A PROCLAMATION,

For further continuing from the Thirty-first Day of December next, until Forty Days after the next Meeting of Parliament, the Prohibition of the Distillation of Spirits from Corn or Grain, in the United Kingdom.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS, by an Act passed in the Forty-ninth Year of Our Reign, intituled "An Act to prohibit the Distillation of Spirits from Corn or Grain in the United Kingdom, for a limited Time;" it was enacted, that in case We, at any Time after the First Day of October last, should in Our Royal Discretion judge it to be for the Benefit and Advantage of Our Kingdom, further to continue the Prohibition of the Distillation of Spirits from Corn or Grain from the Thirty-first Day of December next, until Forty Days after the next Meeting of Parliament, then, and in such Case, it should and might be lawful to and for Us, by Our Royal Proclamation or Proclamations, to be issued by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, or by Our Order in Council, to be published from Time to Time in the London Gazette, and in the Dublin Gazette, to continue, throughout the United Kingdom, from the said Thirty-first Day of December until Forty Days after the next Meeting of Parliament, the Prohibition therein before mentioned, that is to say, That throughout the United Kingdom, during the Continuance of such Prohibition, no Worts or Wash for Distillation shall be made from Oats, Barley, or any other Corn or Grain, or from Malt, Flour, or Bran, or any Mixture with the same: And whereas We do judge it for the Benefit and Advantage of Our Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be further continued; We are thereupon pleased by this Our Royal Proclamation, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to order and direct that the Prohibition of the Distillation of Spirits from Corn or

Grain in the United Kingdom, be further continued from the Thirty-first Day of December next, until Forty Days after the next Meeting of Parliament, and that during that Period, no Person shall cause any Worts or Wash for Distillation to be made from Oats, Barley, or any other Corn or Grain, or from Malt, Flour, or Bran, or any Mixture with the same, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble and dutiful Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, approach your Majesty's sacred Person with our most lively and unfeigned Congratulations on the recent Anniversary of your Majesty's Accession to the Throne of these Realms. With Joy and Gladness we hailed the Day, on which your Majesty entered into the Fiftieth Year of your Majesty's Reign, not only over the Persons, but in the Hearts of your Majesty's Subjects.

When it pleased the Almighty Ruler of Princes to place the Sceptre in your Majesty's Hands the brave, free, and loyal People whom your Majesty was ordained to govern, received with Pleasure your Majesty's first Declaration to the Great Council of the Nation, that born and educated a Briton, the peculiar Happiness of your Majesty's Life would ever consist in promoting the Welfare of your People; and your Majesty's Resolution to maintain our most excellent Constitution, both in Church and State; with an Assurance that the civil and religious Rights of the Subject were equally dear to your Majesty with the most valuable Prerogatives of the Crown.

We experience and acknowledge the Blessings of this Security to our Religion and Laws, and that great Charter of Liberties which, in virtue of the glorious Revolution, your Majesty's illustrious House was chosen to defend. Through the Lapse of nearly Half a Century, your Majesty has proved yourself on every Occasion unwearied in the Maintenance and Practice of all the Principles so graciously pledged.

It is a proud Subject for your Majesty's faithful Citizens of London to record, that in the Midst of all our unexampled Struggles, your Majesty is enabled to say now, as at the Commencement of your Majesty's Reign, that your Majesty can see with joy of Heart the Commerce of these Kingdoms, that great Source of our Riches, and fixed Object of your Majesty's never-failing Care and Protection, flourishing to an Extent unknown in any former War.

Deeply impressed with Gratitude to Almighty God, for the innumerable Blessings he has been pleased to pour down upon this highly favoured

Nation, and more particularly for his wonderful and great Goodness, in having continued his divine Protection to your Majesty until this joyful Period: we, your Majesty's faithful Citizens of London, have implored Heaven to accept our fervent Prayers, of Praise and Thanksgiving, and to continue that same providential Care and Protection to your Majesty for many Years yet to come.

Believe, Sire, that it is the warmest Wish and most fervent Prayer of your Majesty's Citizens of London, that Providence may long continue to this Nation so distinguishing a Mark of Divine Favour; and that, in the Fullness of Time, when your Majesty shall be called from your earthly to a celestial Crown, the Memory and Example of so beloved a Sovereign may secure to a grateful People the Imitation of your Majesty's Virtues, in the Successors of your Royal House, till Time shall be no more.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Cambridge, having lately, under a Sense of the Divine Goodness to us, and to the Nation, in preserving your Majesty so long to reign over us, joined in humble Thankgivings to the Almighty for this Blessing, now beg Leave to express our Sentiments upon the same in the Presence of your Majesty. We congratulate your Majesty on the Satisfaction which you must experience in reflecting, that, for nearly Half a Century, you have been, in the Hands of Providence, an Instrument of Happiness to a great and enlightened Nation. SIRE,

These inestimable Blessings we owe, under God, to the Wisdom and to the Virtues, of our revered and beloved Sovereign; we acknowledge, with the most ardent Gratitude, the paternal Care with which your Majesty has so long and so affectionately watched over the Interests of your Subjects. Above all, with Hearts deeply impressed with a Sense of the Blessings we enjoy, we thank your Majesty for that most impressive Example of Piety and Virtue by which, during the whole of your Reign, you have instructed us to walk in that Path which leadeth to Happiness; both here and hereafter.

That the same Almighty Lord of the Universe, who, as the Pledge of our National Property, hath permitted your Majesty thus long to reign over us, may still preserve your Majesty in Health, Peace, and Godliness in the Enjoyment of Prosperity, and of domestic Peace, and that he may bring you at last to the Possession of that Inheritance which is incorruptible, and that fadeth not away, is our most fervent Prayer.

PROCLAMATION

For pardoning Deserters from His Majesty's Land Forces.

War-Office, October 24, 1809.

WHEREAS it has been most humbly submitted to the King, whether, on the joyful Occasion of His Majesty's entering into the Fiftieth Year of His Reign, it might no be desirable to distinguish so memorable an Epoch by an Act of Grace to all Deserters; and His Majesty having graciously approved of His Free Pardon being extended to all such Deserters from His Land Forces as shall eliver themselves up within Two Months from the 25th Instant: *These are publicly to declare His Majesty's benevolent Intention; and to direct that all Deserters, surrendering themselves to the Commanding Officer of any Regiment, or to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose Stations are mentioned in the Margin hereof; to the Commandant of the Army Depot in the Isle of Wight; Carlisle. or, where there is no Military Post, to a Leeds. Magistrate, shall be pardoned, and they Manchester. are hereby pardoned accordingly.*

Such Deserters, if from the Regular Forces, being Able-bodied Men and fit for Service, shall be sent to the Regiments from which they respectively deserted, or be appointed to such Regiments in the United Kingdom as His Majesty may be pleased to command; and, when so placed, shall not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged: and if from the Militia, shall be sent to the Regiments to which they respectively belonged.

And Whereas many of the said Deserters may have enlisted in other Corps, and are now serving therein,

His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon; and to direct that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, upon declaring themselves to their respective Commanding Officers, on or before the Period abovementioned: and they shall not be liable, at any future Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly served.

The Magistrate, to whom any Deserter, as above, may surrender himself, is authorized and required to certify the Day on which such Deserter surrendered himself; which Certificate is to continue in Force until the Arrival of the Deserter at the nearest Military Post, provided he proceed at the Rate of Ten Miles a Day, unless prevented by Sickness, to be certified by some Medical Practitioner on the Back of the Magistrate's Certificate; or to be otherwise proved to the Satisfaction of the Officer commanding at such Military Post.

His Majesty has further been pleased to direct, that Deserters now actually in Confinement as such, shall have the Benefit of this His Royal Pardon.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Forty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for permitting certain Goods imported into Great Britain to be secured in Warehouses without Payment of Duty," it was enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Consignee or Consignees of any Goods, Wares, or Merchandize enumerated or described in the Table thereunto annexed marked (C), which shall be legally imported or brought into the Port of London, to land any such Goods without Payment at the Time of the first Entry of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, of the Duties of Customs due on the Importation thereof, and such Goods may be lodged and secured at or in such Places, and under such Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions as the Commissioners of the Customs in England, or any Four or more of them shall approve and direct, upon the said Importer, Proprietor, or Consignee entering into Bond, to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, with one sufficient Surety, to be approved of by the Collector and Comptroller of the Customs of the said Port of London, in Double the Amount of the full Duties due and payable on the Importation of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, with Condition that such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize shall be either duly exported in the Manner and under such Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions so far as the same are applicable thereto, as by the said Act are directed in respect of Goods, Wares, or Merchandize secured in Warehouses as aforesaid, and exported directly from thence, or that the full Duties due and payable on the Importation of such Goods, Wares, or Merchandize shall be paid to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs within the Space of Twelve Months from the Date of the first Entry of such Goods: And it was further enacted, That if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, shall deem it expedient that the Provisions of the said Act should be extended to any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize not enumerat



or described in either of the Tables annexed thereto, and should cause a List of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize to be published in the London Gazette, then and from thenceforth all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Restrictions of the said Act shall extend to such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize in every Respect in as full and ample a Manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said Tables respectively, at the Time of passing the said Act: We, the undersigned Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to and in Execution of the Powers vested in us in and by the said Act, do hereby declare that it appears to us to be expedient that the Provisions of the Act should be extended to Zaffar and Cobalt legally imported or brought into the Port of London, (not being imported by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, or not being imported from the West Indies) and that such Zaffar and Cobalt should be added to the List of Goods, Wares, and Merchandize enumerated and described in the Table annexed to the said recited Act, marked (C), and that such Zaffar and Cobalt should be lodged and secured at or in such Places as aforesaid, under the Regulations and Directions of the said Act: And we do further declare, that from and after the Publication of this our Certificate in the London Gazette, conformable to the Directions of the said Act, all and every the Provisions, Regulations, and Restrictions of the said Act, shall extend, and be construed to extend to all such Zaffar and Cobalt in every Respect, in as full and ample a Manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the Table annexed to the said Act, marked (C), at the Time of the passing the same Act.

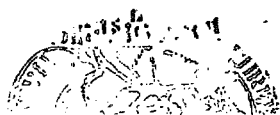
