P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fourteenth Day of December, One thousand eight hundred and eight, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom of any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Eleventh Day of July next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, from the said Eleventh Day of July next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, Sail-Cloth or Canvas, or other Naval Stores, or do ship or lade any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, Sail-Cloth or Canvas, or other Naval Stores, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats in the Service of His Majesty, or

employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles for the Purpose of Trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, (except as hereinafter excepted,) to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were entered outwards: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, nevertheless, that the following Articles, viz. Bar-Iron, White and Tanned Rope, Tallow or Mill Grease, Tarpaulins for Waggon-Covers, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, shall be permitted to be exported, upon Payment of the proper Duties, without Bond

being entered into by the Merchant Exporter, to any of the British Plantations in the West Indies, or to any of His Majesty's Settlements in South America; provided the Merchant Exporter shall first verify, upon Oath, that the Articles so exported are intended for the Use of a particular Plantation or Settlement, to be named in the Entry Outwards, and not for Sale; and that the said Plantation or Settlement has not before been furnished with any Supply of the said Articles during the same Season; and provided also that the Exportation of the said Articles shall, in no Case, exceed the Value of Fifty Pounds Sterling for any given Plantation or Settlement, whether by one or more Shipments within the same Season: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

REGULATIONS for preparing and drawing the last Lottery authorized by Act 48 Geo. 3. Cap. 139.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, Cap. 139, intituled "An Act for granting to His Majesty a Sum of Money to be raised by Lotteries," certain Lotteries have been drawn, but One Lottery of Twenty Thousand Tickets remains to be drawn under the said recited Act; and whereas by an Act, passed in this Session of Parliament, for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money to be raised by Lotteries, it is, amongst other Things, recited, that it was expedient that the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury should be enabled to provide that the Lottery so remaining to be drawn under the first recited Act should be drawn in One Day, and the Commissioners of the Treasury, or any Three or more of them, are therefore by the said last recited Act authorized to direct, that the same should be prepared, fold, and drawn under such Rules and Regulations as should be necessary for that Purpose.

Now, we being Three of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, in pursuance of the Powers vested in us by the said last recited Act, and in order that the Lottery remaining to be drawn under the said first recited Act may be drawn in One Day, do direct, that the Managers and Directors appointed under the said first recited Act for preparing and delivering out Tickets, or the major Part of such of them as shall be present at any Meeting held for the Purpose, shall for the said Lottery cause a proper Number of Books to be prepared, and divided into Four Classes, which shall be distinguished one from the other by the Letters A B C D being marked respectively on all the Books belonging to each Class, so that all the Books belonging to one Class shall be marked A, and all the Books

belonging to another Class shall be marked B. and so in like Manner with Respect to the other Books, and every Leaf in each of such Books shall be divided and distinguished into Three Columns, and upon the innermost of the said Three Columns in each Class of the said Books, there shall be printed for the said Lottery Five Thousand Tickets, to be numbered 1, 2, 3, and so onwards in arithmetical Progression where the common Excess is to be One until they rise to the Number of 5000, and each Ticket shall be marked with the same Letter as is marked upon the Book in which such Ticket is printed, and upon the middle Column in each of the said Books shall be printed the like Number of Tickets, of the same Breadth and Form, and numbered and lettered in the like Manner with the Tickets in the innermost Column of the same Book; and in the extreme Column of each of such Books, there shall be printed a Third Rank or Series of Tickets, of the same Number and Letter with those of the other Two Columns in the same Book, which last mentioned Tickets shall severally be of an oblong Figure, and the Tickets in each of the said Books shall be joined with oblique Lines, Flourishes, and Devices, in such Manner as the said Managers and Directors, or the major Part of them present, shall think most safe and convenient; and every Ticket in the third or extreme Column of each of such Books, shall have written or printed thereupon, besides the Number of such Ticket, Words, Letters, or Figures to the following Effect:—No. 1. Third Lottery 1808. The Bearer of this Ticket will be entitled to such Benefit as shall belong thereto in the said Lottery to be drawn in pursuance of the Act passed in the Forty-eighth Year of His Majesty's Reign.

And the Books shall be examined and delivered to the Cashiers of the Bank of England, and the Tickets of the extreme Columns shall be sold and cut off, and the Books delivered back to the said Managers and Directors; and all other Proceedings in Respect of the said Lottery shall be had in the Manner and under the Regulations prescribed in the said first recited Act, except where the same are hereby altered.

And that the said Managers and Directors, or the major Part of them which shall be present at a Meeting as aforesaid, shall cause all the Five Thousand Tickets in the middle Columns in the respective Books marked A, to be carefully rolled up and made fast with Thread or Silk; and the said Managers and Directors, or the major Part of them as aforesaid, shall in their Presence, and in the Presence of any such Contributors or Adventurers as may be there, cause all the said Tickets which are to be rolled up and made fast as aforesaid, to be cut off indentwise through the said oblique Lines, Flourishes, or Devices, into a Box to be prepared for that Purpose, and to be marked with the Letter A, which is presently to be put into another strong Box, and to be locked with Seven different Locks, and Keys to be kept by as many of the said Managers and Directors, and sealed with their Seals, or the Seals of some of them, until the said Tickets are to be drawn; and the Tickets in the first or innermost Columns of the said Books marked A, and the Tickets contained in the innermost and middle Columns of the several Books marked B C and D respectively, shall remain still in the Books for dis-

covering any Mistake or Fraud, if any should happen to be committed contrary to the true Meaning of this Act.

And that the said Managers and Directors, or the major Part of them which shall be present at any Meeting as aforesaid, shall also prepare, or cause to be prepared, for the said Lotteries respectively, other Books, in which every Leaf shall be divided or distinguished into Two Columns, and upon the innermost of those Two Columns there shall be printed Tickets to the Number of Five Thousand Tickets, and upon the outermost of the said Two Columns there shall be printed a like Number of Tickets, all which shall be of equal Length and Breadth as near as may be, which Two Columns in the said Books shall be joined by some Flourish or Device, through which the outermost Tickets may be cut off indentwise, and such Number of Tickets as shall be fixed for the Purpose by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, or any Three of them, Part of those to be contained in the outermost Columns of the Books last mentioned, shall be, and be called, The Fortunate Tickets, to which Benefits shall belong; and the said Managers and Directors, or the major Part of them, or such of them as shall be present at a Meeting as aforesaid, shall cause the Sum of Money which shall have been fixed upon for each of such Fortunate Tickets, to be written or printed thereupon, as well in Figures as in Words in Length; and the said Managers and Directors, or the major Part of them who shall be present at a Meeting as aforesaid, shall cause all the said Tickets contained in the outermost Columns of the said last mentioned Books, to be in the Presence of the said Managers and Directors, or the major Part of them which shall be present at a Meeting as aforesaid, and in the Presence of such Contributors or Adventurers as will then be there, to be carefully rolled up, and fastened with Thread or Silk, and carefully cut out indentwise through the said Flourish or Device, into another Box to be prepared for this Purpose, and to be marked with the Letter B, which Box shall be put into another strong Box, to be locked up with Seven different Locks, and Keys to be kept by as many of the said Managers and Directors, and sealed up with their Seals, or the Seals of some of them, until these Tickets shall also be drawn; and that the whole Business of rolling up and cutting off, and putting into the said Boxes the said Tickets, and locking up and sealing the said Boxes, shall be performed by the said Managers and Directors, or such of them as aforesaid, before the last Six Days immediately preceding the Day appointed for the drawing of the said Lottery. And to the End every Person concerned may be well assured that the same Number with his or her Ticket is put into the Box marked with the Letter A, from whence the same may be drawn; and that all other Matters are done as hereby directed, some public Notification in Print shall be given of the precise Time or Times of putting the said Tickets into the said Boxes, to the End that such Adventurers as may be minded to see the same done, may be present at the doing thereof; and the drawing of the said Tickets from the said Boxes shall take place in the Manner directed by the said first recited Act.

And the Fate of each of the Tickets marked B C D as well as of the Ticket actually drawn,

shall be decided by the drawing of the Ticket marked A, bearing the corresponding Number.

And where any Ticket shall be drawn a Prize, each of the Tickets marked B C and D, bearing the corresponding Number, shall, as well as the Ticket actually drawn marked A, be entitled to the whole Sum or Benefit specified in the Prize Ticket.

And where any Ticket, marked with any Letter in Manner aforesaid, shall be divided into Shares or Chances under the Provisions of the said first recited Act, there shall be written or printed upon the Share or Chance, or Agreement for a Share or Chance, in addition to the Words and Figures directed to be written or printed thereon under the said first-recited Act, the Letter with which the Ticket so divided shall be marked and distinguished.

And all the Rules and Provisions contained in the said first-recited Act, so far as they are not expressly altered by these Regulations, or are not inconsistent therewith, shall be observed and put in force in drawing the Lottery provided for in the present Regulations.

DECLARATION relative to setting out and inclosing
Land in the New Forest.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the Ninth and Tenth Years of the Reign of King William the Third, intituled,

"An Act for the Increase and Preservation of Timber in the New Forest in the County of Southampton," it was required that One Thousand Acres, part of the Waste Lands of the said Forest, should be inclosed and kept in Severalty, for the Growth and Preservation of Timber for the Supply of His Majesty's Royal Navy, forthwith after the passing of the said Act; and that in the Year following One Thousand Acres more, Part of the said Waste Lands, should be in like manner inclosed, and that Two Hundred Acres more, Part of the said Waste Lands, should yearly and every Year, for the Term or Space of Twenty Years, from and after the Time that the several Inclosures of the Two Thousand Acres above mentioned should be made and completed, be inclosed and kept in Severalty as aforesaid: And whereas it was also directed by the said Act, that when the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, or Lord High Treasurer of England, or Chancellor of the Exchequer for the Time being, should be satisfied, and should determine that the Woods and Trees which should be growing on the said Waste Lands, so to be inclosed as aforesaid, or any Part thereof, were become past Danger from the browsing of Deer or Cattle, or other Prejudice, and should think fit to lay the same open, and in common, and should cause the same so to be done, that then and so often there should and might be inclosed for the same Purposes, the like Quantity out of any Part of the Residue of the said Wastes, in lieu of so much as should be laid open as aforesaid: And whereas certain Inclosures were at different Times made in the said Forest by virtue of Commissions respectively issued to John Philipson, Esq; and John Pitt, Esq; and others, to the Extent in the Whole of Two Thousand Two Hundred and Seventy-four Acres or thereabouts: And whereas by an Act passed in the Forty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intitled, "An Act for the Increase and Preservation of Timber in Dean and New Forests," it is enacted that the said Quantity of Two Thousand Two Hundred and Seventy-four Acres, inclosed by Virtue of the Commissions aforesaid, shall be deemed and taken, and were thereby declared to have been duly and legally made under the said Act of the Ninth and Tenth of William the Third; and it is thereby further enacted, that all such Parts of the said Two Thousand Two Hundred and Seventy-four Acres as shall have any Timber growing thereon fit to be preserved, or which shall be deemed fit for the Growth of Timber, and which shall not now be inclosed, may be inclosed for the Growth and Preservation of such Timber under the Provisions of the said Acts of the Ninth and Tenth William, and Forty-eighth George Third: And whereas it has been certified to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury by the Right Honourable Sylvester Lord Glenbervie, Surveyor-General of His Majesty's Woods and Forests, that whatever Woods and Trees there are growing on One Thousand and Sixty-six Acres, or thereabouts, Part of the said Two Thousand Two Hundred and Seventy-four Acres, are become past Danger from the browsing of Deer or Cattle, or other Prejudice, to wit:

Etherise Inclosure, Part in Denny Walk, and Part in Whitley Ridge Walk, and containing One Hundred and Two Acres, or thereabouts.

Black Bush Inclosure, Part in Denny Walk, and Part in Whitley Ridge Walk, and containing Thirty-four Acres, or thereabouts.

Pignell Inclosure, in Whitley Ridge Walk, and containing Ninety-four Acres, or thereabouts.

Rhinefield Sandy Inclosure, in Rhinefield Walk, and containing Two Hundred and Twenty-five Acres, or thereabouts.

Aldridge Hill Inclosure, in the same Walk, and containing One Hundred and Thirty-one Acres, or thereabouts. And

Wilverley Inclosure, in Wilverley Walk, and containing Four Hundred and Eighty Acres, or thereabouts.

And we, Three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, being satisfied that whatever Woods and Trees there are growing upon the said Inclosures, consisting, together, of One Thousand and Sixty-six Acres or thereabouts, as aforesaid, are become past Danger from the browsing of the Deer or Cattle, or other Prejudice, think fit to lay the same open and in common; and we do hereby declare and make known that the said Inclosures are laid open and in common accordingly, to the Intent that such Parts thereof as are not now inclosed, and shall be deemed fit for the Growth of Timber, may be inclosed, or that an equal Quantity of other Lands may be inclosed in lieu thereof, pursuant to the Directions and Provision of the said Acts of the Ninth and Tenth of William the Third and Forty-eighth of George the Third, and for the Purposes therein mentioned.
