The King has been pleased to appoint Sir Charles Hamilton, Bart and the Honourable Henry Curzon, to be Colonels of His Majesty's Royal Marine Forces, in the Room of Charles Boyles, Esq; and Sir Thomas Williams, Knight, appointed Flag-Officers of His Majesty's Fleet.

THE following Address was presented to His Majesty at Windfor-Castle on Wednesday the 25th Instant, by the Dean and Canons of Saint George's Chapel, to which His Majesty was pleased to return a most gracious Answer.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Dean and Canons of your Majesty's Free Chapel of Saint George, within your Castle at Windsor, beg Leave humbly to approach your Majesty, under a due Sense of the many Benefits and Blessings of which this, the Fiftieth Anniversary of your Majesty's Accession to the Throne of this Realm, is peculiarly calculated to awaken a grateful Recollection in our Minds.

We consider it as one among the most prominent Proofs of the Goodness of Divine Providence, towards us, that, in common with our fellow Subjects

of this now United Kingdom, we have so long been permitted to live under your Majesty's mild and paternal Government; but, as Ministers of that holy Faith, which it has been your Majesty's strenuous and uniform Endeavour to maintain, we conceive it to be more particularly incumbent upon us to express the Gratitude we feel for the signal Countenance and Protection which, under your Majesty's fostering Care, our Religion has, for nearly Half a Century, unremittingly enjoyed. We are conscious that it is no less indebted for its present Estimation and Security to the Example which your Majesty has so long displayed of Perseverance in the Discharge of those Duties, and in the Exercise of those Virtues which true Religion inculcated, than to the prompt and steady Resilience and Discouragement which your Majesty has uniformly opposed both to the immoral Conduct and licentious Principles of its Enemies.

In the Times in which we live we are peculiarly ill able to dispense with the Support and Consolation which we thus derive from your Majesty's paternal Solicitude for the Welfare of your People; we, therefore, humbly offer up our Prayers to Heaven, that they may be long preserved to us; and that the Influence of your Majesty's Example may long continue to be felt and acknowledged, in future and distant Ages, when your Majesty shall have exchanged an earthly Diadem for a "Crown of Glory that fadeth not away."
