

# The London Gazette.

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From Monday July 11. to Thursday July 14. 1681.

*Vienna, June 29.*

**Y**esterday arrived here Count Oxenstiern, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of Sweden; he will repose himself some days here, and then continue his Journey to Neustadt, where the Emperor now is, and intends to continue, during the Dyt at Oodenburg. Count Esterhazy, Palatine of Hungary, came from thence to Neustadt three or four days since, to give the Emperor an account of the Proceedings of the Dyt, and to receive his Imperial Majesties final Directions concerning the Answer that is to be returned to the Letter that came lately from Count Teckley; and we are informed, that the Emperors Answer to the three Heads which were proposed in the said Letter, is the same we have already told you; to which the Palatine is to add an Exhortation to Count Teckley, and the others that Signed that Letter; to send Deputies to the Dyt, fully instructed, to represent their Grievances, and what they desire should be done for the removing them; with an assurance that they shall find the Emperor, and the Dyt in a disposition to give them all reasonable satisfaction, that so an end may at last be put to the Miseries and Devastations of a Civil War; and if this have no effect, his Imperial Majesty will have recourse to his Arms, having ordered several Regiments to be in readiness to march into Hungary.

*Strasburg, July 4.* The preparations of the French in these parts, make us believe they have some great Design in hand; we still suspect it is upon this City, or at least upon the Fort of Kiel, which guards our Bridge over the Rhine; and therefore the Regiment of Souches is come to Offenburg, and several other Imperial Regiments are moving this way, in order to their having an eye upon the motions of the French.

*Piermont in Westphalia, July 7.* The 26th of the last Month the Elector of Brandenburg, with his whole Court arrived at Lude, about a mile from this place. Since, the Queen-Mother of Denmark Prince George her Son, the Electore's Palatine, the Dukes and Duchesses of Zell and Hanover are come hither; and three days since the Landgravine Dowager of Hesse; Sister to the Elector of Brandenburg arrived at Lude, where his Electoral Highness will continue till the 11th or 12th Instant; there have not as yet passed any Visits between his Electoral Highness and the Couris that are here, because of his being very much indisposed with the Gout.

*Cologne, July 8.* We have Letters from Metz which say, that a great many Cannon were brought thither from Verdun and other places, for the service of Saar-Louis, and those other places which they are now fortifying; and that the Marquis de Boufflers had received Orders to march with the Troops that are quartered on the Saar towards the Palatinate, and to quarter them in the Baillage of Alt-

zey, where they are to live at discretion, till Creuznach and Frankenthal, which the French lay claim to as Dependencies, be put into their hands.

*Hague, July 15.* The Heir Citters is returned for England with Orders to acquaint His Majesty with the Sentiments and Resolutions of this State, upon the late Proceedings of the French in the Province of Luxembourg. To Morrow the States of Holland meet. From Strasburg they write, that the Imperialists had reinforced the Garrison of Rhinfeids with 300 Men.

*Brussels, July 15.* The Prince of Parma is expected back here on Saturday next from Antwerp, where he is endeavouring to settle the publick Revenues. Don Baltazar de Fuen Mayor, who was dispatched the last week by his Highness to the Hague, returned again on Saturday night, having obtained very ample and positive Orders from the States-General to their Ambassador at Paris to joyn with Mr. Savile, the King of Englands Minister at that Court, in the Representations he is ordered to make to the French King and his Ministers, concerning the Proceedings against the Spanish-Netherlands, and particularly the Province of Luxembourg, on account of Dependencies. These Instructions were sent to the said Dutch Ambassador by an Express that past by here on Sunday Morning. In the mean time as we told you in our last, the Prince of Parma has sent Orders to the Governor of Luxembourg to resist the French with Force if they Attack Ckenay.

*Brussels, July 18.* The Prince of Parma is expected here to morrow from Antwerp (to be present at the Procession of the Sacrament on Sunday) whether he returns again on Monday or Tuesday. The French Troops are entred into the Countrey of Luxembourg, but we do not yet hear that they have committed any hostilities. From Dunkirk we have an Account that the Embargo which was laid upon the Spanish Ships in that Port, is taken off again.

*Windsor, July 10.* The following Address from Brecon, being signed by 2700 Hands, was presented to His Majesty on Thursday last by Captain Edward Gam, and Thomas Walker, Esq; and was received by His Majesty with His wonted Grace and Goodness; who were introduced by the Right Honourable Henry Lord Marquis of Worcester, Lord-Lieutenant of that County.

And we present Your Majesties our Lives and Fortunes at Your Majesties feet, in Defence of Your Sacred Person, the Protestant Religion (as is established by Law) Your Government, and hereditary lawful Succession, against any, who shall endeavour to bury in confusion, the Glory of Your Crown and Government, or the Splendor of our Church. This we shall be always ready to put in Act, when by Your Majesties Commandment, and ever to pray for Your perpetual Felicity.

#### To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Mayliff, Portmen, and Common-Council of Your Town and Burrough of Ipswich, in the County of Suffolk, hold our selves by that Duty and Loyalty bound to acknowledge with all humble and hearty Thankfulness, the great and many Blessings, which we and all Your Subjects enjoy, under Your Majesties Kind and Gracious Reign; as also the Liberties and Franchises, particularly Granted and Preferred to this place by Your Royal Favour and Bounty: And we humbly beg leave further, to express our grateful and glad Resentments of satisfactions in Your Majesties late declared Resolutions, to maintain the Government both in Church and State, as by Law established (a Government most deservedly dear to us) as rendering Your Subjects the most easie and happy People in the World. The Humble and Dutiful Address of the Loyal Inhabitants of the Burrough of Aylesbury, in the County of Bucks.

Dread Sovereign,

SINCE Kings are only accountable to God for their Actions, we, and all good Subjects, must acknowledge, if was a great Contencion and Goodness in Your Sacred Majesty, to vouchsafe Your People that Your late Gracious Declaration, dated the 8th of April 1681. whereby some have been undeceived; that by seditious Doctrines and Practices were misled, and others confirmed in their Loyalty and Duty. Altho' we Your Majesties truly Loyal and Obedient Subjects have by long Experience, been very sensible of the great happiness we have enjoyed under Your Gracious and just Government, since Your Majesties miraculous Restoration; and altho' (with admiration) of late years, we have more especially observed your Majesties Wisdom, Vigilance, and Conquest, in preserving us in Peace and Tranquillity, together with our Holy Religion, as by Law established, our Liberties and Properties, maugre all the contrivances of Papists, and other ambitious Actions, and turbulent Spirits to the contrary. Yet do we think our selves bound in Duty to God, Your Majesty, and our Neighbors (in this juncture of Affairs) to manifest these our Sentiments, by giving Your Majesty most humble and cordial Thanks, as for all the aforesaid Graces and Favours, so for Your most Gracious Declaration, and every part thereof, wherein is contained so many excellent things for the good of Your People, that we acknowledge no well-meaning Subject can desire more from a most Just and Gracious Prince: these things must engage all who have any true sense of Religion or Loyalty, as it doth us, Your Majesties most Humble and Obedient Subjects, according to our Duty and true Interest, to lay down our Lives and Fortunes at Your Sacred Feet, to be at Your Majesties disposal, to the accomplishment of those Your Majesties Gracious ends and purposes; and especially to the preservation of Your Majesties Sacred Person, Royal Prerogative, and Imperial Dignity, in preservation whereof, under God, consults the safety of our Religion, Liberty, and Property: And we do solemnly protest and engage, That no Seditious nor factious Insinuations of cauleless Fears and Jealousies, (once before our Ruine) shall move us from these our firm and settled Resolutions. This our Loyal, Humble and Faithful Address will we hope, take off the reach which this Burrough hath long lain under, as disaffected to Your Majesties Go-

vernment, for the Fanaticism of a few, whom we hope your Majesties Gracious Declaration, and a little time, or else Your Majesties Laws will reclaim.

That God may pour down his Blessings on Your Majesty, and Crown Your Majesties Sacred Head with Victory over both Your Domestic and Foreign Enemies, is, and always shall be the Prayer of us Your Majesties most Obedient and Loyal Subjects. Signed by about 170.

The Humble Address of the Mayor, Jurats, and Common-Council of the Kings Town and Parish of Maidstone in the County of Kent.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, do (out of a deep sense of our Duty and Loyalty to your Majesty) most humbly beg Liberty to return our most humble and hearty Thanks to your most Sacred Majesty, for that your Royal Favour and most Gracious Consideration; your Majesty having been Graciously pleased in your late Declaration to Declare your greatest Zeal (and in these times of pretended fears and jealousies) to renew to all your Loyal Subjects, your Royal assurance to prefer the Protestant Religion, as now by Law established, against all the most clandestine endeavours, and evil practices of all Popish and Schismatical Enemies; and to prefer the Liberties and Properties of all your Majesties Subjects, and to govern according to the known Laws of this your Majesties Kingdom. In testimony whereof, we have hereunto set our Common Seal at our Court of Maidstone, holden the 29th of June, in the 33 year of your Majesties Reign over us.
