AT the Court at the *Queen's Palace*, the 24th of *May* 1809,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the Twenty-sixth of April last, to declare certain Ports and Places of the Countries which have been lately styled the Kingdom of Holland, to be subject to the Restrictions incident to a strict and rigorous Blockade, as continued from His Majesty's former Order of the Eleventh of November One thousand eight hundred and seven; and whereas Advices have been received of a certain provisional Agreement entered into by His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary in America, with the Government of the United States, whereby it is understood that His Majesty's Orders in Council of the Seventh of January and of the Eleventh of November One thousand eight hundred and seven, shall be withdrawn so far as respects the United States, on the Tenth of June next.

And whereas, although the said Provisional Agreement is not such as was authorized by His Majesty's Instructions, or such as His Majesty can approve, it may already have happened, or may happen, that Persons being Citizens of the said United States may be led by a Reliance on the said Provisional Agreement, to engage in Trade with and to the said Ports and Places of Holland, contrary to, and in violation of the Restrictions imposed by the said Orders of the Seventh of January and of the Eleventh of November One thousand eight hundred and seven, as altered by the Order of the Twenty-sixth of April last; His Majesty, in order to prevent any Inconveniences that may ensue from the Circumstance above recited, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That the said several Orders shall be suspended, so far as is necessary for the Protection

of Vessels of the said United States, so sailing under the Faith of the said Provisional Agreement, videlicet, That after the Ninth Day of June next, no Vessel of the United States, which shall have cleared out between the Nineteenth of April last, and the Twentieth of July ensuing, for any of the Ports of Holland aforesaid from any Port of the United States, shall be molested or interrupted in her Voyage by the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships or Privateers.

And it is further ordered, that no Vessels of the United States, which shall have cleared out from any Port of America previous to the Twentieth of July next, for any other permitted Port, and shall, during her Voyage, have changed her Destination, in consequence of Information of the said Provisional Agreement, and shall be proceeding to any of the Ports of Holland aforesaid, shall be molested or interrupted by the Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Privateers, unless such Vessel shall have been informed of this Order on her Voyage, and shall have been warned not to proceed to any of the Ports of Holland aforesaid, and shall, notwithstanding such Warning, be found attempting to proceed to any such Port.

And it is further ordered, that after the said Ninth Day of June next, no Vessel of the said United States which shall have cleared out, or be destined to any of the Ports of Holland from any other Port or Place not subject to the Restrictions of the said Order of the Twenty-sixth of April last, after Notice of such Provisional Agreement as aforesaid, shall be molested or interrupted in her Voyage by the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships or Privateers, provided such Vessel shall have so cleared out previous to actual Notice of this Order at such Place of Clearance, or in default of Proof of actual Notice previous to the like Periods of Time after the Date of this Order, as are fixed for constructive Notice of His Majesty's Order of the Eleventh of November, One thousand eight hundred and seven, by the Orders of the Twen-

ty fifth November, One thousand eight hundred and seven, and of the Eighteenth of May One thousand eight hundred and eight, at certain Places and Latitudes therein mentioned, unless such Vessel shall be informed of this Order on her Voyage, and warned by any of His Majesty's Ships or Privateers not to proceed to any Port of Holland, and shall, notwithstanding such Warning, attempt to proceed to any such Port.

And His Majesty is pleased further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said several Orders of the Seventh of January and Eleventh of November One thousand eight hundred and seven, as altered by the said Order of the Twenty-sixth of April last, shall also be suspended, so far as is necessary for the Protection of Vessels of the said United States which shall clear out, to any Ports not declared to be under the Restriction of Blockade from any Port of Holland between the Ninth Day of June and the First Day of July next; provided always, that nothing that is contained in the present Order shall extend, or be construed to extend, to protect any Vessels or their Cargoes, that may be liable to Condemnation or Detention for any other Cause than the Violation of the aforesaid Orders of the Seventh of January and the Eleventh of November One thousand eight hundred and seven, as altered by the said Order of the Twenty-sixth of April last.

Provided also, that nothing in this Order contained shall extend, or be construed to extend to protect any Vessel which shall attempt to enter any Port actually blockaded by any of His Majesty's Ships of War.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America, and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorise, or by Warrant or Warrants under His Sign Manual,

to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorise, in Case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorised to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in Conformity to such Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants respectively; and except by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law: And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, and also Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, and also Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, may be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which within the Space of Nine Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or other His Majesty's Dominions in Europe; for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorised in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter mentioned; which Licence shall continue and be in Force for Nine Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which such Licence is respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September next, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel, to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour, or Place in the said Island of Newfoundland, where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Live Stock, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first endorsed on the Back of such Licence the

Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned; and the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence so endorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland respectively, by whom such Licence was granted.

Now be it known, that the said [Person's Name], hath a Licence to lade on board the said Ship, [Ship's Name] at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, and also Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, the Produce of the said United States, and no other Article whatsoever; and to carry the said Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Live Stock, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine to some Port or Place in the Island of Newfoundland; and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, and the Number of Live

Stock, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector, or other proper Officer of the Customs.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-third Day of November last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Sixth Day of June next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise; without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

VICE-ADMIRAL SIR JAMES SAUMAREZ, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Baltic, has transmitted to the Hon. W. W. Pole, a Letter which he had received from Captain Hollis, of His Majesty's Ship the Standard, who had been detached with the Ships and Vessels named in the Margin\*, for the Purpose of attacking the Island of Anholt, giving an Account of its Reduction on the 18th Instant, by a Party of Seamen and Marines, landed under the Command of Captain Selby, of the Owen Glendour, assisted by Captain Edward Nicholls, of the Royal Marines. The Garrison, consisting of One Hundred and Seventy Men, surrendered at Discretion. On our Side One private Marine was killed and Two wounded.

The Acquisition of this Island is stated to be of Importance in furnishing Supplies of Water to His Majesty's Fleet, and affording a good Anchorage to the Trade in going to or coming from the Baltic.

*Copy of a Letter from Captain Pater, of His Majesty's Ship the Princess Carolina, to Rear-Admiral Sir Richard Strachan, of which the former has transmitted a Copy to the Honourable W. W. Pole.*

*His Majesty's Ship Princess Carolina, off the Texel, May 21, 1809.*

SIR,

AS I had been informed that a Schooner lay in the Vlie Passage to guard that Anchorage, and having thought it practicable to cut her out, I beg to inform you, that having drifted to the Northward so as to open the said Passage, I last Night made the Attempt (taking with me Lieutenants Balford and Dobbs, and Lieutenant Furzer of the Royal Marines, who volunteered) with Four Boats of His Majesty's Ship under my Command, which I am happy to say succeeded, by boarding her at Half-past Eleven o'Clock P. M. and in a few Minutes after discharging her Guns surrendered. She proves to be the King of Holland's Schooner Admiral Pietheyer, of Seven Guns, Three Twelve and Four Eight-Pounders, with One Brass Howitzer, Twenty-four-Pounder, commanded by Lieutenant D. Van Hearekerch; is Five Years old, Copper-bottomed; she carries Two Bow Chasers, Twelve-Pounders, and One aft; her Complement is Twenty-seven Men, all of whom were at their Guns to receive us, having seen the Ship at Anchor and expected the Attack. I am happy to add not any Lives were lost on this Occasion; and I feel it a Duty I owe the Officers and Men I have the Honour to command, to say, that had the Strength of the Enemy been greater, they manifested a Forwardness and Zeal on this Occasion that would have done Honour to their Country.

*May it please your Majesty,*

THE very gracious Letter with which your Majesty has been pleased to honour this General Assembly of our National Church, has been received by us with the most profound Respect and Gratitude.

That your Majesty has again thought fit to entrust to the Right Honourable Francis Lord Napier, your Commissioner, to represent your Royal Person on this solemn Occasion, we regard as a renewed Mark of that gracious Attention which your Majesty has been accustomed to shew to our Interest and to our Wishes. On former Occasions his Conduct in the high Office committed to him, has commanded our Esteem; and on the present, we are

confident that it will be such as to call forth our merited Approbation.

We place the most perfect Reliance on the Assurance which, by your Majesty's Command, he has again given us of your unalterable Attachment to those Principles of Religion which are alone the Means of directing the Conduct of Princes, those Principles which are so intimately connected with the Existence of our incomparable Constitution, and which, by being invariably maintained by your Majesty, have preserved it amidst the Destruction of surrounding Nations. Of the inestimable Blessings resulting to this Realm from your Majesty's scrupulous Observance of the religious and political Duties of your exalted Station, we are fully sensible; and it is a Subject of high Satisfaction to us, that we live under a Sovereign who so clearly perceives the necessary Connection of these Duties with each other, and so invariably adheres to them as the Means of promoting the Prosperity of his Empire.

Your Majesty's Solitude to impress us with the wise and enlightened Sentiments entertained by your Majesty on this most important Subject, will animate us to use our best Endeavours to preserve the Portion of your Subjects committed to our pastoral Charge, in that State of Purity of Principle and Rectitude of Conduct, which may long continue to them those Blessings which they now enjoy; and to impress them with a deep Conviction of the sincere and unshaken Attachment which your Majesty has never ceased to entertain to all your Subjects, but more particularly to that Part of them whose spiritual Guidance is committed to our Care.

We shall not fail to assure them, that if, in the Course of the Contest which your Majesty has been compelled to maintain, they have suffered from the Burthens unavoidably occasioned by a Struggle so arduous and protracted, your Majesty has ever regretted these Burthens, and that it has only been your Conviction of the Justice of your Cause which has enforced their Necessity. That Cause, we are firmly persuaded, is founded on Religion and political Virtue; and while your Majesty prosecutes it abroad by all the Means which the Almighty has placed in your Hands, we shall cordially contribute at Home our Efforts for its Success, by our fervent Prayers to the Sovereign Ruler of the Universe, by impressing Sentiments of Loyalty, Unanimity, Fortitude, and Perseverance on the People committed to our pastoral Care, and, above all, by the most zealous Endeavours to recommend to their Acceptance the salutary and ennobling Doctrines of the Gospel, which will continue to support them in the Hour of Trial. In the Discharge of these our peculiar Duties, it will be no small Encouragement to us, that thus we shall justify the Reliance which your Majesty condescends to place in our Virtue and Attachment.

We receive with sincere Gratitude your Majesty's Donation of One Thousand Pounds for promoting religious Knowledge in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland; and we shall endeavour to apply this Mark of your Royal Munificence in the Manner best calculated for promoting the pious Purpose for which it is bestowed.

That Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, may protect your Majesty and prolong your Reign; that he may bless the Queen, the Prince and Princess of Wales, and all the Royal Fa-

mily; that he may ever direct your Councils, and prosper the Measures of your Government; that after a long and happy Reign on Earth, he may bestow on you a Crown of Glory in Heaven; and that Princes of the august House of Brunswick, formed on your Majesty's Example, may to latest Posterity sway the Sceptre of this Realm, are the fervent Prayers of, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most faithful, most obedient, and most loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders met in this National Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, met in General Assembly, beg Leave to approach the Throne with Sentiments of the warmest Attachment to your Person, Family, and Government.

In the present alarming Situation of the Affairs of Europe, we rejoice in the Pledges of National Safety which, under Heaven, we enjoy in your Majesty's paternal Solitude, and in the Wisdom and Vigour of your Councils. From a View of the Subversion of ancient Governments, and the Wreck of Nations, we frequently turn our Eyes with heartfelt Joy and Exultation to our unimpaired Constitution in Church and State; — the best which human Wisdom ever devised, and administered by a Sovereign, who is at once the Pattern of Religion, the Guardian of Liberty, and the Father of his People.

While we have beheld your Majesty employed in promoting national Happiness, and in extending equal Protection to all your Subjects, we have lately contemplated with the deepest Interest and Anxiety your magnanimous Interposition in Favour of the injured and oppressed Nations of Spain and Portugal. To resist the Shock of that Power, before which almost all others have been swept away as by a Torrent, and to interpose between suffering Nations and universal Subjugation, was a Measure worthy of a generous People, under the Government of a wise and patriotic King. We observed, therefore, with Delight, that your Majesty's liberal Offers of Assistance to those oppressed States were unanimously approved of and warmly seconded by your People, and that Admiration and Affection mingled with their Loyalty to the best of Sovereigns.

We beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on various Enterprizes both by Sea and Land, in which the admirable Discipline and steady Courage of the British Forces have lately triumphed over superior Numbers: Achievements which reflect signal Honour on those who were more immediately concerned, and Glory on the British Name. Whatever Effect they may have on the Fate of our Allies, they give us Ground to trust, that, under the Protection of Heaven, we shall be able to resist the fiercest Attacks of our Enemies, and to transmit unimpaired to Posterity those invaluable Blessings, which as a Nation we have so long enjoyed.

As Subjects of the Prince of Peace, we pray for the Termination of that destructive War in which we are involved; but, in the mean Time, we submit

without Murmur or Complaint to those Burdens and Privations which it necessarily imposes. Sensible that not only our Safety, but our Existence as a Nation, depends on our firm and persevering Exertions against the common Enemy, and looking for Success to the Ruler of Nations, we will not cease to cherish in our People that Unanimity and public Spirit which become those who are contending for their most valuable and dearest Rights. We will teach them to make a wise Improvement of those Judgments which are abroad in the Earth, and to cultivate that Righteousness which exalteth a Nation, that God may avert from our Country those Calamities which our Iniquities have deserved.

That the Lord of Hosts may crown the Heads of our brave Countrymen, by Sea and Land, with Victory and Honour; that their Success may be the Means of securing to us a lasting and an honourable Peace; that your Majesty may long reign over a free, a loyal, and a happy People; and that you may hereafter receive a heavenly Crown, are the Prayers of, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most faithful, most obedient, and most loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders met in this General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.
