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Francfort, July 2.

THe French have summoned *Creutznach*, and have sent some of their Troops thither, but hitherto they have not committed any hostility. Count *Oxenferne* the Swedish Ambassador is parted from *Katubonne* on his way to *Vienna*, whither the Elector Palatine is likewise sending an Envoye to represent the oppressions he lies under from the French.

Marseilles, July 1. The 10 Gallies that failed lately from hence are come back, having been no farther than *Majorca*, where they were very well received. There is now fitting out here with great diligence another Squadron of Gallies, which is designed for the coast of *Italy*. We have Advice that two of the Great Duke of *Tuscany's* Gallies have taken on the coast of *Sicily*, a Ship belonging to *Sally*, of 8 Guns, and 130 Men.

Paris, Jul. 9. The Dauphines continues still very much indisposed, though she is much better than she was. The differences between the Inhabitants of *Andaye* and *Fonterabia* may have ill consequences; it seems to be here firmly believed that those men who were some time since found dead, and were said to have been drowned, were murdered by those of *Fonterabia*; and there is a report as if something had happened since, which has farther exasperated the French, who have taken several Barks belonging to *Fonterabia*. We have Letters from *Switzerland* which tell us that the Cantons are now assembled, and that great endeavours are used to give them such jealousies of the Forts which our King has ordered to be built on the Frontiers of *Alsace*, and the *Franche Comte*, as may induce them to enter into Engagements with the Emperor and the Crown of *Spain*. From *Germany* they write, That the Chamber of *Metz* has Summ'd the City of *Creutznach*, as a dependance of the Bishoprick of *Verdun*, and that the King has given it to the Prince of *Birkenfelds*, now Duke of *Deux-ponts*.

WE Your Majesties most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, being deeply sensible of the repeated Instances of Your Majesties Grace and Favour to us; and more particularly, by Your Majesties late Gracious Declaration, do esteem our selves obliged in all Duty, Loyalty, and Humility, to return Your Sacred Majesty our bounden Thanks for the most Gracious Assurances You have been pleas'd therein to renew to us, of Governing us according to the known Laws of the Realm; beseeching Your Majesty to accept from us, Your ever Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, our best Resolutions of Standing by Your Majesty, and Your lawful Successors, with our Lives and Fortunes, in the preservation of the established Government in Church and State; And when Your Majesty our only Princesly Wisdom shall think fit to Assemble Your Great Council of Parliament, we shall make it our care to choose Persons so qualified, as most effectually to represent us; and we most earnestly beseech Almighty God, to Bless our Majesty with a long and prosperous Reign; and that our Majesties Person and Government, may be entirely freed from the devilish Machinations of all Popish and Incen-

ous Incendiaries, or any other sort of unreasonable Men that shall endeavour to rob us of those Blessings which we have so uninterruptedly enjoyed, ever since Your Majesties most Glorious Restauration! Sealed with our Town-Seal this 10th day of June, 1681. Signed by 124.

Hampton-Court, June 30. This day several Apprentices of *London*, presented an Humble Address to His Majesty, in the name of themselves and many thousand others: The King was pleas'd to receive it very kindly, and to commend their Zeal for the preserving the established Religion and Government, in which Dutiful and Loyal Principles, His Majesty bid them persevere, and assured them of His Royal Favour and Kindness, and that he would on all occasions give them the marks of it.
