most expedient and falutary, any Thing contained in an Act, passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of His Majesty King Charles the Second, intituled "An Act for encouraging and increasing of Shipping and Navigation;" or in an Act, palled in the Seventh and Fighth Years of the Reign of His Majefty King William the Third, intituled "An Act for preventing Frauds, and regulating Abuses in the Plantation Trade;" or any other Act or Acts of Parliament now in force, relating to Hi slajetty's Colonies and Plantations; or any other An ar As of Parliament, Law, Ulage, or Cuttom to the coursey notwithlanding; Ess Majerly is hereby pleated to energy by and with the Powers velted in His Majesty by the above-recited Act, and it is hereby ordered, that it shall be lawful, until further Order, for all Ships and Vessels belonging to the Subjects of any Country or State in Amity with His Majesty, to enter into the Ports of the faid Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof; and to carry on Trade and Traffic with the luhabitants of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof; and to import and export to and from the Ports of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, any Goods, Wares, or Merchandize whatsoever, subject to the following Exceptions, Duties, Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions; that is to say, It shall and may be lawful for the Governor of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories or Dependencies thereof, for the Time being, to impose on all Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, not of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland, which shall be imported into the said Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, after due Notice to be given by the Governor of the faid Settlement as heremafter directed, a Duty, not exceeding Fifteen per Cent on the Value thereof; fuch Duty to be rated and collected in the fame Manner as is in Ule with Regard to the Import Duty now levied at the faid Settlement, and the Terreitories and Dependencies thereof, from and in Ships and Veffels belonging to the Subjects of Countries and States in Amity with His Majesty, and opon the Goods and Merchandize imported in the same; provided always, that the Time of the Commencement of such Duty shall be fixed in the Proclamation, or other lawful Influment which shall be made and issued by the faid Governor for the Purpole of impoling such Duty, which Time shall not be less than Six Months from the Day of iffuing fuch Proclamation or other lawful Inffrunent; and provided also, that the Rate of Duty imposed on the Importation of Goods (not the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland) from any Part of His Majetty's Dominians, when to imported in British-baid Veffels, owned and navigated according to Law, shall in no Cafe be so high as that which shall be imposed on the like Goods to imported in the Vessels of Foreign States.

And it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that no Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the Countries to the Fastward of the Cape of Good Hope, be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except by the United Company of Merchants trading to the East Indies; and that no such Goods, Wares, or Merchandize be permitted to be exported from thence, except for Sea Stores only, or by the United Company of Merchants trading to the East Indies, or by their Licence.

But it is His Majetly's Pleafure, that nothing in this Order contained shall extend to prevent Ships or Vessels employed in the Southern Whale Fishery from carrying on the same, in such and the same Manner as might have been done if this Order had not been made.
