An Act for granting to His Majesty certain Sums of Money out of the Consolidated Fund of Great Britain, and for applying certain Monies therein mentioned, for the Service of the Year 1809; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.

An Act for further augmenting the Salaries of certain of the Judges of the Courts in Westminster-Hall, and of the Chief and Second Justice of Chester, and Justices of the Great Sessions in Wales.

An Act for the further Prevention of the Sale and Brokerage of Offices.

An Act to explain and amend an Act, made in the Forty-fifth Year of His present Majesty, for the Encouragement of Seamen, and for the better and more effectually manning His Majesty's Navy during the present War, and for the further Encouragement of Seamen; and for the better and more effectually providing for the Interest of the Royal Hospital for Seamen at Greenwich, and the Royal Hospital for Soldiers at Chelsea; and to extend the Provisions of the said Acts to Cases arising in consequence of Hostilities commenced since the passing of this Act.

The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Wednesday, June 21, 1809.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

WE are commanded by His Majesty to acquaint you, that His Majesty has great Satisfaction in being enabled, by the State of the public Business, to release you from your laborious Attendance in Parliament.

His Majesty doubts not that on your Return into your respective Counties, you will carry with you a Disposition to inculcate, both by Instruction and Example, a Spirit of Attachment to those established Laws and that happy Constitution, which it has ever been His Majesty's anxious Wish to support and to maintain, and upon which, under Providence, depend the Welfare and Prosperity of this Kingdom.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

We have it in Command from His Majesty to thank you for the liberal Provision which you have made for the Services of the present Year; and to express the Satisfaction which His Majesty derives from your having been enabled to provide for those Services without any great and immediate Addition to the Burthens upon His People.

His Majesty particularly commands us to acknowledge your prompt Attention to his Wishes, respecting an increased Provision for the poorer Clergy; an Object in the highest Degree interesting to His Majesty's Feelings, and deserving the favourable Consideration of Parliament.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The atrocious and unparalleled Act of Violence and Treachery by which the Ruier of France attempted to surprize and to enslave the Spanish Nation, while it has excited in Spain a determined and unconquerable Resistance against the Usurpation and Tyranny of the French Government, has, at the same Time, awakened in other Nations of Europe a Determination to resist, by a new Effort, the continued and increasing Encroachments on their Safety and Independence.

Although the Uncertainty of all human Events, and the Vicissitudes attendant upon War, forbid too confident an Expectation of a satisfactory Issue to

the present Struggle against the Common Enemy of Europe, His Majesty commands us to congratulate you upon the splendid and important Success which has recently crowned the Arms of the Emperor of Austria, under the able and distinguished Conduct of His Imperial Highness the Archduke Charles.

To the Efforts of Europe for its own Deliverance, His Majesty has directed us to assure you, that He is determined to continue His most strenuous Assistance and Support, convinced that you will agree with Him in considering that every Exertion for the Re-establishment of the Independence and Security of other Nations is no less conducive to the true Interests than it is becoming the Character and Honour of Great Britain.

Then a Commission for proroguing the Parliament was read. After which the Lord Chancellor said;

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

By virtue of His Majesty's Commission under the Great Seal, to us and other Lords directed, and now read, we do, in His Majesty's Name, and in Obedience to His Commands, prorogue this Parliament to Thursday the 10th Day of August next, to be then here holden; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thursday the 10th Day of August next.

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fourteenth Day of December, One thousand eight hundred and eight, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom of any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Eleventh Day of July next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, from the said Eleventh Day of July next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, Sail-Cloth or Canvas, or other Naval Stores, or do ship or lade any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, Sail-Cloth or

Canvas, or other Naval Stores, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council:" But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles for the Purpose of Trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, (except as hereinafter excepted,) to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were en-

tered outwards: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, nevertheless, that the following Articles, viz. Bar-iron, White and Tarred Rope, Tallow or Mill Grease, Tarpaulins for Waggon-Covers, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, shall be permitted to be exported, upon Payment of the proper Duties, without Bond being entered into by the Merchant Exporter, to any of the British Plantations in the West Indies, or to any of His Majesty's Settlements in South America; provided the Merchant Exporter shall first verify, upon Oath, that the Articles so exported are intended for the Use of a particular Plantation or Settlement, to be named in the Entry Outwards, and not for Sale; and that the said Plantation or Settlement has not before been furnished with any Supply of the said Articles during the same Season; and provided also that the Exportation of the said Articles shall, in no Case, exceed the Value of Fifty Pounds Sterling for any given Plantation or Settlement, whether by one or more Shipments within the same Season: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Copy of a Letter from the Hon. Captain Irby, of His Majesty's Ship Amelia, addressed to Admiral Lord Gambier, and transmitted by his Lordship to the Hon. W. W. Pole.

His Majesty's Ship Amelia, off St. Anders,
 My Lord, 10th June 1809.

ACTING in Obedience to your Lordship's Order of the 15th Ult. I received Information of an Attack being about to be made by the Spanish Patriots on the French Troops in Possession of the Town of St. Anders; and having established Signals between His Majesty's Ship under my Command and the Fortress of Golezand, I proceeded off this Place in Company with His Majesty's Ship Stacira, she having joined me on the 8th Inst. but a strong Wind and Current prevented our getting up till this Day, when, on our Approach, firing was



observed in every Direction on the Shore, and several Vessels trying to effect their Escape out of the Harbour, which were captured as per Margin *, one Boat only getting away; more must have escaped, but were prevented through the Activity of Captain Boys, in His Majesty's Ship Statira. They appear fine Vessels, and have several of the French Army on board, with chief Part of the Hospital Staff. The Corvette is the same lately so gallantly engaged by Captain Skinner, in His Majesty's Sloop Goldfinch, and since by the Black Joke Lugger, and has proved a great Annoyance to our Trade. I learn by a Spanish Officer, who came to me from the Shore, (Aide-de-Camp to General Ballestero,) and by our own Boats which I sent on Shore, that the French Troops have all surrendered, and that the Town is in Possession of the Spanish Patriots under the Command of General Ballestero.

In consequence of the Number of Prisoners I have sent the Statira into Port with the Prizes, and shall remain myself off this Coast, in Hopes of being able to render further Assistance to the Spanish Cause. I have the Honour to be, &c.

REGULATIONS for preparing and drawing the last Lottery authorized by Act 48 Geo 3. Cap. 139.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, Cap. 139, intituled "An Act for granting to His Majesty a Sum of Money to be raised by Lotteries," certain Lotteries have been drawn, but One Lottery of Twenty Thousand Tickets remains to be drawn under the said recited Act; and whereas by an Act, passed in this Session of Parliament, for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money to be raised by Lotteries, it is, amongst other Things, recited, that it was expedient that the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury should be enabled to provide that the Lottery so remaining to be drawn under the first recited Act should be drawn in One Day, and the Commissioners of the Treasury, or any Three or more of them, are therefore by the said last recited Act authorized to direct, that

the same should be prepared, sold, and drawn under such Rules and Regulations as should be necessary for that Purpose.

Now, we being Three of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, in pursuance of the Powers vested in us by the said last recited Act, and in order that the Lottery remaining to be drawn under the said first recited Act may be drawn in One Day, do direct, that the Managers and Directors appointed under the said first recited Act for preparing and delivering out Tickets, or the major Part of such of them as shall be present at any Meeting held for the Purpose, shall for the said Lottery cause a proper Number of Books to be prepared, and divided into Four Classes, which shall be distinguished one from the other by the Letters A B C D being marked respectively on all the Books belonging to each Class, so that all the Books belonging to one Class shall be marked A, and all the Books belonging to another Class shall be marked B, and so in like Manner with Respect to the other Books, and every Leaf in each of such Books shall be divided and distinguished into Three Columns, and upon the innermost of the said Three Columns in each Class of the said Books, there shall be printed for the said Lottery Five Thousand Tickets, to be numbered 1, 2, 3, and so onwards in arithmetical Progression where the common Excess is to be One until they rise to the Number of 5000, and each Ticket shall be marked with the same Letter as is marked upon the Book in which such Ticket is printed, and upon the middle Column in each of the said Books shall be printed the like Number of Tickets, of the same Breadth and Form, and numbered and lettered in the like Manner with the Tickets in the innermost Column of the same Book; and in the extreme Column of each of such Books, there shall be printed a Third Rank or Series of Tickets, of the same Number and Letter with those of the other Two Columns in the same Book, which last mentioned Tickets shall severally be of an oblong Figure, and the Tickets in each of the said Books shall be joined with oblique Lines, Flourishes, and Devices, in such Manner as the said Managers and Directors, or the major Part of them present, shall think most safe and convenient; and every Ticket in the third or extreme Column of each of such Books, shall have written or printed thereupon, besides the Number of such Ticket, Words, Letters, or Figures to the following Effect:—No. 1. Third Lottery 1808. The Bearer of this Ticket will be entitled to such Benefit as shall belong thereto in the said Lottery to be drawn in pursuance of the Act passed in the Forty-eighth Year of His Majesty's Reign.

A. And the Books shall be examined and delivered to the Cashiers of the Bank of England, and the Tickets of the extreme Columns shall be sold and cut off, and the Books delivered back to the said Managers and Directors; and all other Proceedings in Respect of the said Lottery shall be had in the Manner and under the Regulations prescribed in the said first recited Act, except where the same are hereby altered.

And that the said Managers and Directors, or the major Part of them which shall be present at a Meeting as aforesaid, shall cause all the Five Thousand Tickets in the middle Columns in the respective Books marked A, to be carefully rolled up

and made fast with Thread or Silk; and the said Managers and Directors, or the major Part of them as aforesaid, shall in their Presence, and in the Presence of any such Contributors or Adventurers as may be there, cause all the said Tickets which are to be rolled up and made fast as aforesaid, to be cut off indentwise through the said oblique Lines, Flourishes, or Devices, into a Box to be prepared for that Purpose, and to be marked with the Letter A, which is presently to be put into another strong Box, and to be locked with Seven different Locks, and Keys to be kept by as many of the said Managers and Directors, and sealed with their Seals, or turers as may be minded to see the same done, may be present at the doing thereof; and the drawing of the said Tickets from the said Boxes shall take place in the Manner directed by the said first recited Act

And the Fate of each of the Tickets marked B C D, as well as of the Ticket actually drawn, shall be decided by the drawing of the Ticket marked A, bearing the corresponding Number.

And where any Ticket shall be drawn a Prize, each of the Tickets marked B C and D, bearing the corresponding Number, shall, as well as the Ticket actually drawn marked A, be entitled to the whole Sum or Benefit specified in the Prize Ticket.

And where any Ticket, marked with any Letter in Manner aforesaid, shall be divided into Shares or Chances under the Provisions of the said first recited Act, there shall be written or printed upon the Share or Chance, or Agreement for a Share or Chance, in addition to the Words and Figures directed to be written or printed thereon under the said first-recited Act, the Letter with which the Ticket so divided shall be marked and distinguished.

And all the Rules and Provisions contained in the said first-recited Act, so far as they are not expressly altered by these Regulations, or are not inconsistent therewith, shall be observed and put in force in drawing the Lottery provided for in the present Regulations.

AN Act having this Day received the Royal Assent for the Encouragement of Seamen, and for other Purposes, wherein it is provided, that it shall not be lawful for any Person within the United Kingdom to receive any Wages, Pay, Prize or Bounty Money for any Petty Officer, Seaman, Non-commissioned Officer of Marines or Marine, or Non-commissioned Officer or Soldier in the Army, other than and except Persons who shall be duly licensed by the Treasurer of the Navy for that Purpose, who are required to give Security for their good Conduct, (which Restriction is not to extend to the Wives, Parents, Children, Brothers, or Sisters of such Petty Officers, Seamen, Marines, and Soldiers,) to take Effect from the last Day of August next; Notice is hereby given to all Persons who shall be desirous of taking out Licences under the Provisions of the said Act, that they must, on or before the 20th Day of July next, send their Names and Places of Abode, and the Names of Two Persons whom they shall propose as Sureties in each Case, to be bound in the Penalty of Two Hundred Pounds, that the Person desirous to be licensed shall demean himself properly, and shall duly account to the Persons entitled thereto for all the Wages, Pay, Prize or Bounty Money he shall receive.
