ISPATCHES, of which the following are L' Copies and Extracts, were this Day received at the Office of the Lord Viscount Castlereagh, "One of His Majelly's Principal Secretaries of State, from Lieutenant-General the Right Honourable Sir Arthur Wellefley, K. B. dated Talavera, 29th July · 1809.

'Talavera de la Reyna, July 29, 1809.

My Lord, ENERAL CUESTA followed the Enemy's G March with his Army from the Alberché on the Morning of the 24th, as far as Santa Olalla, and pushed forward his Advanced Guard as far as Torrijos.

For the Reafons stated to your Lordship in my Dispatch of the 24th I moved only Two Divisions of Infantry and a Brigade of Cavalry across the Alberché to Cafaiegos, under the Command of Lieu--tenant-General Sherbrooke, with a View to keep up «the Communication between General Cuelta and me, and with Sir R. Wilfon's Corps at Efcalona.

It appears that General Vanegas had not carried into Execution that Part of the Plan of Operations which related to his Corps, and that he was still at Damiel, in La Mancha; and the Enemy in the Courfe of the 24th, 25th, and 26th, collected all his Forces in this Part of Spain, between Torrijos and Toledo, leaving but a fmall Corps of Two Thousand Men in that Place.

His united Army thus confifted of the Corps of Marshal Victor, of that of General Sebaltiani, and of Seven or Eight Thousand Men the Guards of Joleph Buonaparte, and the Garrifon of Madrid, and it was commanded by Joleph Buonaparte, aided by Marshals Jourdan and Victor, and General Sebaitiani

On the 26th General Cueffa's advanced Guard was attacked near Torrijos, and obliged to fall back, and the General retired with his Army on that Day to the left Bank of the Alberché, General Sherbrooke continuing at Cafalegos, and the Enemy at Satta Olalla.

It was then obvious that the Enemy intended to try the Refult of a general Action, for which the beft Pofition appeared to be in the Neighbourhood of Talavera, and General Cuefta having confented to take up this Polition on the Morning of the 27th, I ordered General Sherbrooke to retire with his Corps to its Station in the Line, leaving General Mackenzie with a Division of Infantry and a Brigade of Cavalry as an advanced Post in the Wood on the Right of Alberché, which covered our Left Flank.

The Position taken up by the Troops at Talavera extended rather more than Two Miles; the Ground was open upon the Left, where the British Army was flationed, and it was commanded by a Height on which was, in Echellon and in Second Line, a Division of Infantry under the Orders of Major-General Hill.

There was a Valley between this Height and a Range of Mountains still further upon the Left, which Valley was not at first occupied, as it was commanded by the Height before mentioned; and the Range of Mountains appeared too diltant to have any Influence upon the expected Action.

any Influence upon the expected Action. The Right, confifting of Spanish Troops, extend-ed immediately in Front of the Town of Talavera down to the Tagus. This Part of the Ground was covered by Olive Trees, and much interfected by Banks and Ditches. The high Road leading from the Bridge over the Alberché, was defended by a beaux Battery in Front of a Church, which was ocheavy Battery in Front of a Church, which was occupied by Spanish Infantry. All the Avenues to the Town were defended in a fimilar Manner; the Town was occupied, and the Remainder of the Spanish Infantry was formed in Two Lines behind

the Banks on the Roads which led from the Town and the Right, to the Left of our Polition.

In the Centre, between the Two Armies, there was a commanding Spot of Ground, on which we had commenced to confiruct a Redoubt, with fome open Ground in its Rear.

Brigadier-General Alexander Campbell was posted this Spot with a Division of Infantry, supported in his Rear by General Cotton's Brigade of Dragoons, and some Spanish Cavalry.

At about Two o'Clock on the 27th, the Enemy appeared in Strength on the Left Bauk of the Alberché, and manifelled an Intention to attack General Mackenzie's Division.

The Attack was made before they could be withdrawn; but the Troops, could fing of General Mackeuzie's and Colonel Donkin's Brigades, and Genetal Anfon's Brigade of Cavalry, and fupported by General Payne with the other Four Regiments of Cavalry, in the Plain between Talavera and the Wood, withdrew in good Order, but with fome Lofs, particularly by the 2d Battalion 87th Regiment and 2d Battalion 31th Regiment, in the Wood.

Upon this Occafion the Steadinefs and Difcipline of the 45th Regiment, and of the 5th Battalion Ooth Regiment, were confpicuous; and I had particular Reafon for being fatisfied with the Manner in which Major-General Mackenzie withdrew his advanced Guard.

As the Day advanced, the Enemy appeared in larger Numbers on the Right of the Alberché. and it was obvious that he was advancing to a general Attack upon the Combined Army.

General Mackenzie continued to fall back gradually upen the Left of the Polition of the Combined Armies, where he was placed in the Second Line, in the Rear of the Guards, Colonel Donkin being placed in the fame Situation further upon the Left in the Rear of the King's German Legion.

The Enemy immediately commenced his Attack in the Dufk of the Evening, by a Cannonade upon the Left of our Polition, and by an Attempt with his Cavalry to overthrow the Spanish Infantry poffed, as I have before flated, on the Right. This Attempt failed entirely.

Early in the Night he pufhed a Division along the Valley on the Left of the Height occupied by General Hill, of which he gained a momentary Poffefion, but Major-General Hill attacked it inflantly with the Bayonet, and regained it.

This Attack was repeated in the Night, but failed, and again at Daylight in the Morning of the 28th, by Two Divisions of Infantry, and was repuled by Major General Hill

Major General Hill has reported to me in a particular Manner the Conduct of the 20th Regiment and of the 1th Battalion 48th Regiment, in thefe different Affairs, as well as that of Mujor General Tilfon, and Brigadier-General Richard Stewart.

We have loft many brave Officers and Soldiers in the Defence of this important Point in our Polition; among others I cannot avoid to ment on Brigade-Major Fordyce, and Brigade-Major Gardner: and Major General Hill was himfelf wounded, but I am happy to fay, but flightly.

In confequence of the repeated Attempts upon the Height on our Left by the Valley, I had placed two Brigades of British Cavalry in that Valley, supported in the Rear by the Duc d'Albuquerque's Division of Spanish Cavalry.

The Enemy then placed Light Infantry in the Range of Mountains on the Left of the Valley, which were oppoled by a Division of Spanish Infantry under Lientenant-General De Bassecourt. The general Attack began by the March of feve-

The general Attack began by the March of feveral Columns of Infantry into the Vailey with a View to attack the Height occupied by Majbr-General Hill. Thefe Columns were immediately charged by the 1ft German Light Dragoons and 23d Dragoons, under the Command of General Aufon, directed by Lieutenant-General Payne, and fupported by General Fane's Brigade of heavy Cavalry; and although the 23d Dragoons fuffered confiderable Lofs, the Charge had the Effect of preventing the Execution of that Part of the Enemy's Plan.

At the fame Time he directed an Attack upon Brigadier-General Alexander Campbell's folition in the Centre of the Combined Armies, and on the Right of the British.

This Attack was most fuccessfully repulsed by Brigadier-General Campbell, supported by the King's Regiment of Spanish Cavairy, and Two Battalions of Spanish Infantry; and Brigadier-General Campbell took the Enemy's Caunon.

The Brigadier General mentions particularly the Conduct of the 97th, the zd Battalion 7th, and of the zd Battalion 53d Regiments, and I was highly fatisfied with the Manner in which this Part of the Pofition was defended.

An Attack was also made at the fame Time upon Lieutenant-General Therbrooke's Division, which was on the Left and Centre of the ril Line of the British Army.

This Attack are most gallantly repulfed by a Charge with Bayerets, by the whole Division, but the Brigade of Guards, which were on the Right, having advanced too far, they were exposed on their Left Flank to the Fire of the Enemy's Battery, and of their retiring Columns; and the Division was obliged to retire towards the original Position, under Cover of the 2d Line of General Cotton's Brigade of Castley, which I had moved from the Centre, and of the tft Battalion 48th Regiment.

I had moved this Regiment from its original Pofition on the Heights, as foon as I observed the Advance of the Guards, and it was formed in the Plain, and advanced upon the Enemy, and covered the Formation of Lieutenant-General Sherbrooke's Division.

Shortly after the Repulle of this general Attack, in which apparently all the Enemy's Troops were employed, he commenced his Retreat acrofs the Alberché, which was conducted in the most regular Order, and was effected during the Night, leaving in our Hands Pwenty Pieces of Cannon, Ammunition, Tuederils, and fome Prifoners.

I.have particularly to lament the Lofs of Major-General Mackenzie, who had diftinguished himfelf on the 27th; and of Brigadier General Langwerth, of the King's German Legion; and of Brigade Major Beckett, of the Guards.

Your Lordship will obferve, that the Attacks of the Enemy were principally, if not entirely, directed against the British Troops. The Spanish Commander in Chief, his Officers, and Troops manifelled every Difpolition to render us Affiliance, and -those of them which were engaged did their Duty; but the Ground which they occupied was fo im-portant, and its Front at the fame Time fo difficult, that I did not think it proper to unge them to make any Movement on the Lett of the Enemy while he was engaged with us.

I have Reafon to be fatisfied with the Conduct of all the Officers and Troops - Lam much indebted to Lieutenant-General Sherbrooke for the Affithance I received from him, and for the Manner in which he led on his Division to the Charge with Bayonets.

To Lieutenant-General Payne and the Cavalry, particularly General Anfon's Brigade, to Major-Generals Hill and Tilfon, Brigadier-Generals Alex-ander Campbell, Richard Stewart, and Cameron, and to the Divifions and Brigades of Infantry under their Commands respectively, particularly the 29th Regiment, commanded by Colonel White, the 1st Battalion 48th, commanded by Colonel Donneilan, afterwards, when that Officer was wounded, by Major Middlemore; the 2d Battalion 7th, commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Sir William Mycrs; the 2d Battalion 53d, commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel Bingham; the 97th, commanded by Colonel Lyon; the 1st Battalion of Detachments, commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Bunbury, and the 2d Battalion 31ft, commanded by Major Watfon, and of the 45th, commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel Guard, and 5th Battalion 60th, commanded by Major Davy, on the 27th.

The Advance of the Brigade of Guards was most gallantly conducted by Brigadier General Campbell, and, when necessary, that Brigade retired, and form-ed again in the belt Order.

The Artillery under Brigadier-General Howorth · was alfo, throughout thefe Days, of the greateft Service, and I had every Reafon to be fatisfied with the Affiftance I received from the Chief Engineeer Lieutenant-Colonel Fletcher, the Adjutant-General Brigadier-General the Honourable C. Stewart, and the Quarter-Matter-General, Colonel Murray, and the Officers of those Departments respectively, and from Colonel Bathurst and the Officers of my perfonal Staff.

1 alfo received much Affiftance from Colonel O'Lawlor, of the Spanish Service, and from Brigadier-General Whittingham, who was wounded when bringing up the Two Spanish Battalions to the Affistance of Brigadier-General Alexander Campbell.

I fend this by Captain Lord Fitzroy Somerfet, who will give your Lordship any further Information, and whom I beg Leave to recommend.

Extract of a Letter from Lieutenant-General the Right Honourable Sir Arthur Wel efley K. B. to Lord Viscount Castlereagh, dated Talavera, Aug. 1, 1809.

SINCE I had the Honour of addressing you on the 29th July, the Enemy have continued to keep a Rear Guard of about Ten Thousand Men on the Heights on the Left of the Alberché.

The extreme Fatigue of the Troops, the Want of Provisions, and the Numbers of Wounded to be taken Care of, have prevented me from moving from my Polition.

Brigadier General Craufurd arrived with his Bri- clude with an Intention of taking gade on the 29th in the Morning, having marched the Neighbourhood of Guadarama.

Twelve Spanish Leagues in little more than Twenty-four Hours.

Extract of a Letter from Lieutenant-General Sir Arthur Weilefley to Lord Viscount Caftlereagh, dated Talavera, 1st August 1809.

When I addreffed you this Morning, I had not received the Report from the Outpolts. It Appears that the Enemy withdrew the Kear Guard, which was polted on the Heights on the Left of the Alberché laft Night at Eleven o'Clock, and the whole Army marched toward Sta. Olalla; I conclude with an Intention of taking up a Polition in the Neighbourhood of Guadarama.
