ty lifth November, One thousand eight hundred and feven, and of the Eighteenth of May One thouland eight hundred and eight, at certain Places and Latitudes therein mentioned, unless such Vessel shall been informed of this Order on her Voyage, and warned by any of His Majesty's Ships or Privateers anot to proceed to any Port of Holland, and Thall, notwithstanding such Warning, attempt to proceed to any fuch Port.

And His Majesty is pleased further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the faid feveral Orders of the Seventh of January and Eleventh of November *One thousand eight hundred and seven, as altered by the faid Order of the Twenty fixth of April last, · shall also be suspended, so far as is necessary for the Protection of Vessels of the said United States which Ishall clear out, to any Ports not declared to be under the Restriction of Blockade from any Port of Holland between the Ninth Day of June and the First .Day of July next; provided always, that nothing that is contained in the present Order shall extend, or "be construed to extend, to protect any Vessels-or their ·Cargoes, that may be liable to Condémnation or Detention for any other Cause than the Violation of the aforefaid Orders of the Seventh of January and the Eleventh of November One thousand eight hundred and feven, as altered by the faid Order of the Twenty-fixth of April laft. Provided also, that nothing in this Order contained shall extend, or be construed to extend to protect any Veffel which shall attempt to enter any Port actually blockaded by any of His Majesty's

Ships of War.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commifchoners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the ·High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the ·Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively apper-- Steph. AT the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 24th of May 1809,

PRESENT, 'The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W.Hereas by an Act, passed in the Twentyeighth Year of the Reign of His present 'Majesty, intituled " An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America, and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's faid Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for His Maiesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorise, or

to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorife, in Case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the faid United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the then entiting Season only; provided always, that fuch Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, fo authorised to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in Conformity to fuch Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions as shall be specified in fuch Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants respectively; and except by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law: And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the enfuing Season, with Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, and also Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the enfuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, and also Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, may be imported into the faid Island from any of the Territories belonging to the faid United States, by British Subjects, and in Britishbuilt Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which within the Space of Nine Months previous to the Time of fuch Importation, have cleared out from some Port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or other His Majesty's Dominions in Europe;' for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorised in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter mentioned; which Licence shall continue and be in Force for Nine Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which such Licence is respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no fuch Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September next, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that the Master or Person baving the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel, to whom fuch Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the faid Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour, or Place in the faid Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Peafe, Indian Corn, Live Stock, Pitch, Tan, and Furpentine, deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Cuftoms there, having by Warrant or Warrants under His Sign Manual, I first endorsed on the Back of Juch Licence the
