The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS a Treaty of Amity has been concluded between His Majesty and the Sublime Porte, it is this Day ordered by His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, That the Order made by His Majesty in Council, bearing Date the Thirteenth of May One thousand eight hundred and seven, by which it is directed, "That no Ships or Vessels belonging to any of His Majesty's Subjects be permitted to enter and clear out for any of the Ports within the Dominions of the Grand Signior until further Order, and that a general Embargo or Stop be made of all Ships or Vessels whatever belonging to the Subjects of the Grand Signior within any of His Majesty's Dominions, together with all Persons and Effects on board all such Ships and Vessels; and that the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War and Privateers do detain and bring into Port all Ships and Vessels belonging to the Subjects of the Grand Signior, or bearing the Flag of the Ottoman Empire," be henceforth revoked and discharged: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, bearing Date the Twenty-sixth April One thousand eight hundred and nine, His Majesty was pleased to direct, that the Blockade imposed by that Order should extend to all Ports and Places as far North as the River Ems inclusively; His Majesty, more distinctly to ascertain the Places to be taken as included within the Limits of the said Blockade, is

pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Blockade shall be construed to extend so as to comprehend the Eastern as well as the Western Ems; and to prevent all Vessels from sailing into or out of that River by any Channel to the Westward of the Island of Juyll: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *Steph. THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*
