A PROCLAMATION,

For pardoning all Seamen and Marines who may at any Time have deserted from His Majesty's Service.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We are desirous to mark the Fiftieth Anniversary of our Accession to the Throne, by extending Our Pardon to all Seamen and Marines who may at any Time have deserted from Our Service previous to the issuing of this Our Royal Proclamation: We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to publish this our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby accordingly grant Our most Gracious Pardon to all such Seamen as may at any Time have deserted from any of Our Ships or Vessels of War: And we do hereby further grant our most Gracious Pardon to all Marines who may at any Time have deserted from Our Service; and we do hereby declare that all such Seamen and Marines, whether surrendering themselves, or not, or who having deserted, are now belonging to some of Our Ships or Vessels of War, or are at the Head Quarters of our Royal Marine Forces, or are belonging to Recruiting Parties of the said Forces, shall be released, and discharged from all Prosecutions, Imprisonments, and Penalties, commenced or incurred by Reason of such Desertion; and that all such Seamen or Marines who have not before the issuing of this Our Royal Proclamation, surrendered themselves, nor entered on board Our Ships or Vessels, nor joined the Head Quarters or Recruiting Parties of the Royal Marines, shall, nevertheless, receive Our Free Pardon, without Condition of further Service, or being required to join any of Our Ships, or the Head Quarters or Recruiting Parties above mentioned; but that such Pardon shall not entitle the said Deserters, whether Seamen or Marines, to any Arrears of Pay, or to any Prize Money forfeited by such Desertion; and we do further declare that such Free Pardon shall not extend to any Seamen or Marines who shall desert from any of our Ships or Vessels, or from Marine Quarters or Recruiting Parties, after the Twenty-fourth Day of this Instant October.

Given at Our Court at the Queen's Palace, the Eighteenth Day of October; One thousand eight hundred and nine, in the Forty-ninth Year of Our Reign.

The King has been pleased to appoint Sir Charles Hamilton, Bart and the Honourable Henry Curzon, to be Colonels of His Majesty's Royal Marine Forces, in the Room of Charles Boyles, Esq; and Sir Thomas Williams, Knight, appointed Flag-Officers of His Majesty's Fleet.

THE following Address was presented to His Majesty at Windfor-Castle on Wednesday the 25th Instant, by the Dean and Canons of Saint George's Chapel, to which His Majesty was pleased to return a most gracious Answer.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Dean and Canons of your Majesty's Free Chapel of Saint George, within your Castle at Windfor, beg Leave humbly to approach your Majesty, under a due Sense of the many Benefits and Blessings of which this, the Fiftieth Anniversary of your Majesty's Accession to the Throne of this Realm, is peculiarly calculated to awaken a grateful Recollection in our Minds.

We consider it as one among the most prominent Proofs of the Goodness of Divine Providence, towards us, that, in common with our fellow Subjects

of this now United Kingdom, we have so long been permitted to live under your Majesty's mild and paternal Government; but, as Ministers of that holy Faith, which it has been your Majesty's strenuous and uniform Endeavour to maintain, we conceive it to be more particularly incumbent upon us to express the Gratitude we feel for the signal Countenance and Protection which, under your Majesty's fostering Care, our Religion has, for nearly Half a Century, unremittingly enjoyed. We are conscious that it is no less indebted for its present Estimation and Security to the Example which your Majesty has so long displayed of Perseverance in the Discharge of those Duties, and in the Exercise of those Virtues which true Religion inculcated, than to the prompt and steady Resilience and Discouragement which your Majesty has uniformly opposed both to the immoral Conduct and licentious Principles of its Enemies.

In the Times in which we live we are peculiarly ill able to dispense with the Support and Consolation which we thus derive from your Majesty's paternal Solicitude for the Welfare of your People; we, therefore, humbly offer up our Prayers to Heaven, that they may be long preserved to us; and that the Influence of your Majesty's Example may long continue to be felt and acknowledged, in future and distant Ages, when your Majesty shall have exchanged an earthly Diadem for a "Crown of Glory that fadeth not away."

Miles, during which much Skill was shewn by the Enemy, the new French Coppered Schooner Privateer L'Hirondelle, of St. Maloes, commanded by Henry Louis Gavellier, pierced for Sixteen Guns, all of which he threw overboard, in the Pursuit, and manned with Sixty-five Men, he had been at Sea Eight Days, and had captured the Portuguese Ship Minerve; I am sorry to add, that through his Temerity in firing Musketry at the Plover, I was compelled to return it, which badly wounded the Captain of the Portuguese Ship; I beg to annex in the Margin*, the Names of the Two Vessels recaptured by the Plover, on the 19th Instant.

For pardoning Deserters from His Majesty's Land Forces.

War-Office, October 24, 1809.

WHEREAS it has been most humbly submitted to the King, whether, on the joyful Occasion of His Majesty's entering into the Fiftieth Year of His Reign, it might not be desirable to distinguish so memorable an Epoch by an Act of Grace to all Deserters; and His Majesty having graciously approved of His Free Pardon being extended to all such Deserters from His Land Forces as shall deliver themselves up within Two Months from the 25th Instant: *These are publicly to declare His Majesty's benevolent Intention; and to direct that all Deserters, surrendering themselves to the Commanding Officer of any Regiment, or to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose Stations are mentioned in the Margin hereof; to the Commandant Durham. of the Army Dépôt in the Isle of Wight; Carlisle. or, where there is no Military Post, to a Leeds. Magistrate, shall be pardoned, and they Manchester. are hereby pardoned accordingly.*

Such Deserters, if from the Regular Forces, being Able-bodied Men and fit for Service, shall be sent to the Birmingham. Regiments from which they respectively deserted, or be appointed to Bedford. such Regiments in the United Kingdom as His Majesty may be pleased to command; and, when so placed, shall Gloucester. Southamton. not be liable to be claimed by any other

Wells. Corps to which they may formerly London. have belonged: and if from the Militia, shall be sent to the Regiments to which they respectively belonged.

And Whereas many of the said Deserters may have enlisted in other Corps, and are now serving therein, His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon; and to direct that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, upon declaring themselves to their respective Commanding Officers, on or before the Period abovementioned: and they shall not be liable, at any future Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly served.

The Magistrate, to whom any Deserter, as above, may surrender himself, is authorized and required to certify the Day on which such Deserter surrendered himself; which Certificate is to continue in Force until the Arrival of the Deserter at the nearest Military Post, provided he proceed at the Rate of Ten Miles a Day, unless prevented by Sickness, to be certified by some Medical Practitioner on the Back of the Magistrate's Certificate; or to be otherwise proved to the Satisfaction of the Officer commanding at such Military Post.

His Majesty has further been pleased to direct, that Deserters now actually in Confinement as such, shall have the Benefit of this His Royal Pardon.
