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Oxford, June 14. It having at a late Common-Council held here, been unanimously Resolved, That the Right Honourable James Lord Norreys, Baron of Rydgot, Lord Lieutenant of this County, and Henry Bertie Esq; his Brother, should be received into the Liberties of this City, and have Bayliffs places in the Council-Chamber; several of the said Council-Chamber did attend his Lordship and Mr. Bertie, to do the City the Honor to accept thereof; which they did, and came hither the next day for that purpose. His Lordship and Mr. Bertie were accompanied with several Gentlemen of this County, and were received at the farthest extent of the Liberties of this City in a Meadow called Portmeadow, by the Assistants to the Mayor, by greatest part of the Council-Chamber, and other Gentlemen of this City, to the number of 300 Persons, all on Horseback, and before they came hither, were met by above 300 Freemen on Foot, who attended them into the City, the Bells Ringing, Trumpets Sounding, Drums Beating and the City-Musick Playning as they pass along. In this manner his Lordship and Mr. Bertie were conducted to the Town-Hall, where the Mayor and his Brethren expelled them, and having sworn them Freemen of this City, they took their Places as Members of the Council-Chamber, there being then about 1000 Freemen in the Court-Hall; after which, his Lordship very Nobly entertained the Citizens, and so returned home.

The Humble Address of the Burgh, Appoyed Men, and Burgesses of the Burgh of Dundee, in the County of Southampton.

WE Your Majesty most Dutiful and Loyal Subject, who do rejoice in nothing more than the Glory of our Obedience to Gods A:nted, who is (next under God) our Supreme Governour upon earth and the most Gracious of Christian Kings, having not only heard with all due Reverence and Attention, Your Majesty's late Declaration received publickly in your Church; but also Read and Revolved it in our several private Houses, and in our Hearts; and being provoked to Prayers by the many most Laudable and Loyal Addresses of our most dutiful Subjects, do think it our Duty to acknowledge the Blessings of God and Your Majesty, the inimitable Happiness we enjoy, more than any other Subjects through out the whole World under Your Majesty's most Gracious Government; who as of Your Majesty's Declaration is one great Blessing, and it is a convincing Argument. For therein we have discovered to our unspeakable Comfort and Satisfaction, Your Majesty's Care and Resolution (as a True Defender of the true Faith) to protect us in the enjoyment of the Privileges to us by Law established, against those Endeavours and Attempts which have of late been made against us, as well by Foreign as Home-bred Enemies, as well by the Popish as Fanatick Faction, the constant Enviours of our Happiness, and disturbers of our Peace, ever since the time of our Reformation. Therein we see our Obligation to give Your Majesty our most humble and hearty Thanks, for Declaring in behalf of our legal Rights and Liberties, against the Incurfions, Infringings, and Arbitrary Government of Fellow-Subjects; and for declaring in behalf of all the Laws we live under, Your Resolution to support and maintain the Monarchy; with all the Rights and Prerogatives belonging to it; without which we are hindered by the woful experience of twenty years (even from the birth of the late Rebellion, until Your Majesty's most happy Restoration) we shall not be able to enjoy any thing of our former Lives of Liveliness; but shall relapse into the misery of having our Men and Servants to bear the Burden of their unthankfull acknowledgements and ungrateful and unchristianlike Treacheries, to continue us in the same state and condition of Parliament, for which Your Majesty has already made a provision, by a Law made in the Sixteenth year of Your Majesty's happy Reign.

In consideration of all which Premises, we Humbly beseech Your Majesty to accept of our most unfeigned Thankfulness, promising our selves at Your Majesty's Feet, and promising that we will be the best of our Lives, Liberties, and Fortunes, we will be true and fidele to Your Majesty, and lawfull Successors, in the full and perfect Your Majesty's Person, Crown and Dignity; and although we are of Your Majesty's good Subjects have more earnestly desired, yet none shall ever exceed us in Dutiful Allegiance.
