A T the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 12th of July 1809,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IT is this Day ordered by His Majesty, in Conneil, that a General Embargo be forthwith laid (to continue until further Orders) upon all Ships and Veffels in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, except His Majefty's Ships and Veffels of War, and except fuch Ships and Veffels as faall be laden by the especial Order, and under the Directions of the Lords Commissioners of His Ma. jefty's Treafury, or the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, with any Kind of Provisions or Stores for the Use of His Majefty's Fleets or Armies; and allo except fuch Ships and Veffels as are employed by the Officers of the Navy, Ordnance, Victualling, and Customs: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majelty's Treafury, and the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the neceffary Directions herein as to them may refpectively appertain. A T the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 12th of July 1809,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS His Majesty was, by His Order in Council of the Thirty-first of May One thousand eight hundred and nine, pleased to direct, that no Foreign Vessel, except as therein excepted, should enter into the Port, Harbour, or Road lying between the Island of Heligoland and Sandy Island, and the Shoals of the faid Islands respectively, and commonly called or known by the Names of the North Haven and the South Haven, under any Pretence whatever;

His Majefty is pleafed, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to revoke fo much of the faid Order as refpects Ships entering into the Port of the faid ICand or Places thereof, in Ballaft; and to direct, that henceforth Merchant Veffels, under any Flag except the French, coming in Ballaft, fhall he allowed to enter therein without His Mejefty's Licence: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treafury, and the Eords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, are to give the neceffary Directions herein as to them may refpectively appertain. CEREMONIAL of the Knightbood and Investiture of Rear Admiral Sir Richard Goodwin Kests Knight of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath.

A Procession was made into the Sovereign's Prefence, with the usual Reverences, in the following Order:

- The Genealogist, in his Mantle, Chain, and Badge, bearing (in the Abfence of the Gentleman Ufher of the Order) the Red Rod.
- The Deputy Register and Secretary of the Order, in the Mantle, Chains, and Badges of that Officer.
- Deputy Bath King of Arms, in the Mantle, Chain,
- and Badge, with the Sceptre of Bath, bearing the Ribbon and Badge of the Order upon a Crimfon Veivet Cufhion.
- The Right Honourable Sir David Dundas, Knight Companion of the Order.
- His Royal Highnefs the Duke of York and Albany, First and Principal Companion of the Order.

Then, by His Majefty's Command, Rear-Admiral Keats was introduced into the Prefence between His Royal Highnefs the Duke of York and Sir David Dundas, preceded by the Genealogift, (officiating for the Gentleman Ufher,) with due Reverences; and the Sword of State having been delivered to the Sovereign, Rear-Admiral Keats, kneeling, was knighted therewith.
