

and made fast with Thread or Silk; and the said Managers and Directors, or the major Part of them as aforesaid, shall in their Presence, and in the Presence of any such Contributors or Adventurers as may be there, cause all the said Tickets which are to be rolled up and made fast as aforesaid, to be cut off indentwise through the said oblique Lines, Flourishes, or Devices, into a Box to be prepared for that Purpose, and to be marked with the Letter A, which is presently to be put into another strong Box, and to be locked with Seven different Locks, and Keys to be kept by as many of the said Managers and Directors, and sealed with their Seals, or turers as may be minded to see the same done, may be present at the doing thereof; and the drawing of the said Tickets from the said Boxes shall take place in the Manner directed by the said first recited Act

And the Fate of each of the Tickets marked B C D, as well as of the Ticket actually drawn, shall be decided by the drawing of the Ticket marked A, bearing the corresponding Number.

And where any Ticket shall be drawn a Prize, each of the Tickets marked B C and D, bearing the corresponding Number, shall, as well as the Ticket actually drawn marked A, be entitled to the whole Sum or Benefit specified in the Prize Ticket.

And where any Ticket, marked with any Letter in Manner aforesaid, shall be divided into Shares or Chances under the Provisions of the said first recited Act, there shall be written or printed upon the Share or Chance, or Agreement for a Share or Chance, in addition to the Words and Figures directed to be written or printed thereon under the said first-recited Act, the Letter with which the Ticket so divided shall be marked and distinguished.

And all the Rules and Provisions contained in the said first-recited Act, so far as they are not expressly altered by these Regulations, or are not inconsistent therewith, shall be observed and put in force in drawing the Lottery provided for in the present Regulations.

**DECLARATION relative to setting out and inclosing Land in the New Forest.**

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the Ninth and Tenth Years of the Reign of King William the Third, intituled, "An Act for the Increase and Preservation of Timber in the New Forest in the County of Southampton," it was required that One Thousand Acres, part of the Waste Lands of the said Forest, should be inclosed and kept in Severalty, for the Growth and Preservation of Timber for the Supply of His Majesty's Royal Navy, forthwith after the passing of the said Act; and that in the Year following One Thousand Acres more, Part of the said Waste Lands, should be in like manner inclosed, and that Two Hundred Acres more, Part of the said Waste Lands, should yearly and every Year, for the Term or Space of Twenty Years, from and after the Time that the several Inclosures of the Two Thousand Acres above mentioned should be made and completed, be inclosed and kept in Severalty as aforesaid: And whereas it was also directed by the said Act, that when the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, or Lord High Treasurer of England, or Chancellor of the Exchequer for the Time being, should be satisfied, and should determine that the Woods and Trees which should be growing on the said Waste Lands, so to be inclosed as aforesaid, or any Part thereof, were become past Danger from the browsing of Deer or Cattle, or other Prejudice, and should think fit to lay the same open, and in common, and should cause the same so to be done, that then and so often the same should and might be inclosed for the same Purposes, the like Quantity out of any Part of the Residue of the said Wastes, in lieu of so much as should be laid open as aforesaid: And whereas certain Inclosures were at different Times made in the said Forest by virtue of Commissions respectively issued to John Philipson, Esq; and John Pitt, Esq; and others, to the Extent in the Whole of Two Thousand Two Hundred and Seventy-four Acres or thereabouts: And whereas by an Act passed in the Forty eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for the Increase and Preservation of Timber in Dean and New Forests," it is enacted that the said Quantity of Two Thousand Two Hundred and Seventy-four Acres, inclosed by Virtue of the Commissioners aforesaid, shall be deemed and taken, and were thereby declared to have been duly and legally made under the said Act of the Ninth and Tenth of William the Third; and it is thereby further enacted, that all such Parts of the said Two Thousand Two Hundred and Seventy-four Acres as shall have any Timber growing thereon fit to be preserved, or which shall be deemed fit for the Growth of Timber, and which
